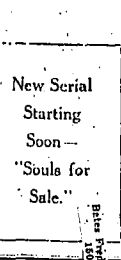

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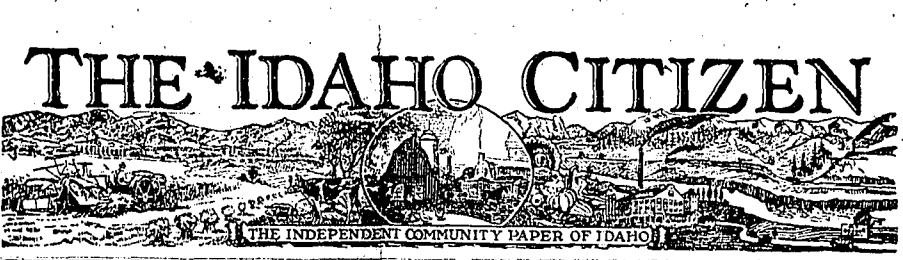

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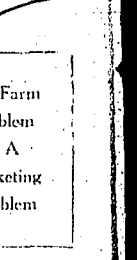

### COUNTY CHARITY

The county commissioners plan on spending another \$3000 this year for the care of indigents, increasing the total outlay for this purpose for the fiscal year to \$19,000, which, for a fiscal year of twelve months, is more than a thousand dollars a month.

### WOMEN'S WEALTH INCREASING

The statistician is always springing surprising things and now he has come out with a new one.

According to figures advanced by one of the tribe of financial statisticians, women now own over forty per cent of the nation's wealth.

Besides, four out of five life insurance dollars will go to women, and seventy per cent of the estates left by men go to women.

It seems as if the wealth of woman is to increase by leaps and bounds, until women will dominate the country financially. This is not at all impossible, in fact everything points to the conclusion that if women keep up their speed in acquiring money they will be far ahead of men in this respect.

Within the past few years, sociologists have been ranting about women's place being the home, and all that sort of thing, never realizing how firmly entrenched women are in the financial life of the land. It isn't even too improbable that in a century or so the tables will be turned and men will be clamoring for equal rights!

### WANTED: A BRAVE MAN

If one touches a toad, one will get warts. So persons have believed for a very long time. Why?

The scientific books on disease of the skin recognize the fact that the cause of warts is unknown. The wart, it is known, represents a thickening of certain layers of skin with projection upward. This process is initiated by an irritation which may be due to poison, to bacteria, to mechanical action or possibly to nerve disturbances.

Says Dr. Morris Fishbein, editor of the Journal of the American Medical Association: "There is one excellent way, however, of proving promptly that touching a toad will not produce warts—that is to set a toad and touch it. It is a safe bet that the warts will not appear in the vast majority of cases when this experiment is tried."

This sounds very convincing. We are modern, progressive, and far from superstitious. Yet . . . we would rather someone else made the test.

### FAIR PREMIUM LIST

The great number of qualifications as listed in the premium list for the 14th annual county fair make it necessary for prospective contestants to closely examine the booklet before making entry in the different departments.

There are a score or more of departments in which there will be competition for awards. In each of these there are many rules and restrictions to apply on entries. People who plan to enter produce or articles of any kind should become familiar with the premium list in order to know what products are excluded and what conditions affect their entry for prize competition.

Copies of the premium list may be obtained from H. W. Graves of Filer, secretary of the fair board.

### A: LEGGE

Alexander Legge of Chicago, president of the International Harvester company until he resigned several days ago to accept the chairmanship of the federal farm board appointed by President Hoover, is considered highly qualified to help the farmers in this job. Born and raised under farm conditions he is regarded as a genuine friend of those who till the soil, as his activities have revealed.

Legge is particularly familiar with farm conditions in general, and specifically, too. His company maintains an elaborate system of correspondence whereby community situations are reported.

Sam Thompson, president of the American Farm federation often calls Legge the "farmer's friend" and a corn baring incident in his life attests to that overworked designation. A few years ago when the bottom went out of the corn market, Legge's concern announced it would accept corn at the last normal quotation in payment of debts. This mere announcement averted the slump.

Of farm conditions, Legge says, "The farmer must receive a better financial return before the farm industry can be a sound and equitable basis."

His program for improvements lines up with that of the president: "Better cooperation among the farmers with respect to production standards and marketing methods, and in more general usage of labor-saving devices and profit-making farm operation equipment."

Legge was on the war industries board during the world conflict and served as an industrial observer at the space conference.

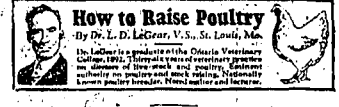

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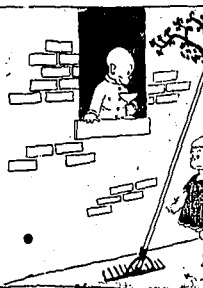

Orchards, Like Dairy Cattle, Showing Greater Efficiency in Production.

WASHINGTON—The annual situation of apple production here maintained in the country in the face of the destruction of millions of trees.

While the number of apple trees in the United States decreased nearly 40 per cent from 1910 to 1925, increased production of fruit has largely offset the decline, it was explained.

The reason, according to M. R. Courter, senior economist in the bureau of agricultural economics, may be laid to the concentration of fruit production on the production of unprofitable orchards and growth of new varieties.

In addition, there has been a change through adoption of cut-and-plant and fertilization practices, interplanting of varieties, and other evidence found by state and federal experimenters to be the best.

A forecast of the 1929 crop reveals that apple production for the United States will likely average 10 per cent less than the 1928 crop, but still substantially larger than the light crop of 1927.

In the western group of states, the Pacific coast and mountain regions, the survey revealed a moderate increase in production during the last 15 years.
