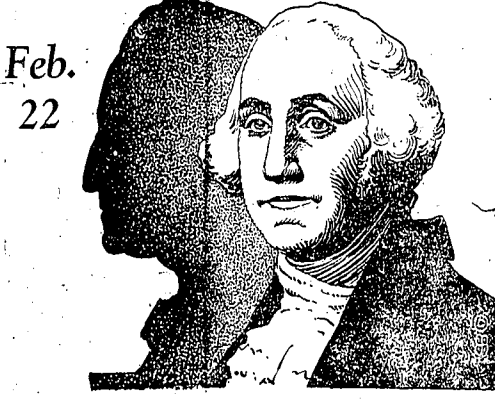

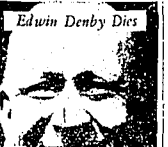

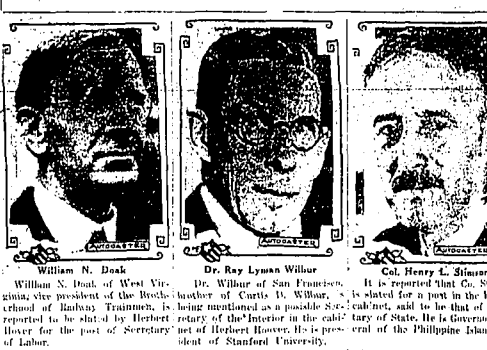

Among influences at work against a high protective tariff, said the President of the American Tariff League last year, was the American farmer.

Now we see how well the tariff forces are opposing those whose beliefs are contrary to their own. Until a few months ago it seemed that any revision of tariff, save in the case of farm products, would be downward.

By using the Hoover argument that a higher tariff is the foundation of farm relief, the protectionists spread the word that sweeping upward revisions are necessary all along the line to save American industry from foreign competition.

And so manufacturing chemists asked for increases in the chemical schedule ranging from 30 to 100 per cent. Other industries are sure to be heard from.

The pretext of helping the farmer, it seems, is being employed to get a general boost on manufactured products—and the farmer will have to pay his share of the cost, as always.

KITCHEN ART

No, we are not referring to the culinary art. "Kitchen Art" is just what we mean—and there is such a thing.

At least so thinks the Art Alliance of America, which has announced a competition for designs to glorify that ancient and honorable institution internationally known as the kitchen sink.

Sunday School Lesson

International Sunday School Lesson for February 21, CHRISTIANITY GROWTH

John 1:40-42 Matthew 16:16-18; Luke 21:15-19; 2 Peter 3:18; Rev. Samuel L. Frier, D. D.

Ideals are actualized in order to make them practical. We have now had seven lessons in this quarter which present great truths in the Christian religion. Today we observe how these facts can be made real life. Peter is chosen as the special example. At the beginning, he was quite like the average fisherman on Galilee. His human nature is evident throughout and thus he becomes the more helpful to us.

In addition to the passages of Scripture included in our reading, the following are also to be studied in the present lesson: Luke 24:42; Ephesians 4:1-6; Philippians 1:6, 9-11; Colossians 1:10; 11; Hebrews 6:1-3. Theological lessons have an added value because they require constant reference to the Bible.

Andrew is the man who introduced us to Simon, his brother. Both John and Andrew were followers of John the Baptist until Jesus came. They then turned to the superior Teacher. Andrew is convinced that Jesus is the long looked for Messiah after spending the day with Him. At once he seeks his own brother and tells the startling news. Simon comes to observe and ends with an open friendship for the Nazarene who speaks prophetically of his work and gives him the name of Peter, signifying the nature of the work he will carry forward in establishing the Kingdom on earth.

Some months later Peter is born to the good number who are called to become disciples, which means learners. Later he was selected as one of the Twelve and with an apostle's name sent forth. Their real schooling began for the rest of his life. Jesus was the training class with Jesus as the Master teacher. After about two and a half years of general and

special instruction a quiz class was held at Casares Phillip when Jesus asked the blunt question, "Who do men say that the Son of man is?" OLEOMARGARINE BILL IS PASSED IN THE SENATE

Leading Grange Bill Now Needs Only Governor's Signature to Become Law; Other Farm Bills Fail.

The approval of the oleomargarine bill by the senate, 28 to 14, was the outstanding piece of legislation considered this week in the state legislature. It was first predicted after the house passed the measure, 42 to 15, that it would meet with strong opposition in the senate. It did, but after half a day's argument Tuesday it was passed with a statement from Senator Mitchell of Canyon county that it would be well to give it a trial for two years to find out whether it would prove as much of a success as many interests as its supporters contended it would do.

The bill provides for a 22 cent fee on wholesale dealers in oleomargarine, and \$50 on retailers. It was championed by Senator Barrett of Gooding county and Senator Mitchell of Canyon county who declared its merits had been tried and not found wanting in the state of Montana.

By a dozen propositions which it opposes for the same reason that such matters, if adopted, would lessen that condition of economic warfare.

It is interesting to note that several proposals included in the general policy adopted at Washington are being fulfilled in the Twin Falls Empire. Among them are the extension of electric power to rural farm homes; continued and more thorough study of the leaf hopper problem; construction of rural roads that will enable farmers to reach their marketing centers to better advantage; adjustment of freight rates that will allow larger profits possible on exportable products.

These advantages are being gained in Twin Falls region at this time, an indication that farmers here are accomplishing those things which the National Farm Grange stands for.

COMPLETE ROAD PROGRAM WILL COST MILLIONS

Less Than Half Finished Now at Cost of \$35,000,000; Increase in Traffic Causes Reconstruction.

With \$35,000,000 already spent on Idaho's highway program, that much more will be needed to complete it, according to Jas. Wood, commissioner of public works, who submitted his biennial report to the legislature this week.

The urgent enactment of legislation that will curb the encroachment of "hot dog" stands, service stations and other road vending stations which are becoming more numerous all the time.

Of the 417 miles of state roads designated for improvement and construction at the beginning of the biennium, 1740 miles have been graded and 550 miles graded, with 300 miles of highway still.

The sum of \$2,450,000 was budgeted during the biennium for construction and filling of state roads, and by those completed to date, Commissioner Wood reported, motorists have been saved \$450,000 a year in operating expense.

He advised that the time has come when reconstruction on some of the state highways must begin, since the constantly increasing traffic has brought them into a condition needing repair.

Grading of the highway through Gooding to Twin Falls via Filer was included in the state department's road program for this year.
