REPORT SHOWS LOWER GRAIN YIELDS IN 1929

Most Major Crops Below Average This Year According to Government Estimates Just Issued.

Decreased yields this season in grain crops below last year's harvest were forecast by the department of agriculture on July 7 conditions.

Of the major grains, only rice was estimated to show an increase in production.

The separate wheat crop estimates were: Winter wheat, 528,000,000 bushels, compared with 578,000,000 harvested last year.

Decreased acreages were indicated in corn, oats, rice, rye and potatoes and increased acreages were planted to wheat, flaxseed, cotton, hay, sweet potatoes, tobacco, beans, peanuts and sugarcane.

Of the crops reported on, increased yields over 1928 were estimated in flaxseed, tame hay, beans, alfalfa and sugar beets.

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# 12 COWS GIVEN AS BEST HERD FOR 80 ACRES

### Study Reveals Most Economical Policy for Dairy Enterprise, 60 Acres Would Be Ample.

For an 80-acre farm, the bulk of which is devoted to the raising of alfalfa, 50 acres of which would be the second crop, a dairying committee in connection with the recent farm survey of this region recommended that a herd of 12 dairy cows be maintained. Methods of dairy farming recommended by the committee were:

Dairy bred cows should be kept with only registered dairy sires at the head of the herd. Bull acquisitions should be farmed to promote good dairy breeding.

"Low producers (less than 20 pounds of butterfat) old cows, cows that are falling and who breeders should be culled out very closely while live prices are high. All good dairy breeders should be retained, fed well to insure proper growth, and breed two cows.

"The basis of feeding must be in the dry lot, and the farmer not depend on pastures. Feed requirements for a cow per annum should be: Six tons of hay (which may alone be fed); 2 tons of hay; 3 1/2 tons of grain or 4 tons of grain; 3 1/2 tons of grain, 1 ton of green corn.

"Cows should freshen in the fall, as it is more profitable than at any other season. Shelter should be provided for dry cows. Warm, dry sheds, closed on three sides, are economical shelter. All milking sheds and stanchions are advisable.

"Individual testing of cows for production, in cooperation with the Extension and buying stations, is suggested.

Many squabs can be traced to dogs, but the best method is to drive with each door held open in turn, until the squab is seen. When it flies, the owner is for the one that needs attention.

# THE SHEPHERD'S CROCKERS

VERY DESIRABLE RATION FOR EWES

**Two Oats and Wheat Bran, Two to One, Starts Milk.**

Two or three weeks previous to lambing, begin giving the ewe grain at the rate of one pound per head per day. A very desirable ration is wheat bran and wheat corn. This will start the milk flow and ewes are apt not to drop their milk.

As soon as a new ewe symptoms of lambing shall appear, she may not be disturbed. In case of twins, the doe may drop a calf but usually away and get up in a day or two, when the lamb gets strong and becomes accustomed to its mother. The ewe and lamb should be put with the part of the flock that is handled.

It will not be necessary very often for the shearer to help in lambing, but the shepherd should have a warm solution of carbolic acid water, 1 to 100, to use at the time the lamb is born. The shepherd should remove the ewe from his nostrils, rub it dry and try to get it warm.

Preventing Thumps Will Insure Little Porkers  
Many cases of thumps in young pigs due to the pressure in the lungs. These worms mature in the intestines. The young worms feed with water and fecal-infecting pigs, rats, etc.; then they pass their waste in the urine and there irritate and sometimes infect the lungs, producing some type of inflammation. The pig worms are coughed up into the throat; then it comes the realization of their presence, with the stomach and intestines, where the Ascaris mature and thus complete the life cycle.

Hot Water Helps  
Porkers Make Gain  
For winter hog production, performers carried on last winter at the Iowa experiment station showed that water in the tank and water heaters paid good dividends in helping the porker make quicker and cleaner gains. Such losses as a small quantity of water to heat the water and are very inexpensive to operate. Pigs having access to three waterers gained 5 per cent more in the same period, the amount of feed 100 pounds of gain was reduced 10 per cent and cost of producing was reduced 15 cents per 100 pounds, or 10 per cent.

### TWIN FALLS' PARKING PROBLEM

The experiment that is going on in Twin Falls in regard to automobile parking on the principal thoroughfares has a number of interesting angles.

