Chicago packers say 300,000,000 hot dogs are commonly called "hot dogs" were eaten last year.

Both Production and Income Surpass That of Any Previous Year, Figures in Report Show.

Of the 21,000,000 pound bean crop raised by patrons of the Northern Idaho Bean-Growing Association last year, Twin Falls County produced the greatest amount. The production by districts was as follows, according to the report of Manager J. W. McCullay, determined by warehouse storage:

Twin Falls, 4,600,000 lbs.  
Kimberly, 4,500,000 lbs.  
Burley, 3,810,000 lbs.  
Hazelton, 2,440,000 lbs.  
Filer, 2,070,000 lbs.  
Juntura, 1,620,000 lbs.  
Knull, 1,320,000 lbs.

Of these beans, 10,000,000 pounds were Great Northern and about 1,800,000 pounds were Red Kidney. The production of Red Mexicans amounted to 8 per cent of the 1928 crop. The average yield was 5 per cent in 1927. Large tonnage of beans produced a record of 400,000 bushels.

Production figures for the last eight years showing a steady increase in output of beans in this section are as follows: 1921, 1,200,000 bushels; 1922, 1,400,000; 1923, 1,600,000; 1924, 1,800,000; 1925, 2,000,000; 1926, 2,200,000; 1927, 2,400,000; 1928, 2,600,000.

### TREES FOR FARMS

The school of forestry of the University of Idaho not only is prepared to advise farmers in Twin Falls county on the most adaptable species of trees for establishing windbreaks, shelterbelts, farm woodlots and for roadside tree planting, but is able to supply the trees to them at cost. Through a cooperative agreement with the United States Department of Agriculture, under the terms of the Clarke-McNary forest law, the forestry school is growing annually approximately 500,000 trees for distribution among farmers of the state. During the past year the school of forestry and college of agriculture have conducted a comprehensive survey of the farm-forestry situation in Idaho. As a result of the studies Dean F. G. Miller of the school and Arthur M. Snowdon, extension forester, are able to recommend the most adaptable species for each of the 44 counties in the state. The 500,000 young trees the school of forestry has for distribution this year represent approximately 30 species. The Black locust, which is being widely recommended throughout southern Idaho lands in numbers. Farmers in Twin Falls county interested in establishing woodlots, windbreaks or shelterbelts should communicate with the school of forestry of the university. Through its extension forestry service the University assists farmers in planning and caring for their trees. After the woodlots, windbreaks or shelterbelts become established the service also helps them develop the most efficient management practices so their trees will prove of greatest possible economic value.

system, most cigarettes coming under the two cents a package check. On cigarettes weighing more than a pound for \$100, a two-cent tax would be levied. One cent a hundred on cigarette papers would also be made. Revenue from the license fee would go to the city town or

county collecting the tax, while the revenue obtained from the sale of stamps to dealers would go to the state school fund. Dealers would be required to put a stamp on each package sold.

After some debate, the house passed the transportation bill which requires all wash practitioners to have at least a high school education before applying for a license to operate in the district. The vote was 45 to 11.

Representative Crowley of Bonville county introduced a bill giving bondholders or other creditors of an irrigation district the authority to throw the district into receivership for mismanagement. Failure to elect officers would be one indication of mismanagement.

Another bill would cause a school teacher to lose her certificate for one year if she breaks her contract with the board of education within 45 days before school opens. The present regulations are said to bind the board but not the teachers who frequently show up their heels within a few days before the term opens, causing difficulty in obtaining qualified instructors.

A memorial was adopted by both house and senate asking congress to consider the tariff schedule adopted by the tariff committee appointed by the governor recently.

# HORTICULTURAL MEETING TODAY

Some of the best known orchardists in Northwest to Discuss Problems.

Some of the best known orchardists in the northwest will be in Twin Falls Friday to attend the annual meeting of the Twin Falls County horticultural association. E. V. Gibson, horticultural inspector who has had charge of orchard inspections in the county since 1910, is the secretary of the association. He will be in charge of the meeting. Other speakers will be: Dr. J. P. Gray, horticulturist from California and will have charge of the program. One matter of interest will be the election of a president to succeed the late J. H. Waters.

Dr. C. Amies, manager of the American Fruit Growers at Wenatchee, Washington, and one of the leading orchardists in the northwest will be here on special request of a number of people who heard him speak here last year. He is considered an expert in his line.

Anthony Spuler, in charge of the insect and pest control work at the state office of Washington at Pullman, will discuss controlling moth traps and their efficiency. Claude Wickham, extension horticulturist at Parma, and Harry Sablin, manager of horticulture for the J. P. Gray, interests in Idaho valley, will talk on orchard problems.

Dr. D. P. Fisher, government pathologist at Wenatchee, has prepared two papers which will be read at the meeting by Mr. Deen. These are "The Perennial Tremor Canker" and "The Internal Breakdown of the Juniper." The canker is a new apple disease, specimens of infected apples to be exhibited.

The subject "How I Control Codling Moth by Spraying" will be discussed by John Moulton of Lake Hooper. These are both reported well qualified to discuss the subject, the matter of spraying being one of the most vital and of greatest interest to fruit growers of this territory.

One or two other men may also present the program. Mr. Deen is endeavoring to bring them to Twin Falls for this meeting.

Mr. Amies and Mr. Spuler spoke at the state horticultural meeting which closed a three-day session at Boise Thursday with election of officers. Mr. Spuler outlined the advantages of fermented soil in controlling codling moth, and Mr. Amies spoke on irrigation, fertilization, pruning, packing and other orchard work.

In his papers, Dr. Fisher warned against leaving apples too long on the trees and too long in boxes in the orchard, causing internal breakdown in the fruit. Other speakers were Governor Ballrigde who told of his own orchard experience at Parma, Ed. J. J. Jiddings of the state college of agriculture and Senator E. G. Van Heeren, manager of large orchards at Mesa, Idaho.

## MACHINERY IS BOON TO FARM SAYS SPEAKER

Dr. Robert Stewart Addresses Large Gathering at Meeting of Local Rotary Club.

Farmers were included in the large attendance at the Rotary club meeting Wednesday when Dr. Robert Stewart, dean of the College of Agriculture of the University of Nevada, spoke on "Current Economic Trends in American Farming." Dr. C. H. Scott, president of the club, presided.

Dr. Stewart spoke of the great advantages of machinery in having freed the farmer of a hard life on the farm by providing him opportunities for pleasure and profit that he had never had in the past.

Dr. Stewart also discussed the growing use of machinery, which he said, has enabled one family to produce enough for two families and that the old drudgery is in large degree eliminated.

Such wide spread use of machinery has enabled the surplus population of the farms to move to the cities where they have found open for their abilities, a condition which will and should continue to balance the industrial enterprise of the nation.

He expressed his opinion that the larger farm units are much more successful than are small farms operated, largely without such machinery as has served to revolutionize the farming methods as practiced in America today.

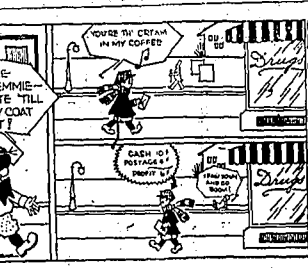
