## IMPROVEMENTS FOR THE CITY

### City Fathers Make a Number of Public Improvements.

Streets to be Raised to Uniform Grade, and Rounded off for Better Drainage. Sidewalks ordered.

In its regular session last Monday evening the council seemed imbued with the spirit of improvement and spent the whole of the evening practically planning to better the appearance of the city. Mayor Vallet who returned the previous day with the details of this session.

The application of Mr. Anderson for a license to carry on the business of a grocer was granted.

The contract for sidewalk declared delinquent by the city was let to W. M. Moly at 15 cents per foot, work to begin at once.

Twenty-five (25) Men were ordered to make a detailed map of the city and establish a definite proportion of the city, and all construction work will be required to be finished by such grades.

City Clerk Taylor was ordered to advertise for bids for sprinkling the streets. Notice of which will be found elsewhere in this paper.

An ordinance was then introduced by the council to reduce the road poll tax from four dollars to three dollars in order that the city could pay less and more money received.

## HOBOES STEAL A MAIL POUCH

### West Mail Pouch From Minidoka Branch Taken Last Week.

Short Line Officials Succeed in Tracing Stolen Property to Snake Brush and Later Nail the Robbers.

A smooth piece of snake robbery was perpetrated upon the operator at Minidoka last Wednesday night when two hoboes succeeded in getting away with one of the mail pouches on the cart at the station. The cart had been loaded to the platform near the water tank and operator was waiting for the west bound mail which was then in sight. He discovered that the sack holding the registered mail had been left at the office and hurried to get it. During the short time he was absent the mail sack was taken without anyone seeing the robbers. The loss was not discovered until the next trip, when the sack which contained mail from this city and other towns along the Minidoka line was reported missing.

Herbert Prothero the mail clerk for this branch was able to trace it until it was out of his care and in the custody of the agent at the terminus.

On search of the surrounding country about the depot the mail, cut open was found with many letters stolen, and scattered about the neighborhood. Two young men who had been seen hanging about the depot and their description telegraphed to the towns on the main line. They were arrested at Nampa and confessed to the crime. One of the robbers was but nineteen and the other twenty-one, and neither seemed to realize the seriousness of their crime. The trial will come under the jurisdiction of the federal courts.

From the chary manner in which the county politicians approach open announcement of their candidacy it looks as though the office would seek the man and not the man the office. If such is the case we may expect to see some pretty good men sought out by the office.

A great many papers of this state are hollering their heads off for Brady, but so far we have yet to see one that really knows what his chief stands for in the matter of a platform. It is customary in this day of politics for a candidate to tell what he is going to do when elected to office and not merely say "I am a republican, for that reason vote for me." A great many newspapers would really like some information upon this subject, and also a great number of republicans would like to know if the same burlesque, perpetrated in the last legislature, is to be repeated.

The Capital News of Sunday trotted out two possible candidates for governor upon the democratic platform, M. Alox and a prominent merchant of Boise and John C. Rice of Caldwell, a prominent attorney in that city. Both of the candidates are as yet without a platform upon which to urge their candidacy. The anti-Mormon plank which gained the democratic party many republican votes in this state, stands a poor chance of being inserted in the platform, and if such is the case the candidates will have a poorer chance of getting even all of their own party lined up to say nothing of any republicans.

To any man acquainted with the character of the voters upon this tract, the possibility of any man getting office who comes before the people with a record for unfaithful service in public office is quite remote. The taxpayers for the most part have come from states in which the political corruption has disgusted them with the methods for both parties. In making their homes in this new county and this new state a large majority have a strong desire to get away from the graft game of the politicians. The party which attempts to put incompetent officers into position in the county will have this feeling to contend with.

