Idaho Exports Drop in Year

HOISE.—Inspection of perishable products shipped from Idaho to western markets showed a decline of nearly 2,000 carloads during the fiscal year which ended Monday, reported L. C. Schultz, federal supervisor of inspection, Tuesday. The total inspection for the year was 21,732 carloads, as

compared with 24,011 during the preceding 12 months.

Schultz attributed the decline to the falling off in potato shipment, which were valued at 10,000 cars less in the last fiscal year than in the preceding.

Inspection during June totaled 2,014 carloads as compared with 2,229 in the same month a year ago. This decline was due, said Schultz, to the late cherry crop in Lewiston, the latest on record. The shipments for the month were four cars of cherries, nine of lettuce and 292 of potatoes.

COOPERATIVES' RESPONSIBILITY

Federal farm loan funds under the new agricultural marketing act by which the federal farm board will function will be made only to cooperative associations. Advisory committees will be appointed by the federal farm board to assist in regulating the crop situation in regard to production and marketing. These advisory committees will be designated by the crops with which they have to deal, such as "Cotton Advisory Committee."

Money will be loaned for the purpose of storing surplus crops, until a time when a profitable market can be obtained; construction of adequate housing facilities for such crops, and to meet other needs that come within the range of the federal farm board marketing action.

The regular term of the farm board members will be six years and the salary will be \$12,000 annually. Advisory committee members will be paid only for the time they spend. Two of the first eight farm board officials will serve two years, two will serve four years, and each of the other four will find their term expired at successive years. Their successors then will be appointed for the full six-year period, except in case of vacancies.

Members are prohibited from speculating on the crops with which they are concerned in regulating the market, the penalty for violation of this principle being a maximum fine of \$10,000 and a maximum jail sentence of 70 years.

Disclosure of confidential information will bring a maximum fine of \$5000 and a five year jail sentence. The same penalty will apply on those convicted of publishing predictions in regard to the cotton crop, other than officially authorized.

Cooperative associations, under the administration farm relief bill, become invested with great responsibilities and opportunities. The entire country is hopeful of the successful functioning of the farm relief bill.

ANOTHER "HOME PRODUCT"

If the present growth of the Mutual Building and Loan association is any criterion, it is destined to make even greater progress this next year. It is entitled to and should do it with the cooperation of the community it is so well serving.

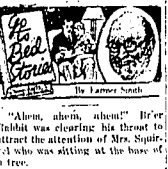


Supper in the Woods

(Continued from Page One) only from sunrise to sunset, or between such hours as may be designated by proper authority. It should be displayed on all national and state holidays and on historic and special occasions. The flag should always be hoisted briskly and lowered slowly and ceremoniously.

"When carried in a procession with another flag or flags, the flag of the United States should be to the right, or, if there is no other flag, the flag of the United States may be in front of the center of that line."

"When displayed with another flag on a wall from separate staffs the flag of the United States should be on the right, the flag's own right, and its staff should be in front of the staff of the other flag."

"When a number of flags are grouped and displayed from staffs, the flag of the United States should be in the center or at the highest point of the group."

"When flags of states or cities or pennants of societies are flown on the same halyard with the flag of the United States, the national flag should always be at the peak."

When flown from adjacent staffs the flag of the United States should be hoisted first. No flag or pennant should be placed above or to the right of the flag of the United States."

"When flags of two or more nations are displayed they should be flown from separate staffs of the same height and the flags should be of approximately equal size."
