WEST ENDERS HAD CONTROL

Twin Falls Delegation Outnumbered in Convention.

Republican Convention at Buhl Saturday Shows Strength of West-End.

The convention to elect delegates to the state convention held by the Republicans at Buhl, Saturday, was a scrap in any sense of the word but the precincts of Arvon, Buhl and Filer had evidently been preparing for the convention for some time past and easily swung the convention their way by presenting a united front to the Twin Falls delegation which was outnumbered slightly by the combination.

The committee on credentials to which the two contesting delegations from Buhl were referred, decided the matter by seating both and giving them a half vote each.

The convention, in order to facilitate business voted to have all resolutions submitted to a committee on resolutions and not discussion and long speeches. With the one exception the resolutions were thus taken care of and completed by the convention without delay. The only exception being one to adopt the primary system for selecting candidates for the county, which was introduced by Attorney Hays and adopted after some discussion. The resolutions adopted were:

1. We reaffirm our support and support the able administration of President Roosevelt and for his successor, urging the nomination of one who will carry forward the policies already inaugurated.

2. We commend to the side on the fact that our United States Senators, by industry and ability, have become of great force in national legislation and plead our support to the reelection of Senator W. B. Hayward.

3. We express our entire belief in the wisdom and integrity of Governor Frank H. Gooding and give our assurance that his reelection from the position he has so ably filled, he carries with him the confidence and respect of the Republican Party of Twin Falls County.

4. That we realize that the people of Twin Falls County are particularly interested in the membership of the State Board of Land Commissioners and declare our belief that the election of James H. Brady as Governor of the State will play a part in the selection of the board members who are especially fitted through his business experience and knowledge of public affairs, to guard the business-like and capable administration.

5. As a matter of sound government

and of good politics we are opposed to the setting of members of congress as delegates to the National convention, and our delegates to the Wallace convention are instructed to urge the selection of persons as delegates to the Chicago convention who are not interesting places in our national legislation.

When the question of delegates to Wallace and Hays came up it soon became apparent that Twin Falls would have to take a hard seat and take what the west end small town delegates had in way of representation. The Twin Falls crowd took their medicine and the convention closed with apparent harmony.

LARGE CROWD FOR OPENING

Salmon River Opening Will Bring Thousands Into City.

June First Should Prove One of the Biggest Days in the History of the State.

While the opening of the exact date of the Salmon river opening was not made until last week, yet the fact of an opening this summer is known all over the country and every mail brings a large correspondence asking about the opening and terms of sale. It is a safe estimate to put the number who will be in the city at close to ten thousand, if the interest manifested is any criterion.

The opening will be in Twin Falls and under nearly the same terms and arrangements as the other openings of Curry and Lost Rivers. Persons desiring land will be required to register between May 25 and August 10, will be required to deposit a check for the following amounts according to the land desired: 40 acres, \$135.00; 50 acres, \$202.50; 120 acres, \$322.50; 160 acres, \$422.50. The balance of the water right and \$25 per acre for land, the above amounts include the whole cost of filing, recording and securing title. For the balance, the next payment will come in 1910 and be \$2.00 per acre, after which year for four years the yearly payments will be the same \$2.00. After this time the payments will be increased to \$4.00 and the last payment will not come until 1921, thus making very reasonable terms and giving the settler a chance to make his crops pay the yearly installment.

The choice of the opening will be given by bid, each entryman being given a number which number will be recorded and placed in a box to be drawn out by a re-interested committee on the opening day. Power of attorney may be made by out of town applicants, a blank which will be furnished by the Salmon River Irrigation company.

PLAT FILED FOR ELECTRIC ROAD

Electric Line as Surveyed Submitted to the State.

Idaho and Nevada Southern as Surveyed to Pass Through the Twin Falls Tract.

A telegram was received in Twin Falls from the Nevada Southern Railway Co. stating that the proposed electric railroad from Coalinga, on the main line of the O. S. R., to Wells, Nevada, had been surveyed and the plat filed with the secretary of state, showing the proposed route of the road through the Twin Falls tract.

The road would shorten the distance from Twin Falls to Salt Lake about 50 miles and cut off a day's time at least in traveling to the coast, and in every way place this section of the state in closer touch with all points now reached by road about and slow routes. It would give Idaho a larger proportion of tourist travel, because of the many scenic advantages promised to the eastern travelers. It would create markets for Idaho's immense crops, in Nevada's infinite compass, on the Pacific coast. To give all of the advantages is impossible but in brief the project means that Southern Idaho will be in position to make the strongest bids for settlers of any section of the West and would help Twin Falls beyond all reckoning.

