THE TIME BINDER

of this community and the entire intermediate territory and need more or less extensively for carrying purposes; and where, due to the wide distribution over many states, and because of the difficult character of the problem the eradication or control of the pest is decidedly a matter which should be undertaken with immediate vigor by the agencies of the United States government. And whereas, the sum of about \$300,000 recommended by the United States Budget Bureau and incorporated in the appropriation bill for the U. S. department of agriculture for the study and control of this pest during the calendar year of 1929, is insufficient and should be increased at least \$300,000, which are all significant crops since the present allotted sum is withdrawn and stopped entirely in Idaho.

Wilson Lake—It's Origin and It's Name

George Goodhue, who was in the employ of the American Fur Company with headquarters at Fort Hall and later with the Hudson Bay company at Fort Boise, roved over the Snake River valley as early as 1857. In speaking of Wilson Lake, Mr. Goodhue says called it the Big Lake in the Lake. I presume this was merely to designate it from other lakes that were much smaller, and by mid-summer had lost their water through evaporation, while the Big or Wilson lake held its water throughout the year and was used for drinking purposes for both man and beast.

Wilson Lake had no other name than the Big Lake and took its present name from a family of Wilsons who located on its south bank.

The Wilson family consisted of father and mother, two old people who bore a good reputation, a daughter, some sixteen or seventeen years of age, and if I remember rightly, there were three boys. I was personally acquainted with but one of the boys, then older brother, Frank. He was quite a likable fellow. We thought we knew him very well. Often he spoke in nice terms about his father, mother and sister at the lake, and he made a good impression on us. But he with the other brothers gained a bad reputation and were mistrusted as being ringleaders of a band of outlaws that operated on the north side of Snake River canyon during the construction of the Oregon Short Line railroad in 1888-84, running off stock from the construction camps, taking them into the rough lava north of Wilson lake and from their rendezvous at the Devil's Corral, hunted and guarded them until they could be gotten to market either in Montana or Nevada.

This band of horse thieves were undoubtedly the best organized and strongest band of outlaws that ever operated in the west. During the time they were operating at Devil's Corral, we were living at Shoshone Falls, only three miles from their rendezvous. Members of the band often came to our place to buy supplies. They were men and well behaved men and gave us no cause to suspect that they were members of an outlaw band.

Find Lou Landers' Body. At least one man was killed in endeavoring to regain stolen stock from this band. It was Lou Landers, whose body was discovered later on the butte overlooking the little valley where now nestles the thriving town of Eden, and from this incident the butte was called Skeleton Butte.

It was during this period or a little later that the Wilson lake came into prominence. The finding and identifying of the body of Lou Landers brought attention of the people to what was going on and caused an investigation. When the Devil's Corral was visited, great quantities of men and mule shoes were found which had been taken from stolen stock and while the personnel of the band had left the country never to return, the evidence of their busy camp showed plainly, and by the cartons and empty cans strewn around camp, made it possible to identify them as the men that made their purchases at Shoshone Falls.

Wilson Lake drains into a considerable country and when even a light snow that fell on frozen ground was taken off by chinook winds, which seemed more prevalent forty or fifty years ago, large quantities of water rapidly run into the lake.

Surrounded by Water. An incident happened that impressed this very clearly on my mind. In the fall of 1880 when myself and my wife were coming out of the woodriver country, we camped

before daybreak we were disturbed and, woke to find ourselves entirely surrounded by water and the water rising so rapidly that it was with difficulty we waded and paddled our bedding, and outfit to high ground. A chinook wind was blowing and the snow was about 1/2 gone. Snows Lighter Now. I am advanced not only by my own expectations and memory but from information gathered from other old Settlers that the snowfall of Snake River valley was greater years ago than this. It is expected that in regard to the country lying north of Snake River canyon and near the great bend of the Sixteenth mountain which at that time seemed to lap well over and send its snows into Snake River valley. Some old settlers tell me that we have less snow now in the Sixteenth mountain than years ago, while others that a ten year average would be expected to be in regard to the snow. We know that during with 1880 and continuing until 1891 that "Cougler" suffered from drought, spring creeks dried, grass and vegetation withered to the ground and that snow that fell in the mountains fell on frozen ground and was taken off by chinook winds, leaving no moisture in the ground. It was during a period that the sage brush moved to the hills where it still remains. It was during this six years of drought that the immense cattle herd of Sparks and Tannen was reduced from a herd that branched thirty thousand head of calves at the beginning of 1880, to sixty head of calves in 1891, and the country has never entirely recovered from the dry spell.

"Buck" Rice has a mountain home in the hills above Goat Spring. A veteran cowboy, Mr. Rice has ridden the range of the Goose Creek mountains continuously for fifty years and tells us that nothing spring throwing large quantities of water in 1891 have not come back and today are just shedding tears.

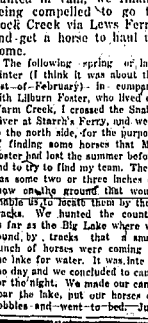

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# COUNTY - CITY TAXES ARE DUE ON SATURDAY

Real Estate and Personal Assessments Become Due With Penalty Imposed.

Saturday, December 22, is the first date for paying Twin Falls county taxes without penalty. They fell due the fourth Monday in November and the fourth Monday in December, before which time the first half of the tax should be paid. If it is not paid by the first of January and the second half of the tax, with interest at the rate of 10 per cent per annum from the date of delinquency is charged. If the first half of the county tax, if it becomes delinquent, may be paid with these penalties any time before the second half is due in January and the fourth Monday in June. Delinquency of the first half of the taxes will not impose a penalty on the second half, which does not become delinquent until the fourth Monday in June.

The tax notices describe all property owned, with the name of the owner, amount of tax, date when it is due and other such information. Any errors should be reported to the county treasurer, but the failure of the owner of the property to receive any notice of an error will be considered as the wrong place, the wrong person, etc., will not free him from the obligation of paying the amount of the tax becomes delinquent, December 24.

Personal property tax is due and payable on or before Monday, there being no provision in the law for extensions of payments, penalties of interest assessments.

The agent will take charge of the work, farmers to pay for the poisoning. Dealers are offering from 75 cents to \$1 a pound for the skin, with a number of men and boys starting out to capture the rabbits. Disease kills rabbits most of them off in the early spring, but the mild winters of late years have caused a serious increase in the number of rabbits.

## VETERAN MINER PASSES

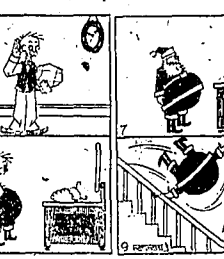
