**TONNAGE INTO COUNTY IN 1929 GETS NEW MARK**

Chamber of Commerce Secretary Analyzes "Tribute" of Freight on Last Year's Carlot Receipts.

From the statement of carloads of all materials and merchandise imported into Twin Falls County during the year 1928, as shown by statement just received at the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce from the general freight agent of the Union Pacific Railroad company, a substantial gain is shown over the tonnage of the previous year. The following comparison is shown in the tabulations below.

Building materials show a decided advance. The items of cement, lime, lumber, stone, sand, rock and tile received in 1928 were 1,227 carloads, while in 1929 figures show 1,018 carloads total of the same products received.

Merchandise, including clothing, shoes, hardware, and other goods, showed a gain as is represented by a total of 524 carloads of items received in 1929 as compared with 465 carloads for 1928.

There are also decided increases represented in the receipt of cereals and oil. And the grand total for 1929 shows a gain of 1,000 carloads over the 1928 total.

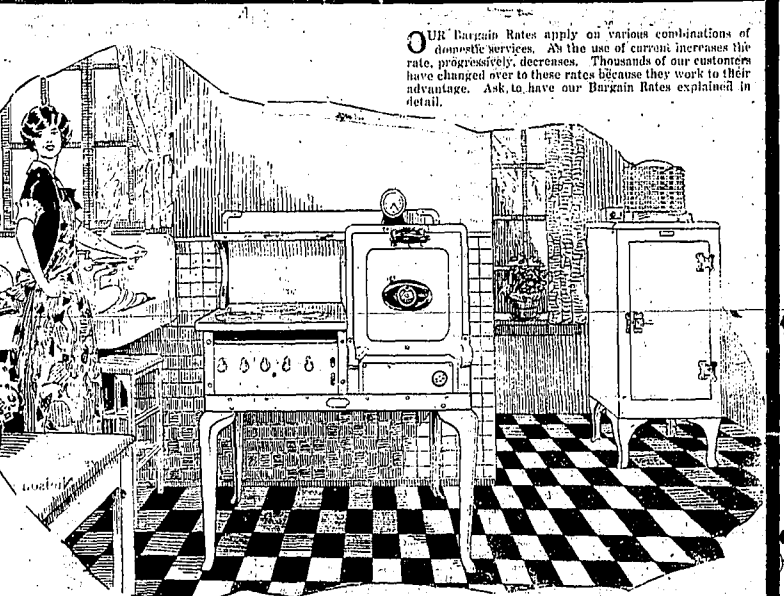

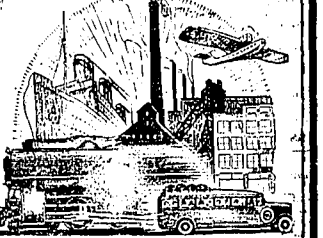

NINETY MILES FROM TOWN

By An Idaho Homesteader's Wife in Farm and Fireside Perhaps some of your readers would care to hear a little something about the joys and trials of two present-day pioneers.

Jack and I had been married four years when we decided a change was imperative. I was struggling to come back after three years of invalidism, and my husband was waging an ever-loosening fight against a steady physical decline due to shell shock in the lines. It was either quit the city entirely or an application to a government hospital for him. Anything was better than that, for such a program meant separation.

So we quit with a vengeance.

Our homestead is 90 miles from the nearest town, far up in the Idaho mountains, a little better than 7,000 feet in altitude. It is a pretty place, the last rack in a chain of isolated little homes extending up a narrow fertile river valley. We are fifteen miles from the nearest automobile road. A rural route, relayed through two inland stations, comes out to the end of the road twice a week and about every week or ten days we make the trip, on horseback. After the mail. All our supplies have to be brought in on horseback as well, for as yet we have no road. Just a narrow winding mountain trail.

Our nearest neighbors are a couple of men who are ranching four miles down the valley. The closest woman is twenty miles in the winter and eight in the summer. The latter takes her brood of sturdy young Americans twenty-five miles down the valley, during the winter months, to a cabin they have there beside the tiny log schoolhouse. I have gone better than six months without seeing another woman. At the present writing I have seen but one woman in the past nine months. Truly a record for a girl who never lived in the country before.

A small one-room log cabin is our home, but really so cozy if you could see it. We are just on the edge of a large forest reserve and the scenery is inspiring. No man ever beheld a more beautiful country—dense pine forests and above them, snow-crowned peaks glistening in the sunlight against a deep blue sky; mountain streams roaring with the spring freshets or skipping tunefully along over the rocks in the later summer; game and fish in abundance, wild flowers whose beauty and profusion it would be hard to describe; and, over and above all, a long cold white winter.

Our garden is a problem and a question. As I glance out upon its rows, of new green I ask myself the ever-recurring question, "Will it bear this year?"

We are so high, it frosts every month in the year and sometimes freezes. Our radishes and lettuce are about ready to eat. The beets, carrots, peas, onions and turnips—all we try to grow—are just nicely out of the ground. Does not that sound backward? But when you consider it was well into June before we dared chance planting them it is not such a bad start as it at first appears.

On the Fourth of July, three days ago, Jack and I, with a tempting lunch, set out for our little natural hot-water bathing, pool half a mile away. We were determined to express our patriotism fittingly, even though our sole audience consisted of picket pins and blue jays and one black'deer, who eyed us unconcernedly from across the river. The sky was overcast and the day was not warm, for we wore our coats. Before we were finished with our picnic dinner the sun came out with a flourish and it was so hot we waited for a cloud. After a dip in our pool the sky grew dark again and we hastened for home and shelter. Using our best efforts we did not quite make it. Rain, sleet, snow and hail all descended upon us, one gust after another, in the space of ten minutes. So thick it was we could scarcely see the cabin until we were almost upon it. I had picked an armful of wild roses and some enormous bluebells and nearly froze my hands trying to carry them home.

That night it wound up with a rousing frost. We found a quarter of an inch of ice over our small irritating pond in the morning, where we buck up the water from a spring for our garden. If we had not covered our vegetable garden with rows of old burlap and a wagon tarp I would not now be looking at its mounting greenness. Now if anyone celebrated the nation's birthday in a more varied manner I would like to compare notes with him.

Almost every night the coyotes howl around the cabin and I often hear the eerie screech of a mountain lion. Deer, anywhere from one to forty, are to be seen almost every day, some of them coming nearly down to the cabin; if it were not for the dog I believe they would come on the porch.

But we have achieved the prime aim we held in view at our coming and so are happy. I am quite well now and Jack is slowly but surely coming back. Brown as a nut, for he spends every waking hour, out of doors, and with a new-found strength, he resembles but little the tall pale young man who first took up his seemingly hopeless battle against a shattered constitution.

It has been a bitter struggle to make ends meet but we have done it somehow—and are harder for the fight. The world of civilization seems very far away but if we can grasp and hold our health it is a loss that carries a big compensation.

We are still young, full of energy, enthusiastic and hope, frankly and completely in love, and trying to