The proposed line would make a stretch of road about 125 miles, and would traverse all of the Twin Falls tracts starting from Coalinga, Idaho, crossing the Snake river at Elgin or near Shoshone falls, pass thence south through the Contact mining country and connect with Wells, Nevada, on the Southern Pacific and Western Pacific railroads which are at present completing their project, because it would not have to depend upon the source of water for its supply, during the irrigating season. He was introduced by the club members, to every guest and expressed a lively interest in all matters pertaining to the tract. Much of the spontaneous nature was filled in between the refreshments which were very plentiful. Owing to Mr. Huhl's hastened departure on the six o'clock train the reception planned for the evening was called off.

ing an effort to be given. Sessions of the court and judge meetings were referred to L. E. Salsbery, Commissioner. Whereupon the Board ordered that the County Attorney be authorized to procure necessary witnesses from outside the state in the case of State vs. George Sutherland, and authorized the Auditor to draw warrants upon the contingent fund to defray the expenses of procuring such witnesses, and evidence, without a further order therefor from this Board.

Whereupon the Board considered the petition of George P. Haxton, Road Overseer of District No. 10, and accepted the same, and declared such office vacant.

Whereupon on petition of G. E. Harlan and others, H. Kappelman was appointed Road Overseer of Road District No. 16, and the clerk instructed to notify each road overseer of this appointment, and to advise him to qualify.

Whereupon the resignation of A. A. Hoesie as Road Overseer of road District No. 4 was considered and accepted, and such office was declared vacant.

Whereupon, on petition of W. H. Turner and others, Chas. C. Parks was appointed Road Overseer of road District No. 4, and the Clerk ordered to request such appointee to qualify.

Whereupon the resignation of Roy Williams as Road Overseer of District No. 3, was considered and accepted, and such office was declared vacant.

Whereupon on petition of W. N. Rose and others, F. V. Brownlee was appointed Road Overseer of Road District No. 3, and the Clerk was instructed to request such appointee to qualify.

Whereupon the petition of Hiram Wood and others for the appointment of E. T. Ferguson as Road Overseer of District No. 2 was laid over pending the resolution of P. Lee Johnson on the present of day.

Whereupon the petition of W. E. Lytle and others for a new road running east and west through the center of section 20, township 10 South, range 18 East was laid over until the regular road meeting in May, and the Clerk was instructed to notify the petitioners that such road might be declared a public road at said meeting, provided the petitioners at that time make proper showing to this Board that such road had been properly opened, graded and bridged, free of expense to the County.

Whereupon the petition of H. T. West for closing a portion of the old Kelton Base road across sections 5-16 and 17, in Township 11 South, Range 18 East, was granted on condition that the section line not used as road be left open to accommodate the travel formerly using the old road, and upon the further condition that notices of this order be posted where fences cross such road.

Whereupon the petition of H. Hills for closing a portion of the old Baisley road which crosses the east half of the northeast quarter of section 23, Township 11 South, range 18 East, was granted on condition that he post notices of this order thereon.

Whereupon the Board considered and approved the application for license to sell or use fire arms and weapons of H. H. Orr, and approved the same, and ordered the Sheriff to issue a license therefor for twelve months from April 12, 1908.

Whereupon the application for a liquor license and liquor dealers bond of Patton & Wilson of Bull was considered and action deferred pending a further investigation.

Whereupon the Board took up the matter of the examination of the reports of County officers filed for the first quarter of 1908, and considered and approved reports as follows:

Whereupon the following proceedings were had: Whereupon the Board examined and approved the quarterly report of the following road overseers: R. Williams, Overseer District No. 3; F. E. Nansay, Overseer District No. 8.

Whereupon the Board rejected the Road Overseer report of C. M. Waller, Overseer of road District No. 9, and ordered that it be returned to him for correction and a detailed statement.

Whereupon the application and the

liquor-dealers bond as submitted, of Patton & Wilson of Bull, was approved, and a license renewed for said road for one year from April 12th, 1908.

Whereupon the Board considered the petition of C. F. Johnston and others for a bridge across Twin Falls, Center on the section line between sections 27 and 31, Township 11 South, Range 18 East, and referred such petition to John E. Haxton with power to report.

Whereupon the Board considered the petition of W. Parsons and others for the creation of a new road, to wit: a portion of road District No. 8, and after due consideration the Board granted such petition, and referred that a new road, to wit: be created to be known as Road District No. 11, and bounded and described as follows: the

beginning on the range line between sections 16 and 17 where the same meets the Bigg's Bay road, thence in a westerly direction following shore of High Line canal to the intersection of the same with the section line between sections 28 and 29 of Township 10 South, range 15 east, thence north on said section line to the point where the same intersects the low line of the canal, thence

directly up the low line of the canal to the range line between ranges 16 and 17 east; thence in a westerly direction to the place of beginning.

