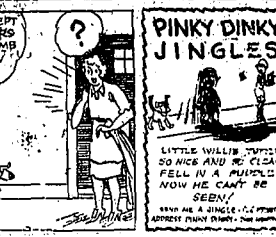

### GASOLINE IS CENTS

Gasoline is retailing for only nineteen (19c) cents a gallon in the neighboring city of Pocatello, a little over a hundred miles away.

In Twin Falls the price is nearer 29 cents a gallon.

Perhaps the difference can be explained by the freight!

At any rate Pocatello has cheaper gasoline and has had for the past month. The public cares little whether the reduction is occasioned by a price war or whatnot. What motorists want is reasonably-priced gas.

The Twinland Empire needs and is entitled to lower gas prices. The fault does not lay with local retailers. The responsibility rests with the big producers.

The state legislature long ago appropriated a fund for use of the attorney-general's office in conducting an investigation of gas prices.

The matter should be prosecuted until the retail price of gasoline is driven down to where it should be in comparison with neighboring states.

### EDISON'S JUBILEE

Chimneying a series of celebrations covering a period of five months, the observance of the 50th anniversary of Edison's incandescent light on October 21 was a notable event. It was held at Dearborn, Mich., with Henry Ford as host and President Hoover, Mr. Edison and many other notable as guests.

Among the incidents of the celebration was the re-enactment of the scene in which Edison and his assistants, after countless experiments, produced the first incandescent light on October 21, 1879.

At first carbons used in the lamp bulbs were very fragile, being made of paper and common sewing thread. An improved filament made of a strip of palm leaf fan led to the adoption of bamboo for the purpose. Japan and other countries being searched for the most suitable kinds. Bamboo was the standard filament material for many years.

The carbon lamp was in general use until the development of the tungsten filament in 1907, which again revolutionized the lighting industry as it was rapidly improved. The tungsten filament is stronger and has a much longer life than the old carbon, besides producing about four and a half times as much light from a given amount of current.

All these developments of half a century have resulted from Edison's original incandescent lamp, although many other inventors have had a part in the progress made. Upon Edison's discovery also has been built the great power and light industry which now represents an investment of ten billion dollars in the United States.

The celebration of Light's Golden Jubilee was a fitting tribute to the great inventor, now 82 years of age and still working in his laboratories, adding to his more than 1,100 inventions which, Mr. Coolidge has said, "within a single lifetime have changed the conditions under which men live."

### TURKEY MARKETING IN THE MOUNTAIN STATES

Approximately sixty cooperatives in the Mountain States will market between 400 and 500 car loads of turkeys this fall. As these cars will contain from 1,800 to 2,400 birds each, not less than three-quarters of a million turkeys will be handled by the sixty associations. Most of the turkeys will be included in pools for the Thanksgiving trade or for the Christmas holiday trade.

Cooperative turkey marketing in the Mountain States had its beginning with the Big Horn Cooperative Marketing Association, Basin, Wyo., about 1922. In 1923 four other associations began handling turkeys on a cooperative basis.

Some of the associations are small groups of producers who supply only enough turkeys for a single carload shipment. Three of the associations aim to serve most of the turkey producers of entire states.

Several of the associations are deducting a fraction of a cent per pound on turkeys handled, for the purpose of accumulating a fund for strengthening and expanding the sales service.

# DEER FALLING BY THE SCORE IN THIS COUNTY

Animals Paralyzed With Fright At First But Now Beginning to Seek Cover.

Deer have been falling by the score since the hunting season opened on the Minidoka forest in eastern Twin Falls county Sunday morning. That day was featured by a continuous barrage of rifle and shotgun fire from hundreds of guns. The shooting continued Monday almost as heavy but by Tuesday the scared animals were beginning to recover their nerve and five from the deadly assault.

Because the season had been so long, the deer had become almost fat and when they were suddenly attacked upon Sunday by scores of hunters they were killed in great numbers. The opening of the season here caused the sale of about 400 head of deer in Twin Falls with possibly 100 or 200 more sold in Cassia.

Minidoka and other neighboring counties. While a number of local people were opposed to the opening of the season here, the ruthless shooting of the deer, under these circumstances, Deputy Game Warden L. W. Hawkins of Filer in the opinion here have suggested the 500 animals killed on the first two or three days comprising a fraction of all those in that territory. Hawkins is quoted as saying:

President of Thomas of the Southern Idaho Fish and Game association expressed "bitter" that there is no particular danger of anyone getting shot as the deer country is very rough and not much long distance shooting can be done. Some women and young people took part in the game early in the week, shooting into the herds of deer found. The season will close October 30 in Twin Falls county. Many deer have been reported killed in other favorite hunting sections this season, including Nevada and the Sawtooth mountain region.
