THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH
Mark 4:26-32; Ephesians 1:22-24

Jesus had done very few miracles. He did announce principles which would determine right action under varying circumstances. No charitable organization was established to carry forward His program. During the three years and three months of public ministry Jesus called disciples around Him in a school of the living God. From among those learners to be were inducted into the mysteries of the Kingdom of God.

Care Should Be Used in Brakes

High speed, balloon tires and four wheel brakes, combine to make the driver of a modern automobile as the sudden drop of the wheel from four to two inches and the heavy road drag of a flat tire. The driver is completely off the road. This is the advice of R. V. Washburn, manager of the Western Auto Supply company.

"Brakes should never be applied suddenly if a flat tire occurs while the car is moving at high speed," says Mr. Washburn. "There is a natural tendency on the part of the driver to quickly apply the brakes as he attempts to stop the car before the tire is ruined."

"But to increased road traction, sudden application of the brakes seems to have the greatest effect on the wheel that carries the flat tire. If a front tire collapses, the steering gear cannot hold the car from following the wheel and an upset in the right wheel occurs."

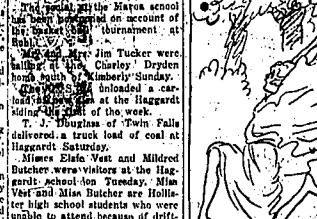

EXPERTS TELL BEST WAY TO RUN CREAMERY

Two New Pamphlets Point Out Most Common Causes of Failure in Operating Milk and Cheese Plants.

Two pamphlets just published by the bureau of dairy industry, United States department of agriculture, are "Miscellaneous Publication 37-1," by William White, who considers "essential for the successful operation of a creamery," and "Miscellaneous Publication 12-2," by H. L. Wilson, who discusses "points to consider in establishing a cheese factory."

"The average operating expense for the group making less than 100,000 pounds of butter a year was 6.75 cents a pound," says Mr. White, "whereas that for the group making from 200,000 to 250,000 pounds was approximately 6.4 cents. At the creameries making more than 250,000 pounds the expense decreased still further, but not so rapidly."

From this, Mr. White concludes that a local creamery should have a minimum output of 100,000 pounds of butter a year, which would require nearly equal average cows.

It is sometimes concluded that in sections where dairying is in its infancy it is necessary to build a creamery and this practice is a mistake for cream in order to induce the farmer to buy dairy cows.

"Some plants have been started on this basis," Mr. White says, "and have been successful, but the likelihood for failure is much greater than for 'backlogs' because with a very small output, the unit cost of operation is very high; consequently the price the creamery can pay for milk is correspondingly low, so that it will tend to discourage rather than encourage dairying."

Mr. Wilson finds "the chief cause of these factory failures is an inadequate supply of milk. This may be due to an insufficient number of cows with a reasonable milking allowance, or being located in a section where the prevailing prices paid by nearby processors are higher than a cheese factory can pay."

MERCHANTS TO STAGE FOURTH OF JULY EVENT

C. D. Thomas Tells Value of Advertising to Develop Further the Twin Falls Project.

At a meeting sponsored by the merchants' bureau of the Twin Falls chamber of commerce Monday night it was agreed to arrange an Independence Day celebration in previous years, with a full program of patriotic exercises, etc. Committees will be appointed a little later to arrange the details.

Another matter discussed was the closing hour for business. Stores have closed at 9 o'clock the last two months. Sentiment was about equally divided among those present at this meeting and to get a larger expression, Chairman R. P. Robinson of the Merchants' bureau was authorized to appoint a special committee to sound out opinion among business people of town as to whether to continue to close at 9 o'clock, or at 10 o'clock, as has been the custom.

Secretary Newell Wright expressed the big end system of checking solicitors if the interest



of local business houses. Out of 76 applications made to the chamber during the year, all but 15 per cent had been referred on the grounds that the solicitors represented out-of-town enterprises, or were otherwise undesirable.

The value of advertising to bring about community development was told in a graphic way by C. D. Thomas, president of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce. He said that at the first filing of bids for the Twin Falls tract there were only 25 persons present, in consequence of which, believing the project would not obtain, Mr. Hill told it to go. Under its provisions, the income from all bonds, notes, stocks, mortgages and other income-producing securities, with the exception where the corporation pays the tax on its earnings.

Provisions for corporations include salaries and wages, and provided the names and addresses of all persons receiving more than \$800 annually are reported, ordinary and irregular over-income taxes within the state. U. S. tax contributions, "one class" of dividends and amounts distributed to patrons.

For taxpayers other than corporations deductions include salaries and wages paid to persons engaged in carrying on business, providing all payments to employees of more than \$800 annually are reported; ordinary and necessary expenses; losses not covered by insurance; U. S. taxes; interest on an existing debt provided the amount, form of debt and name and address of creditor are given. No deduction is allowed for personal, living or family expenses.

In determining net income the following exemptions are allowed: U. S. pensions; inheritances and gifts; insurance from death claims (except corporation insurance on lives of employees); \$800 for single persons; \$1000 for husband and wife; \$300 for each minor child and any amount for educating a child over 18 up to \$300.

The tax on persons is 2 per cent for the first thousand dollars of net income or any part of it. This is increased on each additional thousand until the tax on the sixth thousand or any part of it is 6 per cent which is the maximum. Corporations are taxed at substantially the same rate.

The law makes the state auditor or the state tax commissioner and gives him power to appoint deputies. The commissioner or his deputies determine the net income of the taxpayer, and all persons having a net income of \$800 if single or \$1000 if married must file a return. The law includes provision for making false returns also penalty on officers or employees for divulging information from returns. All returns are confidential. Where they deem it necessary the tax commissioner or his deputies may make investigations of any taxpayer. There are also provisions for appeals to the state courts, including the supreme court.

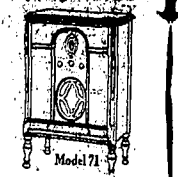

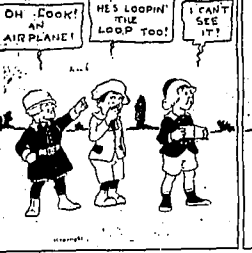

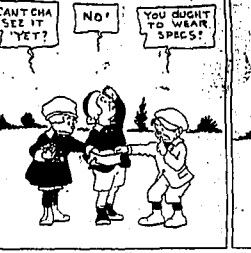