Senator Gullinger's mail ship subsidy bill passed the Senate without being amended in any way. While the bill is not sweeping in its changes, yet it is the entering wedge toward a greater measure at some future time. Heretofore the subsidy question has brought out a heated argument and debate and has finally been so amputated in the committee that it appeared together party. The bill which

passed the senate provides in brief for amending the ocean mail service law of 1891, by increasing the pay of second class mail steam ship from \$2 to \$1 per mile on outward voyages and making the compensation of the third class \$1 per mile. The attack on the Forest reserve policy in Congress will undoubtedly meet with the approval of the land grabbers who ever since Gifford Pinchot has been in charge of that department have not ceased to make charge of graft. If any one factor more than another has created public sentiment in consideration of the nation's natural resources it has been the fair and unbiased letters of the forestry department sent to the papers all over the country. It is because of those articles that a great change has been made in the opinion of many responsible people about the forest reserves.

The kick about the government department paying money for propagating its own theories will settle a lot better with the people than the fact that every single one of the congressmen are using the government's funds to have their worse than useless speeches printed for distribution among their constituency. If Pinchot could be charged with sending out some of the crazy dope that has come to this office from this state's national representatives, the kickers might make out a case. For straight sense Pinchot's articles are classic in comparison.

The substantive part of the Antitrust Law should remain at present; that is, every contract in restraint of trade or commerce among the several states or with foreign nations should continue to be declared illegal; provided, however, that some proper governmental authority such as the Commission of Corporations acting under the secretary of Commerce and Labor be allowed to pass on any such contracts. Probably the best method of providing for this would be to enact that any contract subject to the prohibition contained in the antitrust law, into which it was desired to enter, might be filled with the Bureau of Corporations or other appropriate executive body. This would provide publicity, within say, sixty days of the filing—which period could be extended by order of the department whenever for any reason it did not give the department sufficient time for a thorough examination; the Executive Department having power might forbid the contract, which would then become subject to the provisions of the Antitrust Law if at all in restraint of trade. If no such prohibition was issued the contract would then only be liable to attack on the ground that it constituted an unreasonable restraint of trade. Whenever the period of filing had passed without any such prohibition the contracts or combinations could be dissolved or forbidden only after notice and hearing, with a reasonable provision for summary review on appeal by the courts, Labor organizations, farmers' organizations and other organizations not organized for purposes of profit. This should be allowed to register under the law by giving the location of the head office, the character and by-laws, and the names and addresses of their principal officers. —Literary Digest.

The day is fast approaching when old, dead, dried in the wind partisans in politics will be relegated to the political scrap pile and be forgotten. This time is past when any man can claim anything from the people merely because he is a faithful member of either of the two dominant parties. The personal qualifications of the man are being weighed by a greater number of voters each election. Progressive newspapers no longer lay stress upon the valiant services of the man with regards his party. Party, since the time of Lincoln, has steadily given place to the quality of the man. Until today we find voters of the States breaking away from some corrupt political favorite to elect the man of reform ideas. Smaller units of governments have longer had this tendency than those of greater size, because the voice of the people is heard more clearly and quickly by the office holder. Evening the present national situation this is brought out as the two parties, Republican and Democratic, converged toward a common platform. With platforms similar, the vital question has become the selection of the best man fitted to carry out paramount issues. Roosevelt's platform (for such it must be called) has become the common ground. For a dozen men of each party built at the voters, simply have to make up their minds as to the man to carry out ideas of a common platform. The aspirant's ability, integrity and faithfulness in public office are then scanned in the load of the party's goal.

As long as this republic stands we shall have political parties and politicians always anxious to get a finger in the spoils of party warfare. Just as long as there are politicians we shall have corrupt influences at work in the selection of officeholders. These factors upon our civilization will never disappear. But where the vast difference lies is in the change of mastery. Formerly the boss with whip and scave words lined up his forces and told the people to go to, secure in his power. Now we find the boss patiently waiting to hear what the "good voters want" and fervently hoping they will not want too much.

