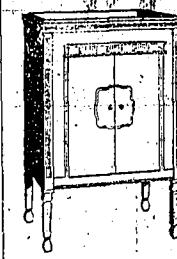

THERE IS A DIFFERENCE

The Idaho Free Press of Nampa takes exception to an editorial of The Citizen published a month ago which said that Mayor Ross and the Democratic party take the same position that the Progressive party did on state affairs and that if the Progressive party would unite in voting this year with the Democrats they could elect the state ticket. The Free Press said "In the state of Idaho, there has been no difference between the two old parties except as one has been in office and the other out."

This does not agree with W. Scott Hall, who was running for governor on the Progressive ticket in 1926 and was supported by the Free Press, told the people of Twin Falls county when he was on the stump here.

He said that the administration of Governor D. W. Davis was much worse and much more expensive than the administration of Governor M. Alexander, and that the administration of C. C. Moore was less efficient and more expensive than the administration of D. W. Davis. He said if H. C. Baldridge should win, his administration would be more expensive than either.

Files of the papers show that he traced the tax levy from the time of Alexander when it was the lowest at any time in 20 years up to 1926. The rates were Alexander: 1915, \$1.92; 1916, \$1.61; 1917, \$2.15; 1918, \$2.70; Davis, 1919, \$7.85; 1920, \$6.13; 1921, \$5.57; 1922, \$2.40; 1923, \$3.77; 1924, \$4.76; 1925, \$3.60; 1926, \$4.50.

The rise in the levy during the last two years of the Alexander administration was due to war prices. In his last year Alexander and his board cut valuations \$27,000,000 and Davis and his board raised them back \$27,000,000, so the raise in taxes under Davis was greater than it seemed to be even considering the big raise in the levy.

But Mr. Hall said that did not measure the whole difference. He said by means of other new sources of revenue like the gas tax, the total amount taken from the people and spent by the state was really greater than ever and was greater under Governor Moore than under Governor Davis, for the same things that were taken care of from the tax levy under Governor Alexander. He spoke well of Governor Alexander and his administration.

If it is true that Moore was our most expensive governor up to that time, then The Free Press cannot deny that Baldridge is more expensive still. In an advertisement this week the Republican state committee says to Mayor D. Ben Ross:

"In your American Falls speech you said that it cost the State of Idaho \$675,884 more in 1927 and 1928 to run the State of Idaho than was necessary."

"It is not a fact, Mr. Ross, that the legislature appropriated and the Governor approved net increased appropriations amounting to \$716,741."

The state committee does not think that Ross put the increase in expenditures high enough.

Mr. Hall appealed to the voters at that time to Governor Alexander!

"Restore to Idaho electors freedom, that was lost by the repeal of the direct primary law—one of the first acts of the extravagant state machine—and the return of the convention system. The machine, which last dumbed the Republican party, bonded the state last year (1925) for \$300,000, and our children are asked to pay for this extravagance. One hundred eleven high-priced automobiles, most of which are pleasure cars, were purchased for the use of state officials and employes and the upkeep is costing the taxpayers many thousands of dollars. The cabinet form of government increased the state's taxes 200 per cent the first year, and steadily increased it each year since."

"A greater crime than all these was put over by Gov. Moore, who fooled the legislature, and had them pass the forestry bill. This same bill in different form was defeated in the legislature 1910, 1921, and 1922, which gives the timber trust the authority to buy the school timber at their own price."

These things happened, according to Mr. Hall, under Republican administrations. Surely there is some difference between them and the Democratic administration of Governor Alexander!

SAUCE FOR THE GOOSE

The Republican state central committee has adopted the campaign methods of Governor Smith. Al has been trying to "smoke out" his opponent but he continues to hide behind a screen of silence, it being claimed that to mention Smith by name would be unbecoming and undignified on the part of Hoover. Mayor Ross might well emulate Candidate Hoover by refusing to be led into the trap set by the G. O. P. here through the medium of newspaper ads intended to impugn the honesty of the next governor.

