Railroad West Is Project Adopted by Chambers of Commerce of the County

Buhl and Twin Falls Cooperate To Secure Direct Rail Connections With Portland Trade Territory.

The proposed railroad westward from Buhl to give the Twin Falls project direct connections with the northwestern territory, which has been discussed ever since the tract started took more definite form Monday night when a delegation of directors from the chambers of commerce met with officers of the Twin Falls organization and discussed the situation in the natural production of the territory.

President J. H. Barker and Directors C. D. Starr, O. J. Glasgow and C. M. Merrick represented Buhl at this meeting which was presided over by President T. C. Bacon of the local group. Barker presented the idea of the two commercial bodies and other civic organizations cooperating to secure the railroad west from Buhl.

It was agreed that the time has come for a concrete action should be asked for to give this section better service into the Portland territory. A joint committee of commerce here and the Twin Falls organization will be organized to handle the matter.

At the regular meeting Tuesday, the directors expressed a desire to have all water users get a thorough understanding of the situation before the monthly meeting in January when they may vote on the proposal to eliminate winter deliveries. The water users on the tract are already equipped with wells on a regular basis.

The proposition was submitted in legal form at the Monday night meeting, having been discussed by the council at the two preceding meetings. It was presented by Thomas Sanderson, commissioner of streets and waterworks, who recommended it as the best means of replacing about 41,225 feet of old wooden mains which are usually worn out that they cost \$12,000 to \$20,000.

The council Monday night discussed the probable necessity of creating a new source of water supply for the city by means of a tunnel, which would be the cause of the intention of the Twin Falls Chamber to vote on the proposal to stop winter deliveries of water to the city.

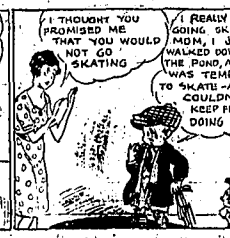

"Until we became tired of it. Until I'd had time to think."

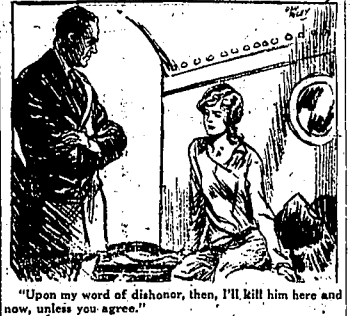
"Well, you're going to do just that thing," he said. "Only you're going with me, not Fauce."

"IT PAYS TO LOOK WELL"

CHRISTMAS SAVINGS

Christmas club savings in the United States to the amount of \$800,000,000 will be distributed to members this month, this being an increase of 9 per cent over last year.

Of this immense sum about 88 per cent will go for holiday purchases, and 12 per cent will be redposited in the banks as permanent savings.

These estimates, based on the disposition of club savings last year, were recently made by President C. U. Williams of the Ollomaho Saving Corporation, who has been a close observer of thrift tendencies for several years.

Even the savings articles in Christmas purchases are largely devoted to articles for household use and home comfort, such as refrigerating machines, radios, furniture, oil burners, and other equipment in the enjoyment of which the entire family may share.

ADVERTISING NEEDED

As a factor in maintaining prosperity, "advertising should go ahead with all of its characteristic force," declared Dr. Julius Klein, assistant secretary of commerce in a radio address recently. He also said:

"Advertising is one of the most potent of business accelerators. It keeps goods moving. And it inspires confidence. At this time any appreciable let-up in advertising programs would be unquestionably injurious."

Dr. Klein was speaking with special reference to the program for business expansion to which industrial leaders recently pledged themselves in conferences with President Hoover. But his remarks apply with equal force to the advertising of local merchants, and perhaps with even greater force, as they are more closely in touch with the ultimate consumer, upon whose buying all manufacturing activities depend.

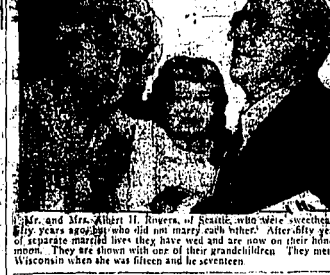

Managers Hayes said this is not the first time this proposal has come up, and that settlers on the project voted nine years ago to eliminate water deliveries but that the trouble was not entirely ready for it, having few wells to supply the needed water. Now, he said, more wells have been drilled and the problem therefore is not so serious.

To indicate how the separate water has increased, the high through averages should now be taken to overcome it, he said that surface water averages about 50 feet below the surface while the average depth was originally 150 feet. 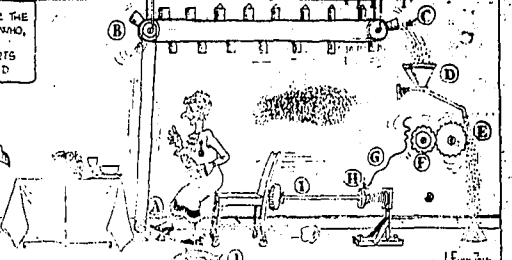
