MODERN CANAL BUILDERS

That canal construction and reclamation work is different than it used to be is shown by the methods employed on the Milner-Shoshone canal being projected from Milner dam north-westward toward Shoshone and Gooding. There is a science about it that arouses the admiration of the on-looker.

During the last few months the Derbon Construction company of Seattle and the Winston Brothers company of Minneapolis have been excavating the big ditch through three and a half miles of solid lava rock and dirt. Some of this dirt is so hard that it had to be shot to pieces before the dredgers could dig into it and carry it away in the shovels.

A big dragline used by the Derbon company has aroused much comment. It is driven by a 100-horsepower oil burning engine, has a capacity of three cubic feet of earth which it can move under favorable conditions at several trips a minute, and it weighs 90 tons.

Now comes two other companies into the field with still larger equipment. One of these, Mitty Brothers of Los Angeles, has a dragline of seven cubic yards capacity—much bigger than that used by the Derbon company. Ponderous as they are these huge dredgers can move with surprising facility for their size and weight and are moving the canal construction at a rapid rate toward its immediate objective at the little Wood river.

The Derbon company's dredger could move 1000 cubic yards of dirt every eight hour shift, and works three shifts. The Mitty brothers outfit is now on the grounds moving still more dirt. The other company is the John Phillips and Sons of San Francisco. These four are operating on a 25-mile stretch, with every phase of the work handled by men who are expert in their line. The second 20-mile section will soon be under way.

Difficult and foreboding as the big construction job appears, these builders are equal to the task and are proceeding with the work with dispatch.

What a contrast, the matter of convenience and efficiency, is the equipment available to these canal builders in the machine age, to that used by Ferris and Kessel when our Twin Falls canals were constructed 25 years ago; for the most part with horses and frescoes.

GOVERNMENTAL ENDORSEMENT

Perhaps the greatest impetus that has ever been given the great cause of cooperative agriculture is that provided through the action of the recently appointed federal farm board functioning for agricultural relief, in its determination to assist farmers and farms through the organized groups.

After all, this appears most sensible and logical but it awaited a governmental step such as the one being taken to prove how essential it is that farm groups be organized, not alone for the perhaps selfish advantage to individual members but also for the economic good that results to the public and the country as a whole, through immense savings in marketing costs and distribution. The public welfare demands that every industry be operated at the lowest possible cost, and farm marketing is no exception.

The cooperative idea in agriculture is no more virtuous now than it was previous to the conclusion of the federal farm board, nor would cooperation have been seriously impeded if the board had ignored organized producers.

But the stamp of approval given meritorious cooperative associations is welcomed and appears to vindicate the predictions of those who could see into the future: that the cooperative movement is here to stay.

Furthermore, farm cooperatives no longer need apologists to justify their right to function—they are past the experimental stage. The idea has proved itself as the accepted method of farm marketing; it only needs universal adoption to fulfill its destiny. That is the mission and the work that remains for its champions.
