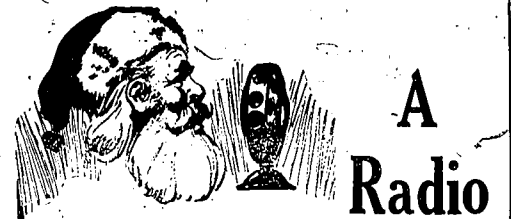

DON'T MAKE A BUG-BEAR OF CHRISTMAS

Christmas is not designed to be a bug-bear; it is a time of happiness. Christmas should be anticipated joyfully; not dreaded. It is the anniversary of the birth of the Savior, a holy day.

Give what and to whom you can, cheerfully, wholeheartedly, sincerely—but do not let the event become a financial frenzy, causing yourself worry and unhappiness. No one asks that.

HARDWOOD TREES

In order to further encourage the planting of hardwood trees on the idle lands of farms in southern Idaho, the state provides that such lands devoted to this purpose should not be taxed while the trees are too small to have any commercial value and while the land cannot be used for any other purpose.

In addition, the state school-of-forestry provides the trees to farmers at half cost of production. The state school has a fine stock of hardwood trees available and offers service in establishing woodlots, shelter-belts or windbreaks, together with information about care of the trees.

The type of trees desired are hardwood, nut-bearing or other merchantable varieties. Many farmers in southern Idaho are planting black locust trees as far up the Snake river as Minidoka county. The school of forestry at Moscow, with facilities for applicants a lot of trees suitable for planting in various portions of the state, and information regarding tax exemption of lands growing them.

A. M. Sawder, of the school has visited Twin Falls county and other sections of southern Idaho this fall to encourage the planting of trees that will have the double advantage of serving as wind-breaks and of supplying commercial demands. The old poplars planted on the tract have proved to be unsuitable, desiring land of its nourishment while being of no value for a commercial purpose. The forestry school by providing more valuable trees at low expense and giving information regarding their growth is furnishing service that is of much value to farmers and farmers.

Another big advantage in the farm woodlot is that they have a recognized loan value, since the trees can be used for a variety of useful purposes, such as fence posts, fuel, props, wagon tongues, livestock and crop protection. The state school of forestry reports on instance at Oakley 35 years ago when a farmer planted some hardwood trees to prove up on his homestead. Many of the trees were not suitable for planting under conditions existing there and died. The farmer transplanted the surviving trees to another plot where they thrived well. The varieties were white elm, white ash and Lombardy poplar. When the farmer's son later sought to obtain a loan on the farm, the banker looked over the place and granted the loan on the strength of the woodlot's value as an asset to the land.

The state forestry officials state that had the trees been better selected their loan value would be greater, and that any farm growing hardwood trees as advocated will possess an added value toward securing loans if they are desired.

County agents provide information regarding the woodlots and their care.

WEEKLY POTATO MARKET REVIEW

Terminal and shipping potato markets held about steady during the past week. Prices showed little change. Shipments were light—continues—usually light, totaling 3,120 cars. Movement from the late states continues to lag to December 11, the past week. Idaho started 200,000 cars which is 25,320 cars less than moved from these states to the same date a year ago. In the past week, Idaho started 200,000 cars to market, Colorado 366, Maine 950, Michigan 170, Minnesota 125, and Wisconsin 100. Minnesota brought 70-80c, cash truck, according to quality and size, with an occasional ear of fancy large stock 65c. California and eastern-pack U. S. No. 2 Russets moved slowly at 35-40c. Russets moved steadily at 55-60c per cwt. Warehouse sold growers for Russets grading out U. S. No. 1 50-60c throughout the week; hauling were light at this figure. Buyers of Russets for eastern shipment paid generally 60 and 65c for grower-graded U. S. No. 1 stock and furnished marks. Offerings and sales of Baker Russets proved too light to warrant quoting.

In the Burley-Twin Falls district, Russets were reported dull at 70-85c on a carload cash to grower-bank. At Colorado shipping points, delivered sales returned 60-74c. Washington ranged 65-74c, while bulk Green Mountains at Maine points netted 60-70c.

Potato arrivals in Chicago totaled nearly 100 cars less than the previous week, amounting to 370. Stock from Idaho was also in light supply, showing at \$1.40-1.60, but Wisconsin round whites and Minnesota Red River Ohios advanced 1c to 1.90-2.00 pounds to ranges of 85c-1.10 and 85c-1.15 respectively. Lighter receipts in Los Angeles permitted the heavy truck loadings of last week to partially clean up. Carlot sales of Idaho Russets there advanced 10c to 50c of \$1.35-1.40. Northern California points showed in-
