SUMMER CARE OF THE SHEEP FLOCK

Blowfly is One of Most Persistent Trouble Makers.

With the coming of warm, dry weather we also have certain pests to combat and the blowfly is one of the most persistent trouble makers in the good old summer time. So it is well to be prepared for it. As a preventive use some good kerosene on the sheep. Spray all the wool and the face of the sheep to keep flies away. In doing this, the face should be washed with clean water and the wool should be kept clean and dry during its time.

Should you find maggots developed on the sheep, some gasoline poured on the spot will kill them, but do not raise the wool to fall out. Should you be able to find a fly on the sheep, a mixture of kerosene and the alkali will be effective. Follow up the treatment with a little kerosene to avoid a second attack. Once the fly gets in its coat, the same advice seems to be more applicable to its ravages. Just a stain on the wool will often be the source of infection. If not taken care of promptly, we always keep some hot kerosene with a little soap and a can of the best sheep dip and some gasoline handy in hot weather. Gasoline will also be a relief from maggots and cause no harm, but it evaporates very quickly, and must be followed up with kerosene remedy that is a little repellent. This works to keep the flies away from the sheep's face.

Should you notice a sheep limping, see if there is any scald on the foot, or possibly you may find a broken horn. We have some cases of scald on the feet and scald on the horns, give kerosene. Also you will find a little scald on the feet between the toes, this sometimes becomes scalded and always causes lameness. When it does appear, the contents of the opening oil and the trouble disappears.

Live Stock Farming is Sure to Pay Dividends

Diversified stock farming is one of the best methods of getting the most out of the land. It includes the raising of various kinds of livestock, such as sheep, cattle, and hogs, and also the raising of various kinds of poultry, such as chickens, turkeys, and ducks. This method of farming is sure to pay dividends in the long run, as it allows the farmer to take advantage of the various seasons and to produce a variety of products for the market.

Manicuring Cattle to Save Much Discomfort

Cattle kept in the stable or in yards often suffer discomfort from the growth of over the hooves of the hooves. This is due to lack of wear, which is caused by the hooves being kept in a fixed position of the hooves. This discomfort and pain may be relieved by manicuring the hooves. Hooves that are particularly hard and brittle may be softened by soaking them in a solution of caustic soda. This should be done once a week, and the hooves should be kept in good condition at all times.

About two pounds of cooked potatoes with straw and hay constitute a satisfactory allowance for sheep. Shred raw potatoes may be fed if they are free from disease and dirt.

The farmer who keeps 20 head cows and averages four lbs. of butter can barely compete with the farmer who keeps 25 sows and averages eight pigs in the litter. 200 pigs being produced in each case.

THE NEW DEMOCRATIC MANAGER

A man with boundless optimism has taken up headquarters in Washington with but one purpose in mind—to make of the Democratic party on a 365-day basis, and verily the organization functioned on a 365-day basis.

He is J. J. Shouse, sent to Washington by Chairman John J. Raskob with instruction to make the party show some life.

Within 12 hours after he had received his mandate from the chairman of the Democratic party, Shouse was ensconced in a private office under photographs of four Democratic presidents, answering telephone calls and dictating telegrams.

Tall, square shoulders and good looking, Shouse is regarded as the one man who can come near to the party's hope of attaining national unity and perhaps the one best fitted to harmonize the conflicting and discordant elements in the ranks of Democracy.

"There is not a string tied to me," he said when he took over the management of headquarters. "I am not here to boss the leaders of the party or say what must be done. I am the manager."

"I don't propose to recognize any factional differences. I want this office to be a place where all Democrats may meet in fellowship. My attitude is, let's forget everything unpleasant that happened in the last election and look to the future."

Shouse is 49 years old, well acquainted with political leaders and regarded as a "good party man." In 1920 and 1924 he was one of the most ardent workers for McAdoo, and in the last presidential campaign he was a member of the advisory committee to Alfred E. Smith.

His home is in Kansas City, and he first became interested in politics in 1908. He has served in the Kansas state senate, and served in the sixty-fourth congress.

Shouse's committee work in whipping the federal farm loan act and amendments to the federal reserve act into shape led to his appointment by President Wilson as assistant secretary of the treasury to handle the department of internal revenue.

The congressional elections next year are his immediate objective. Shouse hopes by that time to have developed a substantial framework for the organization he envisions, an organization built around a compact headquarters staff publicity bureau and research unit.

Organization, publicity and research are to be the three functions of the headquarters under his management.

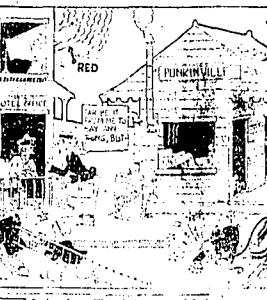

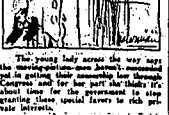

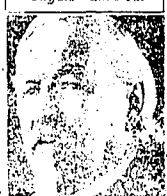
