## SPUD ACREAGE

In the opinion of Irel Gudmundsen of Hurley, president of the Idaho Potato Bureau, spud growers of the Gem state are not planning to curtail their production much below that of 1928. While some reports indicate prospective large decreases in the potato acreage and while many potato growers are advising their neighbors to plant such likely crops as beets, they are making ready to plant as large a crop of potatoes as ever, he says, with the prospect of prices being no more favorable than they were for the heavy over production of last year.

It is a peculiarity among farmers to try to break in with a heavy production of some particular crop when they think their neighbors are laying off and planning to grow something else. Thus it was with tobacco growers of the south who produced the greatest tobacco crop they ever raised in the very year when they had agreed to curtail their production to a low scale. Every man thought the others were going to reduce and he planned accordingly to grow a big crop and reap the harvest of high prices for the low supply.

The same situation confronts Idaho potato growers this year. While President R. E. Shepherd of the state chamber of commerce, and other officials, have advised a reduction of 20 or 25 per cent, and reports indicate in some instances that this will be done, farmers are in reality making no such plans. Mr. Gudmundsen believes. He recommends a reduction of 25 per cent in the potato acreage this year if the growers are to receive a fair profit for their 1929 crop.

You imagine the trainer dashing out on the football gridiron, not with the usual water bottle and sponge, but with a carton of cigarettes. A deep inhalation of tobacco smoke, not years of practice, it would appear, enabled the noted golfer to sink that long putt. That celebrated tennis player, may seem winded after the fierce set he has finished, but you may infer from what he says about the cigarettes he recommends, that if he had not been puffing them regularly, officials would have had to work over him with a putulator.

New and strange methods of training, these. The men who in their boyhood used to collect the cigarette pictures without any testimonials do not understand such claims. Neither do most of the reputable and successful athletic trainers now in the game.

As for athletes in school and college today and the youngsters who are the athletes of tomorrow, they look at the pictures of their heroes and their paeans about cigarettes, and they wonder. Those fulsome words contradict the stories of the boys who broke training by smoking and missed their chance to make the team. They don't jibe with the advice of the boy's own coaches and fathers.

Why do the athlete heroes say what they do about cigarettes, then? Could it be that they do for money? If that's so, it seems like a pretty mean way for a hero to let a fellow down.

#### HEZEKIAH LEADS HIS PEOPLE

BACK TO GOD

2 Chronicles 30:1-10, 25-27

It is bad enough for the individual to drift into wickedness, but the general situation is far worse when the ruler of a nation is morally promiscuous and unscrupulous. This was the case in Judah under King Ahaz. The worship of Jehovah was spurned and the people were led into wickedness, with the immoral conditions that attended such deviation. Isaiah's entreaties to turn to and trust God had been ridiculed and the people were under the heavy tribute to the king of Assyria. Meanwhile the Northern Kingdom, which had been in its course and Assyrian captivity really.

Hezekiah was the good son of a bad father. Here in the signal instance of a child being superior to his environment, and pure in spite of the filth in home and community. All credit to the boys and girls of today who refuse to be dragged down to the level of all the immoralities who surround them. 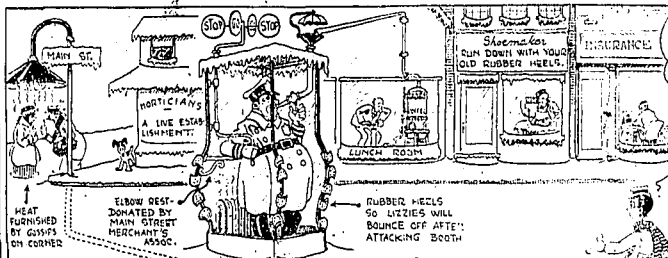