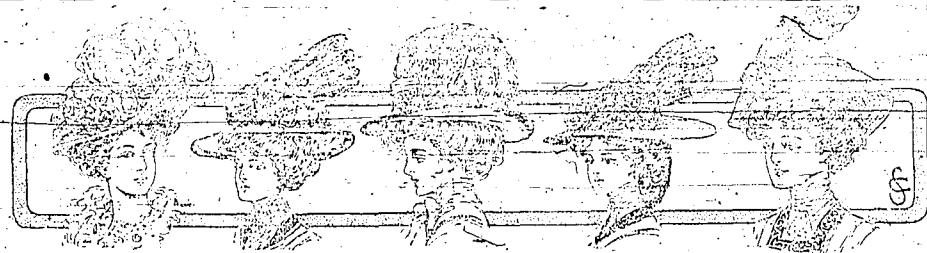

From the chary manner in which the county politicians approach an announcement of their candidacy it looks as though the office would seek the man and not the man the office. If such is the case we may expect to see some pretty good men sought out by the office.

A great many papers of this state are printing their heads off for Brady, but so far we have yet to see one that really knows what his chief stands for in the matter of a platform. It is customary in this day of politics for a candidate to tell what he is going to do when elected to office and not merely say "I am a republican, for that reason vote for me." A great many newspapers would really like some information upon this subject, and also a great number of republicans would like to know if the same burlesque, perpetrated in the last legislature, is to be repeated.

The Capital News of Sunday trotted out two possible candidates for governor upon the democratic platform, M. Alexander a prominent merchant of Boise and John C. Rice of Caldwell a prominent attorney in that city. Both of the candidates are, as yet, without a platform upon which to urge their candidacy. The anti-Mormon plank which gained the democratic party many republican votes in this state, stands a poor chance of being inserted in the platform, and if such is the case the candidates will have a poorer chance of getting even all of their own party lined up, to say nothing of any republicans.

To any man acquainted with the character of the voters in this tract, the possibility, of any man getting office who comes before the people with a record for unfaithful service in public office is quite remote. The taxpayers for the most part have come from states in which the political corruption has disgusted them with the methods for both parties. In making their homes in this new county, this new state a large majority haven't strong desire to get away from the graft game of the politicians. The party which attempts to put incompetent officers into position in the county will have this feeling to contend with.

Senator Gahinger's mail ship subsidy bill passed the Senate without being maimed in any way. While the bill is not sweeping in its changes, yet it is the entering wedge toward a greater measure at some future time. Heretofore the subsidy question has brought out a heated argument and debate and has finally been so amputated in the committees that it appealed to neither party. The bill which

passed the senate provides a brief for amending the ocean mail service law of 1891, by increasing the pay of second class mail steamship from \$2 to \$3 per mile on outward voyage, and making the composition of the third class \$1 per mile. "The substantive part of the Antitrust Law should remain as at present; that is, every contract in restraint of trade or commerce among the several states or with foreign nations should continue to be declared illegal; provided, however, that some proper governmental authority (such as the Commissioner of Corporations acting under the secretary of Commerce and Labor) be allowed to pass on any such contracts." Probably the best method of providing for this would be to enact that any contract, subject to the prohibition contained in the antitrust law, into which it was desired to enter, might be filed with the Bureau of Corporations or other appropriate executive body.

This would provide publicity within say, sixty days of the filing, which period could be extended by order of the department whenever for any reason it did not give the department sufficient time for a thorough examination—the Executive Department having power might forbid the contract, which would then become subject to the provisions of the Antitrust Law if at all in restraint of trade. If no such prohibition was issued the contract would then only be liable to attack on the ground that it constituted an unreasonable restraint of trade. When ever the period of filing had passed without any such prohibition the contracts or combinations could be disapproved or forbidden only after notice and hearing, with a reasonable provision for summary review on appeal by the courts, Labor organizations, farmers' organizations and other organizations not organized for purposes of profit should be allowed to register under the law by giving the location of the head office, the character and by-laws, and the names and addresses of their principal officers.—Literary Digest.

The day is fast approaching when old, dead, dyed in the wool partisans in politics will be relegated to the political scrap pile and forgotten. The time is just when any man can claim anything from the people merely because he is a faithful member of either of the two dominant parties.—The personal qualifications of the man are being weighed by a greater number of voters each election. Progressive newspapers no longer lay stress upon the valiant services of the man with regards his party, since the time of Lincoln, has steadily given place to the quality of the man, and today, we find voters of the states breaking away from some corrupt political favorite to elect the man of reform ideals.