Whereupon the Board considered the matter of the appointment of a road overseer for the newly created Road District No. 11, and considered the petition of G. W. Parsons and others praying for the appointment of G. W. Parsons as such Road Overseer, and granted such petition, and appointed G. W. Parsons road overseer of District No. 11.

Whereupon the Board considered the application of D. W. Pettijohn for a refund of his taxes for the year 1907, on account of his soldiers exemption, and after satisfactory appearing to the Board that the said D. W. Pettijohn was legally entitled to the soldiers exemption provided for in the Session Laws of 1907, fourth in his affidavit submitted, the Board ordered that the said D. W. Pettijohn be repaid in the sum of \$25.00 in addition to such tax, and authorized the Auditor to draw a warrant on the current expense fund of 1907 in payment of such rebate.

Whereupon the Board considered the application of H. H. Harkness for a refund of his taxes for the year 1907, on account of his soldiers exemption, and after satisfactory appearing to the Board that the said H. H. Harkness was legally entitled to the soldiers exemption provided for in the Session Laws of 1907, second in his affidavit submitted, the Board ordered that the said H. H. Harkness be repaid in the sum of \$75.00 on account of such tax, and authorized the Auditor to draw a warrant on the current expense fund of 1907 in payment of such rebate.

Whereupon the Board considered the application of G. D. Ferguson, A. M. Ferguson, Hazel Ferguson and Lucilla Ferguson for a rebate of \$14.14 each on account of their assessment on section 20, township 10 south, range 18 east, for the tax of the year 1907, and after satisfactory appearing to the Board that such lands were over assessed for the year 1907, on the amount of \$18.14 for each 1/4 acre, and that such over assessment was error, the Board ordered that the said amount of \$14.14 be repaid to each of the following taxpayers to wit: G. D. Ferguson, A. M. Ferguson, Hazel Ferguson and Lucilla Ferguson and that the Auditor be ordered to draw warrants upon the current expense fund of the year 1907 in payment therefor.

Whereupon the Board considered the report of the viewers heretofore appointed to view a road petitioned for by Chichester and others, and found such report incomplete and erroneous and ordered the same laid over for correction until the May meeting of this Board.

Whereupon it having been brought to the attention of the Board that M. P. Saller Overseer of road District No. 7 had removed from said district, the Board investigated the matter and declared a vacancy to exist in the office of Road Overseer of road District No. 7 and thereupon the Board considered a petition from the residents of road District No. 7 for the appointment of C. F. Gleystein as road Overseer and granted said petition, and appointed C. F. Gleystein as road Overseer of road District No. 7.

In the matter of the petition for a public road, to wit: a road designated as the Salmon river segregation, the Board appointed Chas. H. Mull, County Surveyor, Joel W. Craven, and St. John Skinner, as viewers to view such proposed road, and to report their findings to this Board at their statutory road meeting in May.

Whereupon the Board took up the matter of the fixing of the salaries of the county office for the term of two years from a January 1st, 1908, to conform with the statute relative thereto, and after

Senator Borah in his speech of last week defending the president for his action concerning the colored soldiers made good use of his oratorical ability in a way that will bring him recognition from the senatorial body early in his career. To take up an argument against an old and experienced legislator like Foraker would require no small degree of skill, and from all accounts Idaho's Junior Senator made good.

The Times this week received a circular letter from the editor of the Farm Journal published at Philadelphia asking that a protest be made against a bill curtailing the liberty of the press. The Times does not know what the nature of the proposed bill will be, and for that reason does not care to enter any protest. If the bill is aimed at merely the curtailment of the license of the press and not the liberty, such a bill would be a godsend, as will be publications which urge destruction of property and violation and disregard of law would be prevented from spreading their gospel. If it is the real liberty of the journalism which is threatened and a press censorship established upon the American soil of freedom, then the publishers would have occasion to be alarmed. But the latter contingency seems remote.

The republicans in adopting the primary election for selecting candidates for the county have at least made a step in the right direction. The primary system has been used in a number of states and has without exception proven so successful in cutting out the manipulation of politicians that it may be said to come the nearest of reaching public opinion of any of the various systems. Twin Falls county will be the first in this state to swing into the line of progress and it is a matter in which the citizens who believe in clean politics should rejoice. It gives no chance for the politician save as he goes before the voters and gets his name upon the ticket by petition signed by the voters to the number of one hundred. And then it means that he must come personally to the voter and show cause why he should be given support. He

must come before the voter, upon his own record, for endorsement and not get onto the ticket by devious methods common to the political ring. The primary in this county as it will be used for the first time may not result altogether as the people desire, but it does not give any blame to their own lack of interest and energy. The trading which has characterized every political convention will not avail because each delegate to the county convention really is bound by the vote of his precinct to carry out the result of that vote and a deviation from it would mean for him political oblivion.

