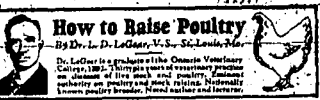

REAL PROPERTY SHOWS GROWTH

The state board of equalization increased the real property valuation by about \$760,000 in its report on the 1928-29 tax year. The total valuation is set at \$341,097,700 compared with \$340,215,923 for 1928.

Features of the report are the big increase in valuation of cemeteries and condenser-works, and the transfer of coal lands from the agricultural to the irrigated land divisions.

Agricultural lands are valued at \$14,600,819, against \$13,728,000 for last year; irrigated lands \$77,056,182 against \$8,450,583; dry lands \$17,922,197 compared with \$17,894,424; and grazing lands \$23,562,142 compared with \$23,022,692 for 1928.

Senators Give Statement on Hoover's Idea

Four leading United States senators from western states have expressed almost identical opinions on the relative proposal of President Hoover to turn over to the public land lands the surface rights of public lands in the western states. They are Senator W. E. Borah of Idaho; Senator William E. Kennick of Wyoming; Senator William H. King and Fred Smead of Utah.

Senators Borah and Smead declared that if the president intended to make it a complete gift by giving the states full title to these lands it would be just what they have been wanting the last few years. Senators King and Kennick added that to give the states only the undeveloped surface rights would be of little value, since the cost of maintaining and developing the lands for grazing and agricultural purposes would be more than they are worth.

Western sentiment so far expressed has been the same as those from the governor's conference of Salt Lake this week when the proposition was submitted.

Interest Keen For Election

The number of signatures obtained for the nomination papers of William E. Ritter and L. Patrick as candidates for the Twin Falls school board indicates quite a little interest in the forthcoming election. Although any eligible names may be written in on the ballots by the voters, Mr. Ritter's term expires at this time as well as that of Mrs. John C. Smith who is not a candidate. He has served two years and Mrs. Smith four years as member and clerk.

KUNZE ACTIVE IN COOPERATIVE

Gustav Kunze of Buhl, president of the Twin Falls County Cooperative Dairyman's association, has the advantage of addressing two groups on the idea of cooperative early this week when he went to Twin Falls. One was in connection with the proposal to establish a dairy cooperative in the Snake river valley. He told what cooperative action had done for the industry in the Twin Falls and Boise sections. The dairy cooperative is in process of formation there.

Mr. Kunze then addressed another group on what cooperative had done for the turkey industry in Idaho. With Mrs. C. G. Brandy, secretary of the Idaho Turkey Growers' association, he discussed that group, telling how it had increased the price of turkeys to the growers and given them a profitable enterprise before the association was organized. The midwestern got the profit.

Mr. Kunze helped establish the cooperative industries at Tillamook, and is called the "father of the cooperative" in Idaho.

HUGE FRUIT TO FIGHT FUND FLY

Congress will be asked to authorize the expenditure of \$25,000,000 by the department of agriculture which has outlined a rigid program to combat the Mediterranean fruit fly from its present foothold in Florida. This large sum was declared necessary to finance a thorough campaign of inspection and treatment of all infested areas.

Secretary of Agriculture Arthur M. Hyde stated that it is not intended to control the pest as that would mean living with it, but that the fruit fly should be eradicated entirely to save the fruit industry of the United States.

State To Fight Puncture Vine

LABOR DAY

The annual celebration of Labor day, which falls on September 2 this year, is an event of interest to the hosts of those who toil with their hands and to the public at large.

While Labor Day as we know it is of comparatively recent origin, it is a revival, or survival, of the medieval processions of the guilds. In America its formal observance dates only from 1882, when the Knights of Labor first held a large parade in New York. This led to an effort on the part of labor organizations to have a day legally set apart and dedicated to labor each year.

The first law to that effect was passed by the legislature of Colorado on March 15, 1887, several other states taking similar action during the next few years. In 1894 Congress passed a bill making Labor Day a legal holiday in the District of Columbia and in Federal offices and establishments throughout the country, since which time it has been adopted by practically all the states.

It is one of the encouraging signs of our time that there exists in America a better understanding among the three great factors in industry—labor, capital and management—than ever before. It is being realized more and more that the interest of any one of these factors should be the interest of all, as each would be impotent without the other two.

While conflicts of more or less importance will inevitably occur in the future, there is little likelihood that the bitter antagonisms of the past, so disastrous to all concerned will ever be revived, except in local and isolated cases.

The gradually diminishing tendency toward violence in labor disputes, and the growing trend toward arbitration and conciliation represent one of the most striking evidences that the world is growing better, in respect to industrial relations at least.

