

COUNTY HEALTH UNIT PROPOSED FOR TWIN FALLS

State and Federal Officials Meet with Committee to Determine Need for It Here.

The public health committee of the chamber of commerce met yesterday with Dr. Fred Board of the United States public health service, and R. H. Pratt of the Idaho department of public health in one investigating the feasibility and the need of a county health unit here.

The committee was composed of C. R. Scott, chairman; L. E. White of the county commission; Dr. Fred Board, state health officer; and S. Straus, merchant. They approved the idea of a health unit for Twin Falls county and will make further study with the state and federal officials.

Of less than 30,000 population in Twin Falls county, there is no health unit. Various forms of health work are being done by a staff to include a health officer, public health sanitary inspector, with additional work when needed, and an officer.

How to Raise Poultry

PULLETS FOR PROFIT WHEN WINTER COMES

Depend on the Youngsters for a Good Lay in Fall and Winter Months When Prices Are Highest.

"Youth will be served" so far as the old proverb of our own reference to poultry was intended, but it happens to fit just the same. As a rule, pullets lay more during their first laying season than during any subsequent season. Consequently if hatched and correctly timed so that plenty of pullets will be brought to maturity some time during the latter part of August or the beginning of September, winter egg season is insured for fall. Pullets hatched during February or March, according to almost any standard, will lay about the right time for winter eggs.

Pullets should not be allowed to come into maturity too quickly. Normally, a pullet starts to lay eggs as soon as she has reached maturity and her body has ceased to grow. Sometimes laying starts before full growth has been reached and further growth may result in smaller and defective eggs. If pullets are defective, especially their much and animal matter should be reduced. The weight of a pullet should be slightly increased, as pullets should have a good amount of fat on their bodies before they start laying. Otherwise they will not stand up well under the strain of laying and may fall short of the desired production.

For that reason, many poultrymen are making an increase in the quantity of grain fed to the pullets as their chicks begin to rodden. At the same time, they cut down on the mash and animal material. The grain is fattening, and the animal food being no longer required for muscle building as the birds reach maturity. Many start egg production before it is desirable.

It is usually considered better not to force pullets into premature laying by feeding large quantities of mash. Instead, limit the mash until pullets are quite ready to lay, and by feeding a greater amount of grain, to get them fat. Such a ration emphasizes the "fat-making material" and, by withholding the egg making materials, removes the danger of too early maturity. Mash-feeding is extremely unbalanced, as it contains materials needed for building up the muscles of young fowls, but much of it, however, may precipitate egg laying before it is desirable. Give the developing pullets all the grain they can eat during early fall and after they come into normal laying, gradually decrease the corresponding increase in mash feeding.

If pullets have been properly fed along the lines just outlined above, they should be ready to start laying. Such changes will usually cause a molt and filling out in the egg yield. Furthermore, pullets should never be housed with older hens. The more mature hens annoy the younger ones, and that too interferes with their laying. From this point on, the usual rules for feeding and handling laying hens will apply to pullets developed especially for winter egg production.

Of course I do not mean that older hens are incapable of winter egg production merely because I have emphasized the desirability of developing pullets for that season. With proper culling, breeding and feeding, hens can be made to lay almost as many eggs during the winter months as in warm weather.

Idaho Telephone Users Place Daily Average of 3987 Long Distance Calls in 1928

Telephone "Traveling" Increases Daily



EASY MARMALADES

At this season of the year when fresh fruits are plentiful and usually the cheapest, it is time to prepare the delicious marmalades.

Most American like some sweet for breakfast, even though they begin the meal with a fresh fruit, orange, or grape fruit at this season. Simple, simple, well liked, but warm and expressive and many people dislike honey, which often lacks flavor and is a drying sweet. So, marmalade is a linemen's ally and a very good thing to have in the kitchen. Several styles of marmalade are given below, some of which are of marmalade toast, the marmalade is a delicious addition to any meal.

Orange Marmalade—Take six or seven, two lemons, twelve cups of sugar, seven cups of water. Peel the oranges, removing the pithing in quarters. Slice the oranges. Squeeze the white lining from the rinds and discard. Cut the rinds into thin strips. Slice the lemons very thin, without peeling, and add the cold water and boil about 2 1/2 hours. Bring to the boiling point and boil three hours. Add the sugar and boil until the mixture is jellylike, about one hour. Pour into glasses and when cold cover with paraffin.

