Graham had already locked two of the prisoners into the cell and was preparing to get Sanders into the cell for the night, when inadvertently he called for Sanders to be taken to his cell. This was just what the crook had been looking for some time, and he hit Graham a terrific blow just back of his right ear, with a sock bound with a lump of coal, telling him and making him a bit dazed for a minute. Graham says he was still holding on to Sanders when his senses returned but was too weak from the blow to hold him and the prisoner got away carrying with him Graham's revolver, which he took from the jailer's coat pocket.

Deputy Sheriff Dyer heard the jailer's call for help and ran toward the jail only to see a man run away from the jail toward the fence. Dyer followed out on his trail and managed to keep him in sight until the man ran down across the tracks and plunged into the stream of Rock Creek canyon. The surrounding towns have been notified and mounted men have been sent out to catch the man if he seeks any of the towns of the railroad.

Sanders was wanted here for passing forged checks and was arrested at Kearsarge and held for the Sheriff. On Dyer's Dyer reaching that city he learned that Sanders had made his escape from the marshal, and was later apprehended at Brigham City, Utah, and brought to Twin Falls.

POWER RIGHTS BELONG TO PEOPLE

So Says Roosevelt in Special Message to Congress.

Vigorous Executive Vetoes Bill Granting Special Privileges-Natural Wealth the Heritage of People.

In a special message Monday evening to President Roosevelt warned congress that there are pending in this session bills which propose to give away without price stream rights capable of developing 1,500,000 horse power, whose production would cost annually 25,000,000 tons of coal, arising in vigorous terms the establishment of a policy such as the illiberal minority in the house demands, which would safeguard the granting of dam privileges and require the grantees to pay for them and deny anything a future policy on the part with regard to proper utilization of construction privileges by refusing the signature to a bill that gives an additional three years to the Reley River Improvement company, which is to build a dam in the Idaho river. "I do not believe," says the president, "that our natural resources should be granted and held in an undeveloped condition for speculation or other reasons. So far as I am aware there are no assurances that the grantees in this case are in any better condition financially and properly to utilize this opportunity than they were in the time of the original granting of the privilege ten years ago."

Discussing broadly the federal policy, the president said:

"Every project to construct a dam on any navigable stream should specifically recognize the right of the government to fix a term for its duration and to impose such charge or charges as may be deemed necessary to protect the present and future interests of the United States connected with the act of June 2, 1906."

"The provisions for a charge is of vital importance. The navigability of every waterway and of all connected or connectable inland waterways for a whole should be improved for the purpose of interstate and foreign commerce."

LAND STILL ANOTHER RECRUIT

Attraction of Twin Falls Makes George Baird a Booster.

George A. Baird of Chicago, president of the Honorable Mining and Milling company, was in Salt Lake for a few hours Thursday morning, enroute to his eastern headquarters after spending several pleasant weeks in southern California. Enroute from the coast, Mr. Baird stopped over in Twin Falls, where whose progress to prosperity he has had great deal to do. Regarding Twin Falls, he said:

"At Twin Falls you are going to see soon the greatest farming community in the west, the greatest irrigated section in the world. The new agricultural district is growing remarkably, and all this has been made possible by the progress there. Before 1902 we will have six thousand inhabitants in the city of Twin Falls, and within fifteen years the city will be the largest in all Idaho."

"The community is growing rapidly, and the very best people of the land are coming there to settle. Last week a train load of citizens who purchased 200 acres to build a town and a year or two ago you could have purchased them for \$1000 each. A year ago I thought some land I had there was selling for \$125 an acre and I sold one tract. You could not buy it today for \$250 per acre, while land for local use is actually worth \$1000 per acre, and is worth today something over \$300 an acre."

"The people are happy, progressive and prosperous. Money is plentiful. There are three banks there now, and one of them during the past two weeks has had its deposits increased by a round \$100,000. The city is building a \$20,000 school building, for the school facilities were hardly calculated at first to handle such demands as now are being made on them. The children ride to school in jumbo wagons, and they are taken home by the same means. Twin Falls has two good newspapers. It has an ideal climate and every possible advantage to make it the largest and most productive agricultural center in the west. And it is not too far right now for great many more to go there and enjoy land. The west is the country, and everything about Twin Falls is typically Western." -Salt Lake Tribune.

ORIGIN OF EASTER.

The establishment of the Christian festival of Easter, typical of the resurrection of Christ, was a matter of much controversy in the Church for centuries but was finally determined by the Council of Nicaea, convened by the Roman Emperor Constantine in 325 A. D. It was the first Sunday after the full moon which happens upon or previous to the 21st of March—the beginning of the ecclesiastical year. If the full moon happens upon a Sunday, Easter Day is the Sunday after.

The earliest date upon which Easter may occur is March 22. If the full moon should fall on March 21, Easter is the following Sunday. It fell on this date in 1875. It will do so again in 1915.

There is a belief common among certain people that the winter season follows an early date when the season will be correspondingly early.

In ancient times, as winter was rapidly giving place to spring, and the earth was beginning to put on its garment of green, the people of Northern Europe observed a festival in honor of Eostre, or Easter, the goddess of spring.

The festival held in commemoration of the Resurrection fell about the same time of the year as the festival of Eostre, and when the early missionaries among the heathen people of Northern Europe they found many customs common to the celebration of the festival of the goddess which they could not explain.

