BIGGEST BEET CROP IN IDAHO IS PREDICTED

Exceeds Last Year's Production by 62 Per Cent. U. S. Yield Also Estimated Substantially Greater.

Julius Jacobson, U. S. crop statistician for Idaho, predicts the largest beet crop Idaho has had for years. The production is expected to exceed that of last year by 62 per cent. Eight of the nine factories in the state will start operating about October 1, the Annual Report of the Bureau of Agriculture for New Mexico are particularly interested in potatoes.

Government Estimate on Beans Approximates Total 1928 Crop

The government bean crop September 1 will be 1,921,000 bushels, an increase of about 30 per cent over the 1928 crop which was 1,475,000 bushels. The five-year average, 1923-1927, for Idaho is 1,309,000 bushels. The fall-fertilized per acre is 20.9 bushels compared with 16.3 bushels for the crop in Great Northern raised in Twin Falls county.

IDAHO LAWS DECLARED VOID

Federal Court Says Loan Bill Unconstitutional and Discriminatory.

The federal court decision last week rendered a decision upholding the constitutionality of a law passed by the Idaho legislature last winter in favor of one company, and two decisions upholding the law against the other two companies. The law was one which required a special tax from outside loan companies doing business in Idaho.

ONION CROP IS LESS IN IDAHO

There is likely to be a substantial decrease in the onion crop for Idaho this year according to the latest report from Julius Jacobson, crop statistician. He expects a yield of 650,000 bushels from 1100 acres, compared with 700,000 bushels from 1000 acres last year.

Fires Far Worse Than Last Year

The prune crop in Idaho is estimated to be 1,000 cars at \$720,000 according to growers at Boise. From 350 to 400 men and women are employed in picking the fruit at the three evaporating plants in that city. The crop is showing rapidly and will be completed in about a week.

GIVES ANNUAL DAIRY REPORT ON COWS HERE

C. E. McClain, J. R. Crawford and George Evans Have Best Records for Year in Association.

W. J. Byrne, official tester for the Pioneer Dairy Herd Improvement association, has just issued the 11th annual report showing records from July 1, 1928 to July 1, 1929. High herds for the year include C. E. McClain of Twin Falls, George Evans of Blaine and J. R. Crawford of Buhl for the middle class, and George Evans of Blaine for the small class of less than ten cows.

McClain and Evans were on the winning list for the last month. McClain's herd produced 10,389 pounds of milk and 567 pounds of butterfat for the year.

Raises Million Angle Worms

H. B. Bilkokey has an angle worm farm in Alhambra, Calif., where he has nearly a million baby angle worms on foot to be ready for next year's fishing season. More than 500,000 have already been furnished to fishermen this season which is only half the year the farm was started four years ago.

The worms are taken good care of by five men, guaranteed to keep fresh in tin cans for six weeks or longer. Bilkokey declares the worms marry for life, doesn't kill other worms, takes two years for maturity, and sometimes lives 20 years. They are fed only corn meal.



COOPERATIVES MARKET LARGE PROPORTION OF PRODUCTS

From 6 to 90 per cent of the farm products of the United States are marketed through cooperative associations. Estimates indicate that about 8 per cent of the annual wool clip is handled by farmers' business associations, and more than 90 per cent of the California lemon crop...

About 8 per cent of the 1928 cotton crop was marketed by 15 farmer-owned and controlled associations. In 1921 less than 5 per cent of the total crop was marketed cooperatively...

Nearly one-third of the annual output of dairy products is handled by the cooperative agencies created and controlled by dairy producers. In 1928, 33 per cent of the creamery butter was made by cooperative enterprises...