Lemon Marmalade—Take one dozen lemons. Cut the rinds into thin slices after washing carefully. Discard all seeds and weigh; for each pound of fruit add one pint of water, let stand overnight. In the morning let the water boil and boil for one and a half hours for each pound of fruit. Put the rinds in a small cross-hatched bag and boil until the fruit is soft. When the white is thick and translucent pour into glasses and when cold cover with paraffin.

Corn-Meal Marmalade—Cook corn meal in the heavy iron skillet a few minutes but not cooked, adding some of the bits of the cooked tomato flesh mixed with the sugar. Boil for one hour in a small bread pan to hold slice and is in butter until brown.

Do We Appreciate Gulls?

Nothing to Do With Horses

Frequently a thing or ill-fitted lap-top is described as "a mare's nest," but it is doubtful if the user of that phrase has any definite idea of its meaning. Certainly "mare" in this case has nothing to do with horses. It is really a corruption of "Mara," a paleontological creature who, according to tradition, possessed a store or nest filled with wonderful jewels to excite the envy of others.

This particular demon may never have existed, but it undoubtedly influenced our speech, for whenever we refer to "nightmares" are a colossal unconsciously paying tribute to him.

Sugar Trees

The bureau of plant industry says that there is an sugar tree in this country. There is a sugar palm which grows in tropical countries. All the tropics have sweet sap, but from only a few species have sugar and sugar been produced in large quantities. The sugar maple (Acer saccharum) and the black maple (Acer saccharum nigricum) are the only trees used for this purpose. 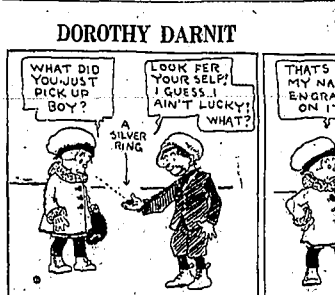

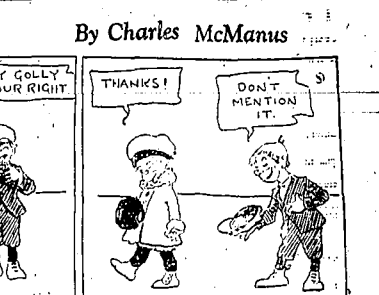

Oleo Bill Passes House But Opposition Forecast in Senate

Passage by the state house of the oleo bill by a vote of 42 to 15 was one of the important accomplishments of the first week in the legislature.

The bill provides for a license of \$200 on wholesalers and \$100 on retailers. These provisions aroused the strong opposition of some representatives of dairy interests in the state as well as of dairymen.

The house passed a bill by Representative J. L. Hudgin of Twin Falls county eliminating the necessity of visiting a tailor before there could be a conviction of the minor delinquency.

An appropriation bill of more than \$800,000 for state operating expenses and another one of \$2,000,000 for operation of state roads were passed during the week.

The house also passed a bill requiring a bill of sale to be shown for every motor vehicle. An amendment is not on the annual ship.

The state supreme court will hear an appeal from the county commissioners' order for monthly instead of quarterly meetings.

Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company will receive a special appropriation of \$10,000 to be used for that purpose in Idaho.

Twenty-two other Idaho towns are included on the present extension program. Boise gets the largest amount, totaling \$70,000 for office equipment and extension.

A new two-story brick building will be erected in Twin Falls at a cost of \$65,000, with cable reeving and extension facilities.

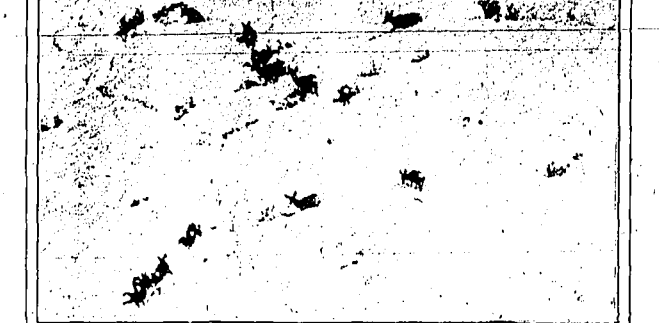

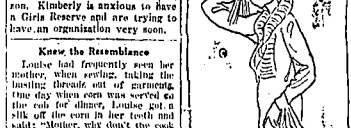
