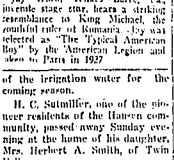

## REVERSE THE PROCESS

President Hoover recently declared that the solution of the problem of law enforcement was more vital to the preservation of American institutions than any other question. All crime, from murder to forgery, he said, had increased in the United States to the point where life and property were relatively more unsafe than in any other civilized country in the world. "We are not suffering from an ephemeral crime wave but from a subsidence of our foundations," he said.

A surprising number of our people, otherwise of responsibility in the community, have drifted into the extraordinary notion that laws are made for those who choose to obey them. And in addition, our law enforcement machinery is suffering from many infirmities arising out of its technicalities, its circumlocutions, its involved procedures, and too often, I regret, from inefficient and delinquent officials.

"What we are facing today is the possibility that respect for law is fading from the sensibilities of our people. Whatever the value of any law may be, the enforcement of that law written in plain terms upon our statutes books is not, in my mind, a debatable question: Law should be observed and must be enforced until it is repealed by the proper processes of our democracy. The duty to enforce the law rests upon every public official and the duty to obey it rests upon every citizen."

President Hoover is right. The remedy is not in the passage of more legislation further restricting law abiding citizens on the theory that this will curb the crook. Each new law passed makes more law-breakers and less enforcement.

We must reverse the process and have more enforcement and less legislation if we would reduce crime and create respect for law.

## FARMERS VALUE ELECTRIC APPLIANCES

The American farmer wants electric service, not only for what it will do on the farm, but because of its importance in making rural life more comfortable and complete, says F. D. Farrell, president of the Kansas State Agricultural college.

In a recent survey of 324 electrified farms, according to Mr. Farrell, it was found that 100 per cent of the farmers had electric lights in the home, 71 per cent had lights in their barns, 89 per cent used electric irons and 69 per cent had electric washing machines.

Other electric labor saving appliances were found in large numbers.

The farmer is manifesting as great an interest in the social values of electric appliances as in machinery for lessening or expediting farm work. In the past, rural life has suffered in comparison with urban existence only because of the lack of modern living comforts. Electricity is rapidly changing this.

From a dream a few years ago, farm electrification has become a proven fact. It is, to a great extent, out of the experimental stage. Each year thousands of additional farmers are enjoying the civilizing benefits of electricity with its saving in time, effort and money.

## LACQUER, NOT LIQUOR!

Major T. P. Walker of the Commercial Solvents Company of Terre Haute, Ind., speaking before the American Chemical Society's annual meeting at Ohio University, said 10,000,000 bushels of corn annually, a quarter of the amount formerly made into spirituous liquors, now goes into lacquers.

Corn, cotton-seed and milk, he brought out, are four of the most important industrial chemicals produced on the farm.

Corn crops, once converted into whiskey, still go into alcohol, but it is butyl and ethyl, for lacquer. Another corn lacquer product is acetone.

More than fifty chemical products, he said, are derived from the corn kernel. They include such things as table oil, soap and glycerine, rubber substitute, fertilizer, starch, corn syrup, tanner's sugar and vegetable glue.

Eleven companies in the United States are engaged in manufacture of corn products such as starch, corn syrup, corn sugar and corn oil. About 85,000,000 bushels, one-third of the corn that reaches the primary market is employed in this industry.

It is estimated that the nine States in the corn belt yield enough stalks annually for 12,000,000 tons of paper. But it is probable that it would not prove economical to utilize them except in the most favorable location because of the cost of collecting and transporting such bulky material. Processes for chemical utilization of the cornob have been worked out, but here, again, the problem of commercial oils, synthetic stearin, soaps and soap collecting comes in.

Chemicals now produce refined powders, nitro-glycerine, roofing joint writing paper, celluloid, rayon, photographic film, sausage casings, nitro-cellulose, smokeless powder, gun cotton, lacquers, artificial leather, toilet ware, furfural, carbohydrates and potash. The cotton plant is used in lacquering, dyeing, printing, water-proofing and incineration.

The sugar industry produces ethyl alcohol and insulating board. From milk, casein, the solid part, is used in glue, adhesive for wooden airplane propellers, etc.

These commercial developments are slow and though the chemist is not "The Messiah come to save the farmer," yet he is making great strides in agriculture.

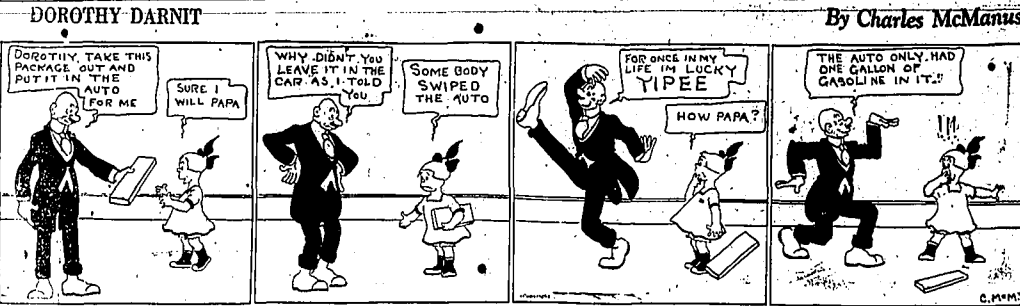

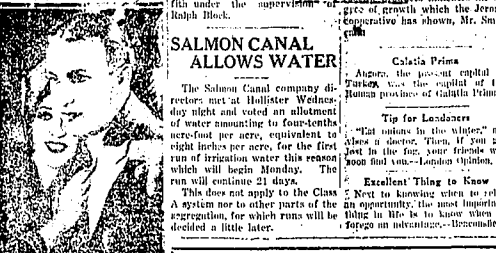
