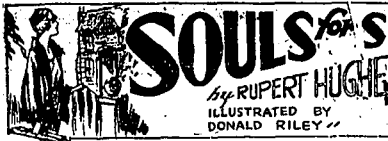

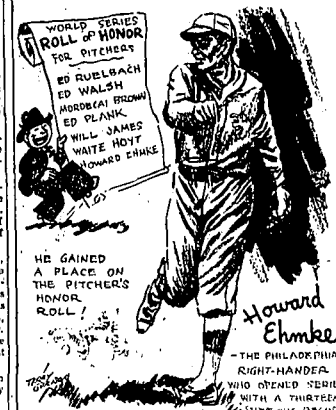

PRINTS FOR THE HOME

GETS RESULTS AGAINST FRUIT FLY IN FLORIDA

Only Eight Small Areas Retained Under Most Rigid Quarantine Measures of Dept. of Agriculture.

The United States department of agriculture recently announced through its secretary, Arthur M. Hyde, that the quarantine regulations on Mediterranean fruit fly as applied in Florida had been modified since none of the harmful pests involved in the regulations have been found in that state since August 27. A general statement was made at that time and action was taken to prevent produce shipments from Florida to other parts of the country. Lillian P. Stuart, L. D. S. Amusement hall, state director of plant industry, attended meetings in that regard.

The modification, however, did not apply to the eighteen southern and western states which are included. Florida fruit or vegetables, either sterilized or unsterilized, are yet forbidden from direct or indirect shipment to this section.

Best Practiced
No effective were the control methods applied by the federal department of agriculture that the fruit fly has been practically eradicated in the two and a half months since the insect was discovered in certain numbers in Florida. No infestations have been found there during that period.

In eight places since the last of July infestations of fruit fly were discovered, all in small areas, and these places will be retained under close watch. All produce raised in those areas must be sterilized, regardless of where it is to be shipped to.

Methods Used
The control measures employed involved the destruction of all fruits on properties found infested and on all other properties within one mile thereof the spraying of such areas from nine to twelve times with a poison that sprays, attracts and kill all the adult flies which escaped destruction during the clean-up measures, and the maintenance of a vigilance period during which all effort was made to eliminate from the areas concerned all host fruit and vegetables. No resurgence of the fruit fly in such areas has been found since the end of July, and in many cases no infestation has been found since May or June.

SCOUTS GIVEN A NEW LEADER

With representatives from Dubuque, Twin Falls, Piler, Barley, Jerome and Wendell at a scout meeting in Twin Falls Thursday night, E. Russell Scott of Grand, Oregon, was named as scout executive of the Snake river council to succeed J. H. Janney who recently resigned. Mr. Scott is credited with building up the scout membership in the La Grande district from about 20 three years ago to 400 now. He will take up the work locally on November 1 according to stated plans. He was present at this meeting and said that after an investigation he had decided to accept the place because it offers a bigger field of work and opportunity.

He is a native of Illinois and has a wife and daughter who will soon come to Twin Falls. Since the previous executive resigned the scout work here has been in charge of the officers of the council.

HOW ABOUT UNIONS FOR EGG PRODUCERS?

Co-operative Marketing Which Has Proven Very Successful in Many Other Lines, Offers Some Advantages to Offer Poultrymen.

Mark Twain once said of the weather, that everybody talks about it but nobody does anything about it. Much the same thing might be said about co-operative marketing among poultry raisers. To be sure, there are some co-operative organizations now working successfully in several sections of the country, notably in California and some of the central western states. The "Co-op" of Canada, too, offer a notable example of what can be accomplished. Taking the whole situation by and large, however, it is almost literally true that such has been the most unfortunate marketing method little does about it.

To be sure, it is no simple problem to get a thing of this kind projected. That very fact, however, is the excellent reason why something should be started at once. Today, egg producers are in much the same position as were the workers of a few generations back. Without organization of any kind, they are at the mercy of those to whom they sell. The Jones with ten or twelve dozen eggs to sell each week must take them to the nearest market and accept the price offered or let them home again. A well organized association shipping cartons of eggs each week suffers no such disadvantages.

With sufficiently large quantities to really mean something, the association is in a position to seek out the most favorable markets and can regulate shipments into those markets in such a way that a higher average level of prices can be maintained than would otherwise be possible. Collective bargaining, the factor that has made possible the present high wage level for workers, is also brought to the poultryman through co-operative marketing.


Other advantages no less important, though not so often considered, are the possibilities of standardizing and improving production methods, standardizing and improving the grade of the product and stabilizing production. It is well established fact that in some sections of the country only white eggs find a ready sale at top prices, while in other sections brown eggs are the favorites. Let us suppose that a number of poultrymen whose natural market is a brown egg territory are producing only white eggs. They know they are not getting as good prices as they should, but they do not know why and have no way of finding out as they operate independently. As members of an effective association, they would be given the necessary information of, if their total volume was not enough, their separate lots could be pooled into larger units and shipped

DEER SEASON CLOSES

The deer season on the Minidoka forest in Twin Falls county will close Wednesday night after one of the most disastrous periods in range of deer have ever known in Idaho. About 500 were killed the first day after the season was opened from 18 years of closed hunting. Several hundred more were killed during the week.

STATE REFUSES ROAD

The state highway department last week refused to accept a section of road along the Blue river and notified the Ada county highway district that the place would have to be strengthened. It involves a right-angle turn, with a service station, two bridges, a gully and a house. This was termed a "death curve" and is about ten miles out of Boise. It originated with an old Indian trail rounding a swamp.

CANALS CLEANED

Irrigation canals on the Minidoka project were shut off last week to permit of cleaning for next year's use. The project has three canals each with a 30-foot lift, the highest canal having a 20-foot lift. They serve 44,000 acres, with 116,000 additional acres served by gravity on the north and south sides of the Snake river. The gravity project is being improved to provide a 25 per cent increase in the irrigation water supply.
