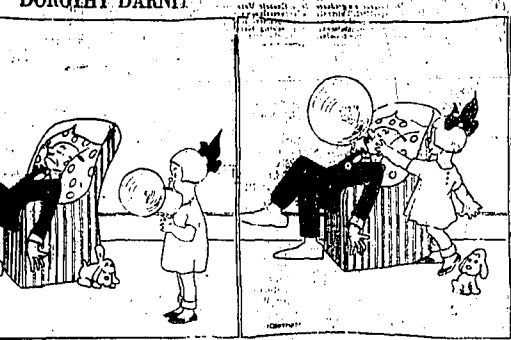
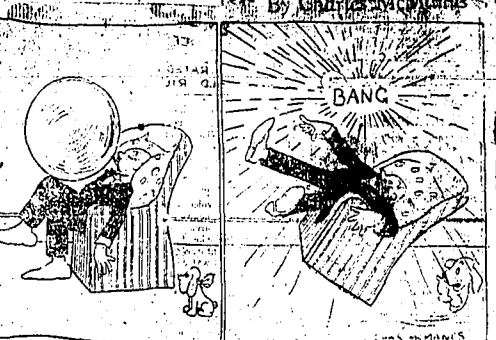

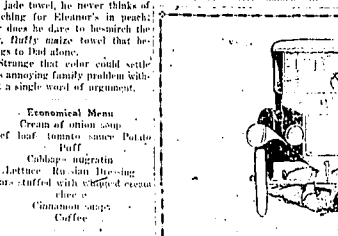
LEGION HOLDS DISTRICT MEET

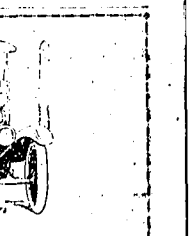

Giant Oil-Electric Locomotive Sold to Herald New Rail Era

TORONTO, Ont., September 26.—A giant electric locomotive that can travel across the continent without a stop at sixty miles an hour, operating at one-fourth the fuel cost of a steam locomotive, recently hauled the second section of the International Limited from Montreal to Toronto. The International Limited, the fastest train of the Canadian National Railways between these two Canadian cities and Detroit and Chicago in the United States.

The Nine Thousand, at the locomotive, a self-contained unit, consists of two self-contained units generating from Diesel motors the electrical power consumed. It covered the 333 miles from Montreal to Toronto at a scheduled speed of 55 miles an hour and at one time the speedometer in the car of S. J. Hingray, vice-president of the Canadian National, pointed to 76 miles an hour.

Leaving Ganouake, an intermediate station, the Nine Thousand made sixty miles an hour in two minutes from a standstill. A steam locomotive hauling the same train of eight cars would require about four minutes to attain a similar speed. The new locomotive's rate of acceleration, railway officials explain, is due to the fact that it utilizes its full power at any speed, whereas a steam locomotive reaches its maximum power only when it is traveling close to its maximum speed.

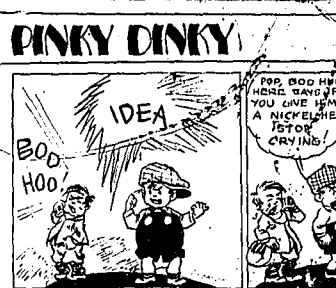

The latter was completed and is now reconstructed to the same condition during the summer Nevada highway officials stated that it would be impossible to carry out their part of the program because of unfavorable circumstances had prevented using any money on that project.

Now Mr. Durkee is quoted as saying that the survey crew will outline the route, including a bridge over Salmon river and an approach over the western Pacific railroad at Wells, this fall. FOREST FIRES AFFECT FRUIT

Heavy Smoke Fall Retards Coloring and Ripening of Apples Here.

The prevailing smoky weather is having a direct influence on the ripening of apples in the southern Idaho fruit crop, a situation that is not known to have happened before. The smoke comes from the forests of the mountains west and California where great timber areas have been burning for the past two months. Lack of wind in this territory permits the smoke to spread over a wide region. It became perceptible more than a week ago, and is still in evidence in various business places, as well as in the streets.

On account of the obscurity of the smoke in coloring and maturing of the apples in Twin Falls county is being retarded, according to Edna V. Gibson, city electrician, natural inspector. Fruit ripening at a stand still showing very little progress towards the maturing stage. Because of the smoke, fruit is being picked up on the trees hereover fear a withering that will shake down the apples and are accordingly planning to start picking the entire crop Monday, late Thursday.

The three valley apple crop is usually about ten days earlier than the local crop but picking is just starting in that section. Mr. Gibson stated that the smoke is retarding and other fruit is also held back to some extent on account of this unusual smoky condition.
