WHEN GUNMEN DIE WITH THEIR BOOTS ON

In the quiet little town of Oxford, situated in Oneida county, southeastern Idaho, surrounded by a farming community, where everybody in both village and country attended the same church, and where church and country affiliations were paramount, the people were brought together often in one mind and heart. The church was called the meeting house, and was used for the dance, theatre, and church services. Here the frequent news of a good brother taking for himself a plural wife was met by the sisters with soft pained expression of approval, and if the fortunate brother had wisely chosen a good looking damsel from the flock, the brothers sanctioned the news with satisfied twinkle of the eye.

Oneida county holds the distinction of having the first permanent settlement in Idaho and was at one time the most important settlement of Utah. For a long period no incident or accident had occurred to disturb the tranquil minds of those good and church-loving people until one day in the early 80's news was announced that started the gossip tongues a wagging and everyone hitched up on the same wave length when it was broadcasted that one of the husbands of a good family had been invaded, and a sister of the church was taken for wife by a man of different faith. Now at that time no greater violation of character and code no positive proof had been submitted that connected him with any criminal acts, he was given a had reputation by people who knew him in the southwestern country where he had followed his occupation of a cowboy. Charles Butterfield decided to make the best of his thought was a bad job and see how his son-in-law conducted his judgment of human nature was sufficient to tell him that he was on probation in the mind of his father-in-law but he met this fact with indifference. The two men spoke to each other friendly enough but down in their hearts had grown a hatred. Perry Plessant had failed to make a real good husband, often spending money for drink and gambling that should have been spent on his family.

It was in January, 1886 that word reached the sheriff's office that a check on the Barkness Cattle company, for some three hundred dollars had been forgotten by Perry Plessant, who some time before had been in their employment. Plessant had cashed the check with a Logan firm who caused a warrant to be issued and Charles Butterfield, the father-in-law, was pleased when it was placed in his hands for service. It was learned that Plessant was in Albion, the county seat of Cassia county, where he was drinking, gambling, and seemed flush with money. It was known that he was armed, as a six-shooter hung openly from his belt. It was Saturday, December 10, 1886, that Charles Butterfield, with a warrant for Plessant's arrest, arrived in Albion, where he conferred with William Stokes, sheriff of Cassia county. Sheriff Stokes advised Butterfield that care should be taken in making the arrest of Plessant as he was armed and through drink was in bad temper. Sheriff Stokes was a very efficient officer and wanted Butterfield to turn the warrant over to him, but Butterfield insisted on making the arrest himself, and in taking his time about it.

Plessant, hearing that his father-in-law was in town went to the stage office where the two men met, apparently in a friendly way. After some conversation, Plessant invited Butterfield into William Holcomb's saloon, and after a drink, both went to the hotel, presumably to get a room for Butterfield. Why Butterfield did not arrest Plessant at this time or before will always be a mystery, but instead of making the arrest he entered into conversation with other men, which gave Plessant an opportunity to quietly slip out of the hotel. When Butterfield discovered that his man had gone, he got busy. He armed himself with a shot gun and trailed him back to Holcomb's saloon, through Hascob's and Robinson's stable, where he jumped in fence and was discovered barricaded in an outside back of the Parks dwelling.

The sheriff's force was notified and surrounded the building. Plessant came out but would not reply. Mr. McCord, a friend, went to the building and tried to persuade him to come out but he refused, saying he would die first. Then a volley of shots were fired through the building to further induce him to surrender, but he still refused. Then William Holcomb, with flag of truce, went and talked to him. He told him that if he stayed he would be killed and explained what a place it would be to die in. Told him to surrender and that it was not a very serious matter and his course had better be for all. Plessant finally came out, gave his gun to Holcomb and surrendered to his father-in-law, Butterfield, who ordered that he go with him to the sheriff's office. But Plessant insisted that they not be in a hurry, and that they have a smoke, and Plessant began rolling a cigarette.

Butterfield with both barrels of his sawed-off shot gun cocked, ordered him to go, but Plessant still refused to do so, insisting that he smoke first. He then made several attempts to light a match on his hand, but each time failing. Then pretending to strike the match on his boot sole, he drew a .46 six-shooter from his boot top saying, "Drop that gun!" Two shots rang out so simultaneously that it seemed as one, and both men died by their boots on.

Plessant was shot in the head and Butterfield in the bowels. A coroner's jury found that Plessant was killed by a gunshot in the hand, of Deputy Sheriff Butterfield while performing duty on the 10th of December, 1886, and a jury found that Butterfield came to his death by a gunshot wound by Perry Plessant in resisting arrest.

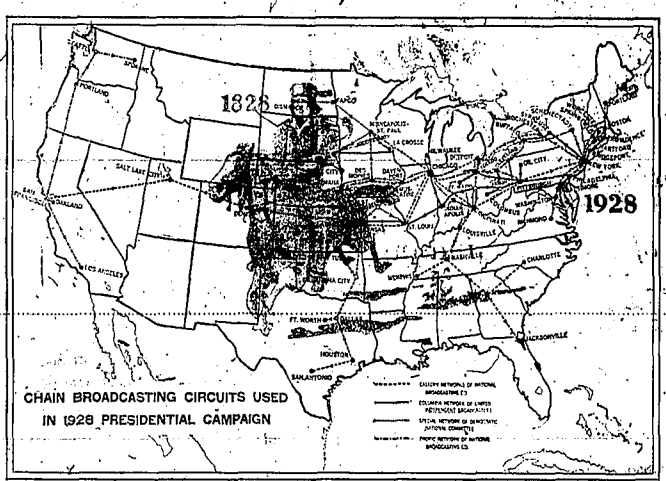

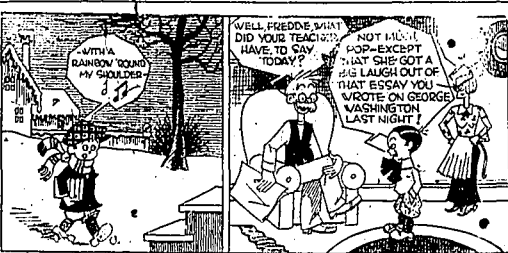

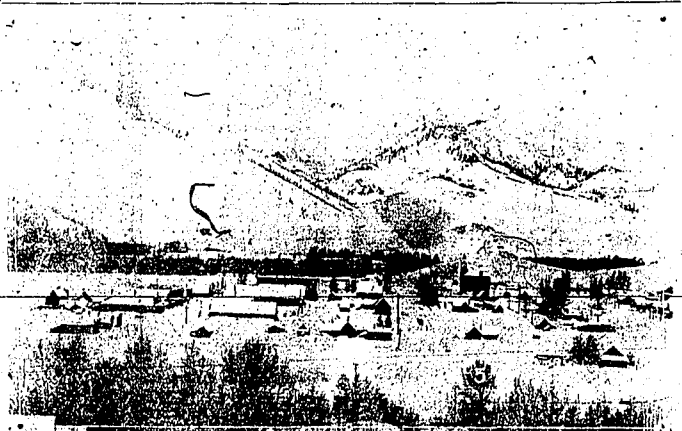

Bruce Barton is one of the most salutary influences in the lives of American youths. The idealism and inspirational qualities inherent in his work have helped many. 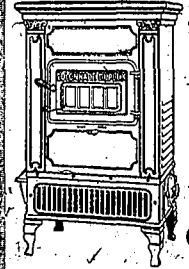
