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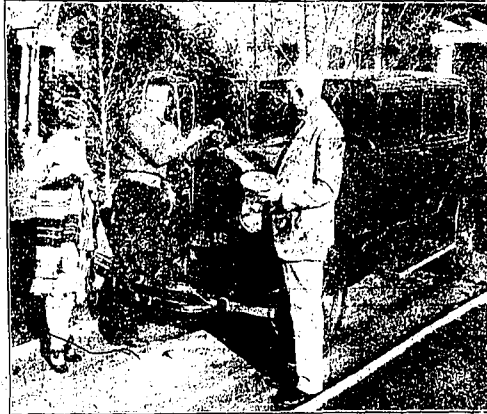
# Nineteen-Twenty-Eight Good for Business in State of Idaho

The year 1928 has been a good one for business in Idaho. The Idaho school of business administration in the Idaho Economic Bulletin, issued by the school, estimates the state's total volume of business for 1928 will be about 4 per cent above that of last year.

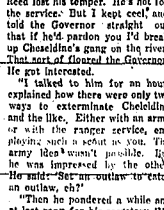
**DIVIDENDS PAID**

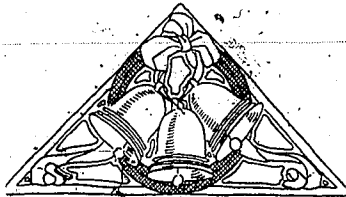

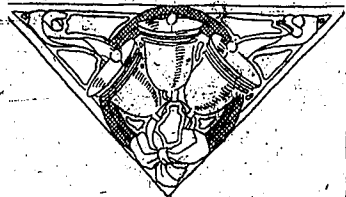

### EARLY PULLETS NEED ATTENTION

Don't let your early laying pullets get you down in the fall. The poultryman of the state college of agriculture at Pullman, "Don't try to get more than a 70 per cent production, but keep the birds in good health condition and you are enough to keep them laying steadily." "Pullets which come into production early (in August or September) have a tendency toward a production slump and a molt which is short and cool and weather ill-timed. It is very important to maintain their weight and feeding suitable rations of providing artificial light at the proper time will help out in the difficulty." "Feed plenty of hard grain at first. In the morning, feed a very portion of the way in which the pullets are producing. Probably fifteen grams for each hundred pullets is enough when they are producing 75 per cent of their normal weight in egg. One of the main points to remember is that if they eat more grain they eat less feed, and if the feed that contains the mineral protein and fat is scarce. However, too much mash will cause a temporary increase in egg setting, but a permanent loss in body weight and later production." "A pint of cod liver oil in every hundred pounds of mash helps keep the birds in good health during the winter. Good health is one of the life assets in any of the poultry flock and that is why the cod liver oil is worth its trouble and cost."

### BASKETBALL STARTS

Basketball prospects at Bull high school are reported very good despite the loss of six of last year's main squad of eight players. Thurman, Mintun, Rocco, Quire, Pierce and McCluggage have gone, only Lucy and Winiger remaining as the nucleus around which Coach Cliff Davidson is building his team for the coming season. The following are promising substitutes to use as a reserve for the main squad, members of which have not been chosen yet: Coach Harry Benson has four of last year's champion girls' team back, Hayes, Southwick, Lucy and Boring, with several second string players expected to make a good team.

### Clean Out Mites and Bedbugs in Henhouses

Chicken mites and bedbugs in poultry houses can be cleaned out by a simple application of carbolic acid solution painted on the roosts, floor, drainage, and on the walls. The drainage, obtained from around the gas pipes, use also when suitable, neither did of mites, according to Iowa State college. "Mites do their worst at night while the birds are in the poultry house. During the day they hide many in the cracks and crevices of the house. In getting rid of mites it is important that all equipment be cleaned so that it can be cleaned and treated for mites." "In using either carbolic acid or gas solutions it is important that the chickens be kept out of the house for six hours. The fumes are likely to injure the chickens' eyes and may irritate the eyes."

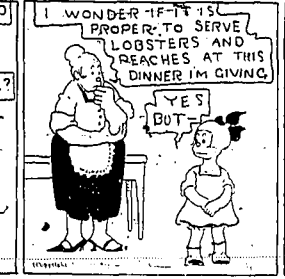
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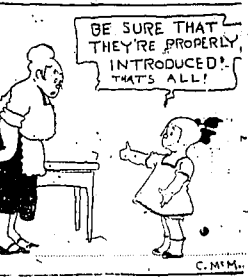

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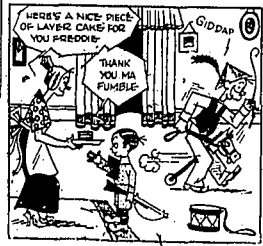

With the work organized to cover the town, by all agencies helping, there was little chance for anyone to be missed in this season's charity work.

WAR ON ROBENT COVERS IDAHO THIS PAST YEAR

Individuals and Government Agencies Cooperative to Get Rid of Predatory Animals.

For the third year ending June 30, 1929, the agricultural extension service of the state department of agriculture carried on its fight against rodents and similar pests in forty-two counties according to the annual report of T. B. Murray, rodent control leader of the state unit.
Twenty-four county agents and 13,670 landowners, farmers and livestock men cooperated in the work. There were used 320,000 pounds of poisoned bait on 2,477,350 acres. The bait contained 17,721 pounds of calcium cyanide, and 7650 ounces of strychnine.
All cooperating agencies spent a total of \$30,584.20, of which amount \$15,320.64 came from the U. S. biological survey, \$4,496.31 from the university extension division, and \$2,207.25 from individuals, counties and cooperating organizations.
The labor employed during the campaign had an estimated value of \$1,200,000.

Fattening Broilers

Some producers make a practice of fattening broilers for a few days before sending them to market. When this is practiced, the birds are kept confined in a net pen, house or are put into batteries, such as are used for fattening broiler flocks, and followed on a wet night. 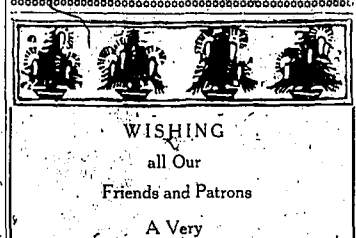