Designed to overcome the traffic and congested parking problems, the new ordinance manifestly has for its purpose the welfare and convenience of the greatest number of persons. Whether or not this is being accomplished, depends on the point of view.

The situation now is that cars on Main avenue extending two blocks each way from the Shoshone street intersection and those on Shoshone street a block each way from Main, may be parked for periods no longer than one hour excepting at night.

The result seems to be this: that business men and tradespeople, whose cars formerly occupied the valuable parking spaces in the congested district, now either leave their machines at home or park outside the one-hour zone. Also, persons from out of town, in order to avoid the penalties of over-parking, are seeking more distant places, with the result that during the ordinary day, about one-half the available parking space downtown is vacant.

The complaint against this is (1) that the city presents a deserted appearance to tourists and others who might become impressed with the business-like appearance of Twin Falls; and (2) that farmers and others now seeking to park outside the one-hour zone, find that business men and tradesmen have already usurped this space, or, at least, that many other motorists are likewise seeking these desirable locations. The results are then, that the parking problem is transferred from the center of town to points further out.

The one-hour parking limit in the section named is certainly having the effect of keeping the spaces clear, but is subject to this criticism: that one-hour is too short a period. In the majority of cases an hour does not permit of a person attending a show, eating a leisurely meal, or completing a visit to the dentist, the doctor, or lawyer, much less, providing time to shop.

If one hour is not long enough, what about two hours? A parking limit of two hours in the congested district would drive out the person who wants to park from morning to noon and from noon till night, or the all-day parker. At the same time it would permit visitors to the city to transact their business, whatever it might be, without the necessity of hunting out by-streets, alleys, vacant lots, and other out-of-the-way and distant spots for their cars.

Two hour parking would tend to keep the now vacant places on Main and Shoshone filled; if the argument of seeming activity has any merit, and we doubt it; and would make less competition for the parking space outside the present one-hour zone.

After all, it's a matter of congratulation to the city of Twin Falls that there is a parking problem. It is a tribute to the popularity of the town as a trading center, and to the prosperity of the people who have so many automobiles that they do not know what to do with them.

That a serious attempt is being made to rightly solve the problem by the city administration and officials is good reason for the public assisting in the formulation of an ideal set of parking regulations. The present ordinance has solved some problems, but it has given rise to some unanticipated additional ones that a two hour law might well overcome.

### OLD ORDER CHANGETH

Once upon a time it was ignominious on a farm to take life easy. Custom required that everyone get up early, winter and summer, wear old clothing, do the chores and milking right on time, work long hours, and endure hardships rather than to seek to avoid them.

There is still, and always will be plenty of work and the necessity for sacrificing pleasures, but customs which 20 years ago would have been taboo on the farm are now everyday practice.

Take the single item of parasols. Automobiles have taught us to enjoy shading from the sun's hot summer rays. It used to be that men worked all day in the field with broad-rimmed straw hats for sun-shades. Now the person who needs must ride for hours behind a cultivator or plow, tractor or other implement, finds comfort in a wide-spreading parasol.

How sensible and sane, and how typical this custom is for life on the farm. It is a mark of efficiency and progress to accomplish work with the least expenditure of effort, with the least bodily discomfort, in the shortest space of time, and with the smallest outlay of capital consistent with the possible returns.

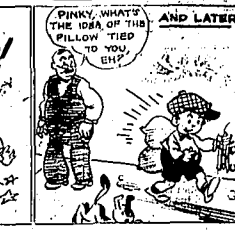
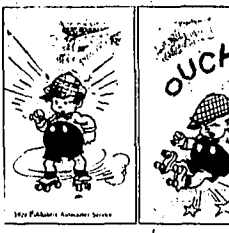

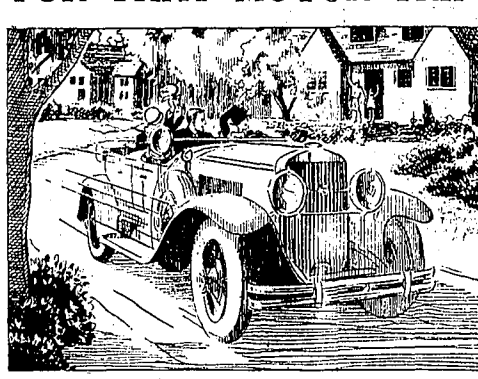

### FOR THAT MOTOR TRIP



"WHEN" we'll pack up our automobiles in the old kit bag, and you'll say, "well, but that's just the way typical of the motor tripper of today? Who doesn't feel a little nervous as he bundles sleeping arrangements, cooking utensils and food into the good old bus and starts out, a happy voyager?"

