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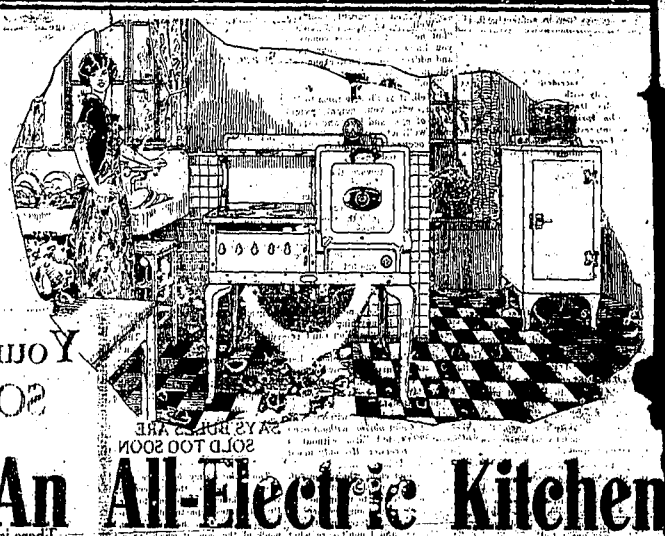

## NEW METHOD OF REPORT IS USED BY CANAL MAN

Delisted Record of Work is Submitted in Writing to Each Director. Shows Steady Progress.

At the directors' meeting of the Twin Falls canal company Tuesday, a written report was submitted by Manager John E. Hayes concerning work accomplished the last month. This method of report was inaugurated by Hayes when he became manager last spring, previous reports having been oral. They constitute a detailed and thorough source of information of every phase of the canal company work, each director receiving a copy for personal examination. These reports will constitute a historic record.

Among the numerous items of information contained in this week's report are the following brief statements:

Discharge of all surface streams entering Snake river and American Falls and Mindoko dam increased steadily during this month. Drains and wasteways of the Mindoko project increased slightly.

Jackson lake started the month with 792,100 acre feet of water and ended with 465,820 acre feet, a discharge of 326,340 for the month. This company used no Jackson lake water.

American Falls reservoir started the month with 1,243,210 acre feet and ended with 915,600 acre feet, a discharge of 327,610. This company used 68,762 acre feet of this water. The South Side canal ran steadily for the month, being shut with 3570 second feet, ending with 3570 and averaging 3000

### SAYS BULLS ARE SOLD TOO SOON

Too many dairy bullifers are sold before their breeding value is fully developed, according to the findings of a study that has been made of the age at which "cull" bulls were disposed of in one herd. So bulls disposed of for breeding purposes or for infirmary or other actual uses, were included in the study.

Of the 124 bulls studied, 88, or 71 per cent were disposed of before the age of 6 years. One hundred and seventeen, or about 14 per cent were disposed of before the age of 8 years. Two bulls were kept until 11 years of age, and one bull until 14 years of age.

Usually a bull will be 5 years old or older by the time he is proved. The disposal of such a large percentage at an earlier age, therefore their true value can be ascertained by means of dam and daughter comparisons. In one of the big losses of the dairy industry.

The proposed examination would be confined to the simple question as to whether each person enumerated in the population count of the country has left the farm within the past year.

The information is expected by statistical experts not only to give an exact answer to the question of migration, but to pave the way for supplemental examination of the causes.

The information will provide opportunity for an answer to the question: "How are you going to keep 'em down on the farm?"

Census experts know that there has been a strong drift from the farm in the last decade, as revealed by the difference between rural and city population, but estimates have varied greatly.

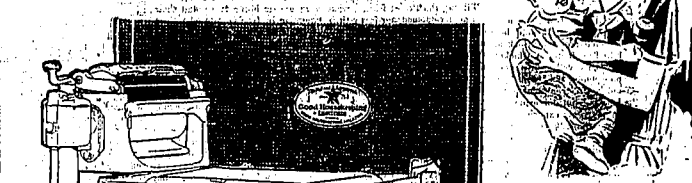