Smaller units of governments have longer had this tendency than those of greater size, because the voice of the people is heard more clearly and quickly by the unit holder. Evening the present national situation this is brought out as the two parties, Republican and Democratic, converged toward a common platform. With platforms similar, the vital question has become the selection of the best man fitted to carry out paramount issues. Roosevelt's platform (for such it might be called) has become the common ground for a dozen men of each party until all the voters simply have to make up their minds as to the man to carry out ideas of a common platform. The aspirant's ability, integrity and faithfulness in public office are then scrutinized instead of the party creed.

As long as this republic stands we shall have political parties and politicians always anxious to get a finger in the spoils of party warfare. Just as long as there are politicians we shall have corrupt influences at work in the selection of officeholders. These festers upon our civilization will never disappear. But where the vast difference lies is in the change of mastery. Formerly the boss with whip and snave words lined up his forces and told the people to go to, secure in his power. Now we find the boss patiently waiting to hear what the "good voters want" and fervently hoping they will not want too much.

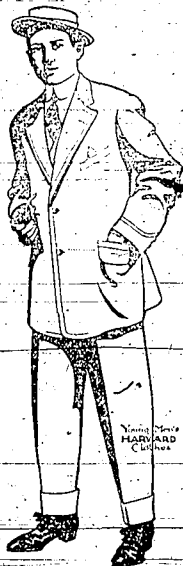

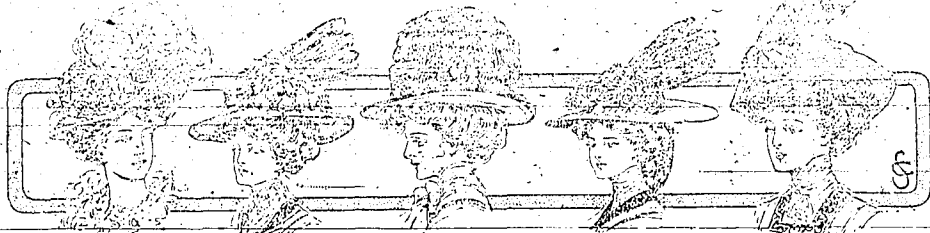

It will be the Governors of every state in the Union, the President's Cabinet, the United States Supreme Court, Senators, Representatives in Congress, and, as special guests, officers of the Nation's most prominent men.

All these will meet to consider the question which the President has designated to be the "fundamental problem" now before the Nation—the conservation of the country's natural resources.

As a result given out by those who know of the audience planned, the "great gathering" has on the fact that particularly early. Governor in the United States has been accepted by the President in the White House for the White House. Now the names of the three citizens of each State and Territory which the President has asked the Governors to bring with them are rapidly being announced. They include some of the best known men of the country—One is Judge G. A. Gray of Delaware. Others include prominent business men, lawyers, newspaper men and state officers.

It is strikingly evident that the conference will bring together not only the Nation's most distinguished men, but also the foremost experts and specialists on the several phases to be discussed. Among these, under the general head of water resources, are rail and water transportation, navigation and water power; under land resources, are soil, forests, sanitation, reclamation, land laws, grazing and stock raising; and under minerals, are coal, oil, gas, and other minerals.

While the interested men who are to discuss these separate topics have not yet been announced, they are known to be recognized experts on the subjects which have been assigned them. For instance, it is generally understood that James J. Hill, the great railroad builder will discuss the relation between rail and water transportation. Mr. Hill is not only an authority on his subject, but has shown his deep interest in the subject of water transportation in all his recent public utterances on the subject.

The great feature of the conference, however, will be the open discussion among the various Governors of the points brought out by the papers prepared. These papers will be very brief and then the subject will be open for discussion among all the Governors with a view of getting a consensus of opinion of the whole United States on the particular subject in hand. The inter-relationship of the various industries as to production, manufacturing, commerce, transportation generally will be prominently brought out. The general question of national development will come up for discussion at all of the sessions.

The unity of American interests will be a prominent note: "Salt Lake Tribune."