In the east the festival was known as Pascha, and the history of it appears to be of Jewish origin. It is supposed to be the Pascha of the Jews, which is the anniversary of the liberation of the Israelites from the bondage of Egypt.

In some countries it is said that "Easter Day" is daily renewed by the working classes, many of whom partake of no one, but three or four eggs at breakfast that morning.

One "Pasce Sunday" a few weeks ago gathered at his house and promised to provide him with a "good feed" if he would undertake to eat the first 1000 black eggs. To this proposal he at once agreed.

THE JERSEY BREED

Interesting History of One of the Most Famous Cattle.

When we consider the Jersey breed of cattle in this latitude we are only give thought to the merits as necessary to our country. In fact, more than half of the herd are imported, and they will drop as a beef calf, merely saying that it is the first importance to select and use the milk from the best producing dams.

From a given amount of feed, there is taken in the world seven or a dozen almost solely on their best qualities. The home of the Jerseys, the Island of Jersey, lies in the English Channel, only thirteen miles from the Coast of France. High, rocky cliffs bound its north shore, from which the land slopes in a westerly direction to the sea. The total area is less than two congressional townships in the United States—some 50,000. So marvellous is its fertility and the richness of its climate, that as much as two crops in year can be taken from the soil. All the energies of the people are given to raising Jersey cattle and vegetables. One of its soil alone this little island supports 60,000 inhabitants more than one to each acre of its area. So intense in the style of its farming that the yearly rental of its lands is from \$20 to \$100 per acre. Small as it is there are 2,000 head of cows, with holdings varying from three to thirty acres. Jersey pastures there fore cannot exist and land and grass are so valuable that cattle are never permitted to roam at large. From time immemorial the custom has been to tether all animals and they are moved several times a day. They are always led instead of being driven and the tending is largely done by women. The cows range only a few rods in front of part of the year and are often milked in the fields. Very little grain is fed, but in addition to grass and hay the cattle are liberally supplied with roots, chiefly turnips, which are largely grown for this purpose. Under these conditions a race of highly organized and gentle cattle has been developed. It is at the same time a race of inherent constitutional vigor and in its health and vigor from all causes.

A few Jersey cattle under the name of Alderney were imported in the early part of 1810. The first Alderney is larger animal than the Jersey by some 20 pounds, varying in color from a light red to a dark brown. While these early milkers, they have not equaled the records of the Jerseys. About the year 1880 there were large importations of Jerseys, and by 1870 a number of two thousand animals a year were imported to this country. Jerseys have been so largely imported, have increased so rapidly and have been so largely used for grading and proved adaptable to so wide a range of climate that the characteristic markings of the breed can be seen in the dairies from the St. Lawrence to the Gulf and from ocean to ocean.

So remarkably has been this transfer that there is now in the United States over twenty cows for every Jersey cow that there is in the home of the Jersey in its native country. No breed of cattle count have achieved such universal popularity unless they had possessed extraordinary merit. On feature of this is their handsome appearance. The head of the Jersey is small, short, broad and lean; the muzzle, including under lip, is black or a dark lead color, surrounded by a medley blot of light hair and skin, the eyes are with apart, large, bright and prominent in fact, with its delicate, ears and small neck and steady horns, no animal so much resembles, not of a deer as a high-bred Jersey. The skin itself is of a deep yellow tint, mel low and loose, with a silky hair. They have great power of digestion and are seldom sick of their feed.

Their milk has less water, more solid contents, than the milk of any other breed, often being over one cent of matter fat. Their entire milk is as rich as the cream of some other cows. Two places they occupy without a rival in the family and butter cows. The breeders of this country, with our ample and cheap feeds, have brought the cows of this breed to a higher state of development than they ever knew on their native land. They have increased their size and added to their increasing capacity until the time has come that when our Jersey breeders wish to import their herd they no longer go to the old island, but seek the improved herd of our own country. So many animals of choice pedigree have been brought to this country that we have not space to mention them all, but two famous names of Jersey blood stand out in front from the pens of many of the best milkers there. Anna of the Lombards and the grand animal, Stokes Pogle. In

our own country we will mention the famous cow, Curstus, with the better record of nearly 70 pounds in seven days and over 1,800 pounds, or more than her weight in twelve months. There is one milk field in this Jersey pasture, and the fact of the cow's but of the 1870-1871 herds they have fallen. And that is, they did not have the courage or honesty to stand out the workings. So great was the reputation of a Jersey that in time past everything that had the name and plume of a Jersey could be sold at a high figure.

A CHANCE YOUNG MAN?

Foresters Examinations Will be Held Next Week in Several States

Can you throw a straight-hitch? If you can't you are probably something of a lumberjack, and as such would not be eligible for the examination which will be held next Thursday, Friday and Saturday in seven of the western states. These examinations are for the purpose of finding three hundred or more men well-qualified to fill a position as forest rangers.

National foresters are still new in the United States, and the management of their vast resources is a very difficult task. The business connected with these forests is transacted on the ground. The forest ranger is a Superintendent having direct charge of all the business and being located at some nearby town, and his field force of rangers being scattered throughout the forests. The national forest are vast estates worth many millions of dollars and upon the rangers is a large measure the most valuable heritage of the people.

Applicants should have a fair knowledge of reading, writing and arithmetic. The forest ranger is required to work timber, draw up assessments, make out reports, etc. The work is a hard one, but one that offers a good opportunity for advancement.
