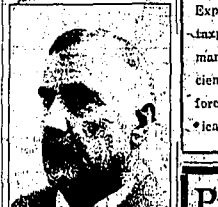

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Writing to the Idaho State Journal of Pocatello from his home at Roberts, Idaho, T. H. Howard presents some food for thought regarding the issues of the present campaign. Says Mr. Howard:

"As a farmer with the farmers in general, I will fall against for the staff Borch and the Republican press are putting out in Idaho. That if Al Smith is elected the tariff will be taken off and the farmer ruined. I wonder if the majority of the farmers really know the Republican party has had their own way about tariff since 1921 and during that time farm land has decreased some \$20,000,000,000. Two million people left the farm. Some 30 or 40 per cent of farmers have lost their farms. Four thousand farm banks went broke, all under the high protective tariff. Now they claim this ramp relief will save the farmer. When I read of Senator Borch attacking a man like Governor Smith after what he said about Hoover in 1919, and now leading him to the sky, I wonder if the people in general really know or pay any attention to his remarks.

"When I see a farmer with a Hoover sign on his windshield I wonder if he has ever given a thought to the fact that for the first time in American politics the farmers of America hold the balance of power. If four or five of the agriculture states will give Smith their vote he is absolutely sure of election. Twenty-five years ago farm products, such as wheat, oats, barley and potatoes sold for about the same as today. Nineteen twenty-eight finds wheat \$1 per bushel, oats about 40 cents, barley about 55 cents, potatoes about 25 cents per bushel. In 1920 a bigger cost about \$30 and today \$275. Nineteen hundred-thirteen a mow of hay was \$12.50, a wagon was \$20, today \$180; a pair of shoes cost \$3.50, now \$10. Everything a farmer buys in 1928 has increased from 100 to 400 per cent. While the most of his product has remained as it was 25 years ago only, hogs, cattle and sheep, something he has not been able to hold on to, for the reason he has had to sell of his broad stock to pay the high taxes and live on. Now any farmer who is fair to himself and family will not give this matter a thought. I am a Republican and I will vote."

Smith and until he took a stand for farm relief Hoover, and his bunch at Kansas City had done everything but "kick the dogs" on anything that looked like a farmer at the Republican convention. Now all it is to harp on is tariff. It may be all right, but it has proven the wrong remedy for the farmer since 1921.

"They all harp about sheep and wool. There are probably 500 farmers who have no sheep to every one farmer that has a band of sheep—still they want those 500 farmers to protect one sheepman, so he will be able to buy their hay from \$6 to \$8 per ton. If every farmer votes for his own interest a law will be passed in 12 months and Al Smith will not vote it either."
