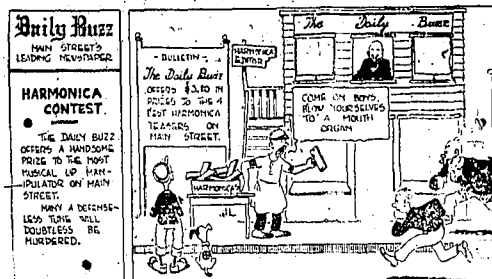

FIGURES SHOW RANK OF WOOL RAISING STATES

Idaho Increased Production Since War But Remains in Seventh Place, Texas is Leader.

The United States department of agriculture provides figures showing growth of the wool industry in the various states and how the production in each of the leaders compares with that of several years ago. In 1928, Idaho, Montana, Texas, Wyoming, California, Utah and Oregon were competing for first place.

Montana led in 1922 by just 19,000 pounds. After that, Texas continued to increase until the latter state was in seventh place ahead of all of the others. The 1929 wool production was as follows:

6527 Inspected Cars Shipped

Idaho sent out the largest volume of inspected agricultural products in October of any month in the history of the state, the state department of agricultural inspection reports. Altogether 6527 cars of produce were inspected and shipped during that month, compared with 4310 carloads in October, 1928, and 3200 in September this year.

Among these were two cars of Idaho cherries preserved in barrels of sugar syrup shipped from Twin Falls and one from Lewiston. These went to Eastern markets for the Thanksgiving and Christmas markets.

Other inspected carload shipments included the following: potatoes, 3577; apples 3561; prunes, 2097; plums, 118; lettuce, 76; celery, 161; pears, avers, and peaches, four carloads.

IDAHO'S COURT PROCEDURE TO BE IMPROVED

J. R. Bothwell Will Assist in Changing Laws for the Legislature to Act On.

President Jess Hawley of the Idaho Bar association has appointed the following lawyers on a judicial council to meet on November 22 to consider changes in the state's court procedure regarding criminal cases:

Chief Justice Alfred Budge and Associate Justice William E. Lewis of the supreme court; Judges Dana E. Brink of Boise, William M. McNaughton of Boise, William and Ralph Adair of Blackfoot of the district bench, attorneys Frank Martin of Boise, James I. Hinchell of Twin Falls, James Harris, Weiser; A. L. Merrill, Pocatello, and Eugene A. Cox of Lewiston.

Duties Listed Appointment of the council followed granting by the last legis-

lature authority to the bar commission to study the practice and procedure of the courts and the general administration of justice in Idaho. Reports will be made to the governor, the supreme court for the legislature.

Among the matters listed by President Hawley to be taken up at the meeting are: re-organizing the judicial districts; salaries of the supreme and district judges; abolition of probate courts; changes in criminal procedure advocated by the prosecuting attorneys' association.

Expect To Keep All Roads Open

The state department of public works has already started preparations for snow-fighting this winter on the highways of Eastern and South Central Idaho in particular. The department is assembling a fleet of four four-wheel-drive trucks to propel snow-plows, and several rotary plows.

Equipment sheds are to be built to house this machinery at New Meadows on the North-and-South highways at Soda Springs and Montpelier in Southeastern Idaho, and at American Falls in South Central Idaho.

Those sheds will constitute an addition to those already provided. The state department has prepared this extra equipment to prevent blocking of highways in the mountain sections as occurred last year. It is expected that all the main roads will be kept constantly open during the coming winter.

Tax Data Will Be Collected

Secretary of State Fred E. Lucas last week appointed John McKinley of Inyo as field agent of the state board of equalization with the duty of making a thorough study of taxing problems in Idaho for the benefit of the legislature. This work was authorized by the last legislature and Cowley Adair of Custer county was first appointed to the position. He was regarded as one of the best informed tax experts in Idaho but was ineligible for this job because he was a member of the legislature which passed the law.

Mr. McKinley has for several years been a field deputy with the state department of law enforcement. He will accept his present to the legislature all information available on tax matters in order to expedite action in enacting laws which insure the jurisdiction of the U. 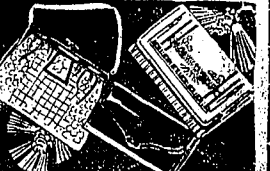