Regardless of whether your automobile is a touring car or a light truck, you are part of the following story of the motor trip you start.

**Real Camping**

And regardless of whether you plan to camp out at night or spend your resting periods in the comfort of a hotel, there is one thing that you will take, you are war—food. The lightest motor may refuse to move when it reaches a particularly deserted stretch of road or a mountain side. There isn't a nice spot where you can get a bite of the makings of a meal? A can of beans, a can of tomatoes, some crackers or stonopack and perhaps a can of hot brown bread take up very little space, and they are well-kept. Also they can be reheated at any time through which you pass, so you never will be stranded away from town.

If both you and your family prefer the real camper, spending the nights out and doing your own cooking, the supply of canned foods will be greater, carrying with them standard supplies, the supplementing

by fresh foods from villages may be done quickly and satisfactorily. Also you can get the same brands of food in most towns and so know exactly what grade you are purchasing. Flour, fat, sugar, salt and pepper, and evaporated milk are the fundamentals on which the food supply is founded. With the aid of a can of bacon and a box of baking powder, flapjacks and bacon may appear on the menu. Eggs is another essential, and this should be vacuum-packed coffee carried in airtight Mason jars. Many campers prefer to carry condensed milk with them and use it in the coffee, rather than to bother with fresh cream and sugar.

Among the vegetables which will surely appear in the food list are peas, string beans, corn and tomatoes; they may be combined with each other or with fresh foods to make delicious combinations, or you may served alone. In most attractive, baked-beans, kidney beans and lima beans are filling foods which are easily prepared. Other foods which may be bought occasionally, or more often at your carrying capacity are large, are sauerkraut, tomatoes, sweet potatoes, spinach, beans and carrots.

**Fruits for Freshness**

Canned fruits may be eaten just as they come out of the can. Another good method is to heat the pieces of fruit in the fat left from cooking meat and thus serve the hot sauce with the fruit. There is some apple and peaches are particularly well adapted to fit use. Pineapple slices or crushed pineapple may be arranged on a thick slice of ham and cooked in a covered skillet. In purchasing fruits don't forget that the berries and cherries are among those obtainable in cans, as well as figs, grapefruit, grapes, apples, and apple sauce. Surely with such a selection and with the fresh fruit on the market in the summer, no one need lack their sweet freshness.

**Plan for Variety**

Salmon, tuna, mackerel, cod-fish cakes are among the standard canned fish for the trip, and many meats are canned in such a way as to make a real only a matter of opening a can and heating the contents. Did you know that beef may be purchased canned in right different ways: sliced, beefed, corned, dried, roast, stew, it is in loaf, or steak with onions? Chicken may be, long-necked, carved, dried, in a King, or in tins. Veal in loaf or roast; ham, shoulder or loaf or whole; liver with bacon or points.

In planning canned meats, various items be considered carefully, for it is easy to fall into a routine. By buying fresh, such as vegetables such as lettuce, radishes, tomatoes, beans, chickpeas, along the way, buying fresh eggs and meat occasionally, and fresh vegetables, especially fresh peas to be eaten raw, at the towns through which you pass, the family will stay in good health. It is important to drink plenty of pure water and eat plenty of fresh fruit, fresh or canned, with the trip.

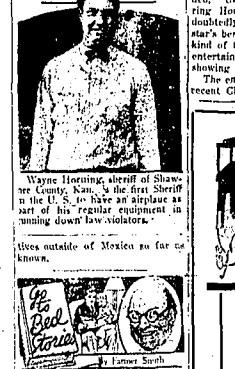

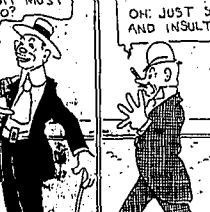
It has been defeated in congress principally to the opposition of eastern people who oppose development of western highways according to the policy outlined in this bill.
