Meningitis to Be Eradicated

A district medical director of the United States public health service has been assigned to Twin Falls county to aid the state and county officers in eradicating meningitis. A request for this service was made by Representative Addison T. Smith during his recent visit here and the state gave its approval to the cooperation by the federal health department.

As a result, cultures taken of high school students this week also proved positive and were promptly given treatment. These were all in the elementary grades, no reactions occurring to tests of high school students.

The cultures were taken at Filer and Marion Wednesday, and Twin Falls high school students will submit to the tests this week, and further cultures may be taken after a conference with the federal health officer who will come here.

Idaho Has New Dairy Director

Bills passed by the last legislature are being rapidly taken care of, either by the governor's approval or veto.

Among several bills which he has signed this week were two of interest to dairymen. One of these provides for a permanent director of dairying and the other provides for a higher creamery license to raise funds with which to meet the inevitable dairymen's expenses.

The assistant will do field work entirely, checking up on health tests made by the cream buyers as a basis for paying the producers. George N. Tucker, chief director, is drawing plans for this work which is intended to benefit Idaho's dairy industry in general.

The large dairies are strongly in favor of close supervision, Mr. Tucker said, on the theory that it tends to increase the confidence of the cream producers. He believes the small dairies and cream buyers will also approve supervision as a means of eliminating unfair practices of competition, which are sometimes evident.

While it was agreed to hold the fair, no action was taken in regard to finances, as the recent legislature passed a bill designed to give state support to the Ada county exhibition with the view of making it a state fair eventually. This bill is now with the governor, his signature awaited before the local officials in Ada county determine what further steps to take.

If the governor signs the bill, the commissioners will have enlarged powers in appointment of the fair board, a manager and making other arrangements. Mr. Keenan was one of those who favored holding an Idaho state fair as suggested at Boise last fall.

LONG FREE TRIP IS OFFERED TO H. S. STUDENTS

District Meet Will Be Held in Twin Falls Next Friday in National Oratorical Contest.

A district contest for high school student competitors in the national oratorical contest will be held in Twin Falls Friday, March 22, according to Principal U. N. Terry. He mailed notices Tuesday to all the high schools of the territory and expects nine or ten to be present.

The national oratorical contest has been arranged for the benefit of high school students. The subject is the United States Constitution and students may take any phase of it for their theme. They held their theme to the constitution.

Meningitis Is Well in Hand

Dr. L. D. Fricks, director of the sixth district of the United States health service at Seattle, expected to leave Twin Falls Sunday for other towns where he will investigate meningitis conditions. A preliminary inspection here revealed that the state and county officials are handling the situation in a very satisfactory way, as he said, leaving no necessity for him to supervise the work.

Throat cultures are being taken from students in three or five towns of the county, locating the source of meningitis and enabling the health officers to eradicate the disease. The infectious germs may remain with carriers several weeks before they disappear. Dr. Fricks reported, "that meningitis is prevalent over many parts of the country, being especially troublesome in those places that have been stormy and wet. He advised continued caution against contact with persons who sneeze, cough, laugh or otherwise may spread the germs unknowingly."

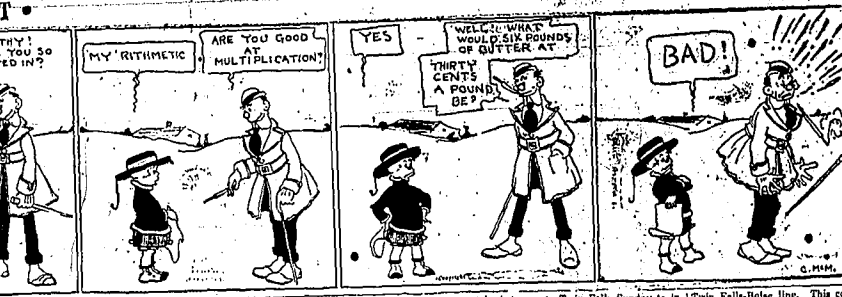

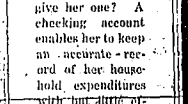

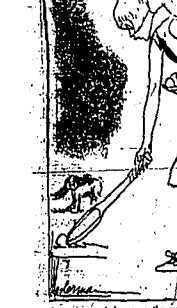