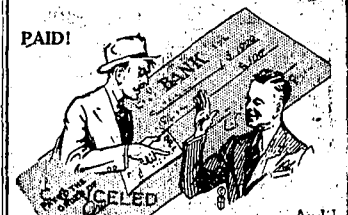

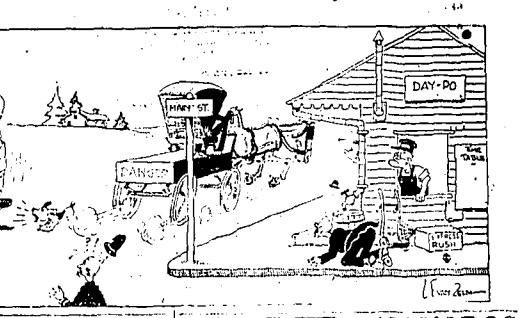
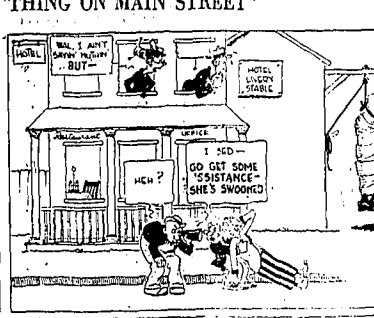

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MORE TUNNELS SCHEDULED BY CANAL COMPANY

Directors Ask For Bids on Additional Channels to Release Seepage Water. Present Flow Increasing.

Manager J. H. Hayes of the Twin Falls Canal company submitted a report to the directors Tuesday and they issued calls for bids on a construction of five additional drainage tunnels. Two of these will be in the neighborhood of Twin Falls and the other three will be shorter in the high region.

The minimum flow in the canal through will be 125 feet a month, Mr. Hayes said, as a means of spending in the time to secure the greatest results in the shortest possible time. The Boone tunnel in the Slaughterhouse area may reach a mile and a half in length and the near tunnel about 1200 feet long. Some of these around Bull will be extensions of present tunnels.

The bids will be received by the directors before the next regular meeting. Continuing on the drainage situation, Mr. Hayes said that the flow of present tunnels is beginning to pick up, as it has taken this long for the water, after irrigation early in the summer, to reach the underground outlets. The flow from these will continue to increase until the next autumn is reached about the last of September. It will then be about double the flow of the last few weeks.

The peak flow will hold steadily for some time as the irrigation water used during the present season drains away, then it will start to decrease until the low mark is reached sometime in March.

DAIRYING AND DIVERSIFIED FARMING IN IDAHO AND ITS POSSIBILITIES FOR GROWTH

By GEORGE O. BROPHY, Special Representative of the Department of Public Relations of the Union Pacific System.

Idaho has an area of 83,888 square and full, high thin and to square miles—land, 83,764; water, 544 square miles. The greater part of the state, including broad and level, high prominent and wide plateau region, eastern part of state lies in Rocky mountain region, with its numerous mountains, ranges, broad and fertile hills and valleys. Greatest altitude at Hyndman peak, 12,978 mean elevation 5,700 feet. Climate river-drainage (highly the area, having a course of about 1,000 miles in Idaho and forming the western boundary for the state in 1919, in the Columbia river, broad and fertile hills and valleys furnish abundance of water for irrigation purposes.

not pay much attention to feeding. He fed silage and mixed hay for his dairy cows. His feed bill was \$174 and his cows produced 2,260 pounds of butterfat which sold for \$1170, leaving him \$160 above feed cost. The second year he fed silage, alfalfa hay and a balanced grain ration consisting of 100 pounds of corn meal, 100 pounds of ground oats, 100 pounds of bran, and 50 pounds of linseed oil meal. His feed cost was \$165 and his butterfat production was 2,517 pounds (valued at \$1,500) leaving him \$301 above feed cost. The better feeding the second year cost him \$180 more, but his 10 cows produced 670 pounds more butterfat and \$375 more money than the first year. His gain over feed cost on the same cows was \$106 greater the second year. He more than paid his interest on his extra investment in feed.

A cow testing party. Take five heads—the first herd with 13 cows, first year produced 244 pounds of butterfat; second year 291 pounds; third year 358 pounds and fourth year 431—the fourth year showing a gain of 187 pounds. First herd No. 2—28 cows—first year 189 pounds butterfat, second year 210 pounds, third year 283, fourth year 358 pounds the fourth year a gain of 139 pounds.

Heard No. 3—25 cows—216 pounds first year, 238 pounds second year, 292 pounds third year and 384 pounds the fourth year—the fourth year an increase of 69 pounds.

Heard No. 4—27 cows—First year 176 pounds, second year 211 pounds, third year 232 pounds, fourth year 272 pounds—fourth year gain 96 pounds.

In making a comparison between Idaho and Wisconsin, which is recognized as one of the great dairying states in the union, Wisconsin had an area of 60,000 square miles—land 55,256, water 4,744. During the year 1928, they milked 1,284,000 cows and heifers over two years old. The milk production of the state was 52 per cent of the gross income of Wisconsin farms—82 per cent of the net income of farms from livestock and livestock products.

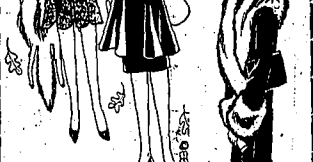