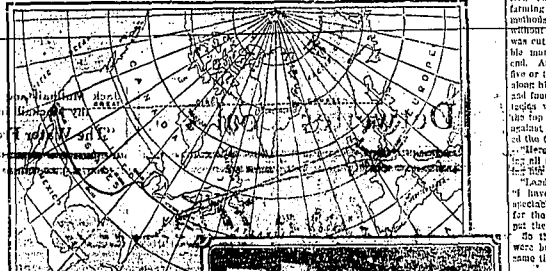

L. D. S. CHURCH BUILDING SOLD

The Congregational church, new organization in Twin Falls, has purchased the old L. D. S. chapel and will take it over some time in November. Last Sunday being the day for the periodical visit of the Congregational pastor to this district, the church members were permitted to use the building for their services. The L. D. S. holding services in the high school, work has been going on for the new L. D. S. tabernacle on Fourth Avenue East to be in readiness for occupancy by the time the building is turned over to the new owners. Only the basement will be completed this fall, the entire building to be finished in time for conference next June if possible.

Work is being rushed on the tabernacle and funds will be permitted, as no indebtedness is being incurred. Lathing was completed last week and plastering started this week. Heating plants must also be installed to make the basement suitable for use.

The work was started about nine years ago but construction was held up during the high price period. The cost is \$40,000 and will include one of the finest churches in Idaho when completed. It has a spring floor in the auditorium and other modern conveniences, making it entirely modern in every way.

The old chapel has been in use by the L. D. S. church since 1918.

Tomita Resolves Damage Suit

The case of G. Tomita against C. F. Johnson will be given another trial according to a verdict in District court this week. The jury awarded the verdict against the plaintiff, one who was first heard after the damage suit was reduced from \$7800 to \$1400.

Tomita sued for damages resulting from a short crop produced from seed that Johnson bought and which the Japanese engineer was inferior. The jury, however, found Johnson liable to pay the claim. Johnson's counter suit for \$25,000 was also reduced in the verdict. Final disposition of the balance to be decided by the judge.

Portland Rate Hearing Starts

The hearing on freight rates at Portland, Ore., began last Monday with the filing of complaints by the Warrenton, Wash., and Idaho public utilities commissions. Testimony was given to show that these three states ship more than three times as much of the apples shipped in the United States and that they are thereby entitled to all judicial advantages in shipping facilities.

Rates on fruit from this section to the eastern market in the same proportionation as on other commodities and from California are applied for by the three north-west states.

Canal Pushing Ahead

Work is now under way on the new portion of the Shoshone-Miller canal, the Derbon construction company of Ellensburg, Washington, having arrived at Blackfoot to carry on this part of the work. The company is starting on the first mile and a half which is to be cut through rock. The Derbon construction company's bid for the rock work on the canal was \$28,250, based on \$1.10 per cubic yard.

The Winston Brothers construction company of Stansbury is pushing ahead rapidly on the disposition of the canal, each one of their shifts removing about 1000 cubic yards of rock. The company has a crew of 30 men. A big dragline is being used, scooping up about three yards of dirt several times a minute, operating continuously by the three shifts.

It will be let soon on the canal which is 20 miles of the canal which will be constructed, the minimum limit of "excess" banks that may be cut, by the American National Falls Reservoir district No. 2.

Fairfield Opens New High School

At Fairfield Sunday was held the dedication ceremony for the new \$30,000 Canaan county high school building. The affair was in charge of the L. O. O. F. lodge and W. D. Vincent, state commissioner of education, was speaker.

The program was a success and the high school was given an another feature.

School work started in the new building Monday, October 16, in charge of Superintendent W. S. Fowler. Big inauguration night was given Monday night to complete the program.

The new school was started last week and has an enrollment of 175 in the seventh class room. The old building will be used by the grade classes. Opening of the high school building is a community event for the Canaan county town. It is distinguished by representing the finest building in the district in Idaho, all the others being confined to portions of counties, an element which contributes to high esteem of the new school administration, as will be spoken at Teachers' Institute in Twin Falls last week.

RED CROSS WILL CAMPAIGN

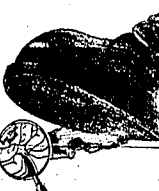

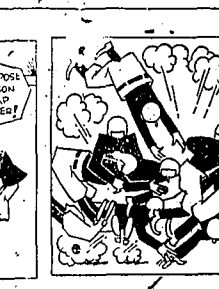
