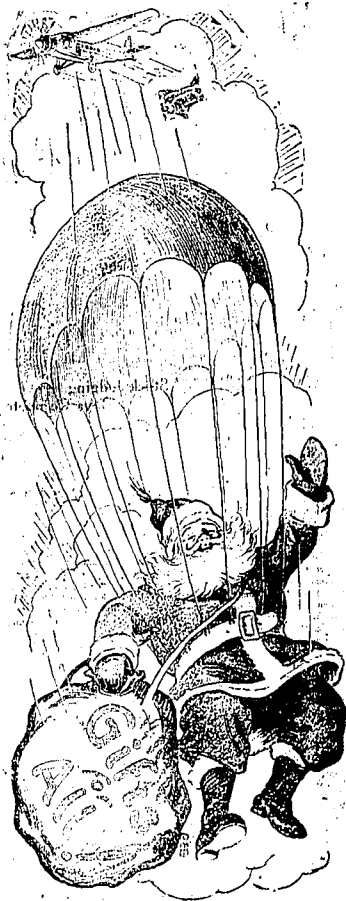

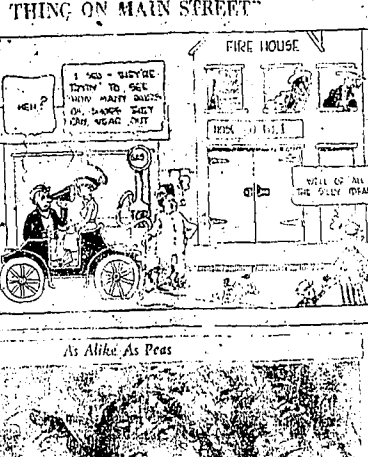
Several guests accompanied the local football team to Twin Falls Friday where they were defeated by a score of 28 to 6. This is the last game of the season for the local team.

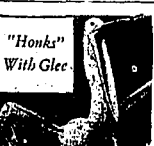

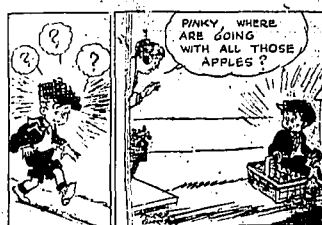

Pheasant hunting was reported poor in southern Idaho this year. The season closed November 15.