The increase of the levy has brought some of the best arguments on both sides of the question which have ever been given on the floor of the national assembly according to the eastern dailies and in the debates the men who have favored such increase have had the best of the argument because of the President's support, given in no weak manner.

Prior to the recent Hague Conference it had been my hope that an agreement could be reached between the different nations to limit the increase of naval armaments, and especially to limit the size of war-ships. Under these circumstances I felt that the construction of one battle ship a year would keep our navy up to its then positive and relative strength, but actual experience showed not merely that it was impossible to obtain such an agreement for the limitation of armaments among the various leading powers, but that there was no likelihood whatever of obtaining it in the future within any reasonable time. Coincidentally with this discovery occurred a radical change in the building of battleships among the great military nations, a change in accordance with which the modern battleships have been or are being constructed of a size and armament which doubles or more probably triples their effectiveness. Every other great naval nation has or is building a number of ships of this kind; we have provided for but two, and therefore the balance of power is now inclining against us. Under these conditions to provide for but one or two battle ships a year is to provide that this nation instead of advancing shall go backward in naval rank and relative power among the great nations. Such a course would be unwise for us if we froned merely on one ocean, and it is doubly unwise when we front on two oceans.

The most important result of the agitation over the regulation and control of corporations which has been going on for the past three years is likely to be realized, not in the imposition of heavy fines on a few corporate

violators of law, nor even in the adoption of restrictive legislation, but rather in the acceptance, by the great corporations themselves, of the principles which have come to be associated as representing President Roosevelt's policy in relation to this subject. These principles include, first public control for corporations engaged in those lines of industry in which competition is lacking or is ineffective as a means of insuring just treatment of the consumer; second publicity of accounts as a protection against extortion or illegal operations; third, physical vacation of plant as a prerequisite to intelligent regulation of rates in the case of corporations engaged in providing public utilities. Already a considerable number of those exercising authority over the greatest corporations in the country have embraced those principles. Although it is less than two years since the Hepburn Rate Law for regulation of railroads, so bitterly opposed at the time by most of the railway managers of the country, was adopted by congress, many of the men who fought it strenuously in formation have gone on record as approving it in operation. It is noteworthy, too, that those who have so expressed themselves for the most part are representatives of the greatest and strongest systems in the country such as the Pennsylvania, Van derbilt, and Rock Island groups. They hold that the incidental drawbacks of the law were more than counterbalanced by the advantages it confers in relieving the roads from a drain of a vast amount of enforced from transportation and in taking them out of politics. It is only a few weeks since Judge E. H. Gary, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Steel Trust, declared his belief in the propriety of public control and in the publication of explicit information in reference to financial operations, which is excellently illustrated by the reports of his own company—Outlook.

Grand-Naval Review

Each day now increases the interest of the American public in the progress of Admiral Evans' battleship fleet. Each day we draw nearer to San Francisco, and the final grand maneuvers are anticipated, the excellent provisions, and the thrill of excitement being contrasted with the splendor of loyal citizens, for "breathes there a man with soul so dead Who never to himself hath said 'This is mine own native land?'" April 18th, witnessed the arrival of the fleet at San Pedro harbor, the triumphant entrance being heralded by a bombardment of whistles, cheers and jubilation undecipherable, broken brief whistles by those aged silences which only intense interest can create. The ships stretched from the San Pedro breakwater three miles eastward across the blue waters of the Pacific, and fortunate were the people of Southern California who were permitted to witness this one of the greatest of naval parades in the history of the world. The fleet broke from San Diego harbor early in the morning, striking along

the coast for its hundred miles of sublime beauty, the Connecticut leading the way. The bluffs along the coast were lined with tens of thousands of interested watchers, who can, if they possess language, full fit, describe to future generations, a naval spectacle such as may never again be witnessed in those waters, a spectacle of peace and not of war, and still one, in less striking and impressive appearance than an array of destruction.

San Pedro harbor was the objective point after leaving San Diego bay and the run was made in rapid time. Hours before the anticipated arrival, the beach and the tides in the vicinity of the harbor were thronged with countless excited, enthusiastic spectators. At two in the afternoon, the watchtowers at Point Conception sounding their eyes cast toward the breakers off of the bay, saw a black smudge upon the horizon, then a yellow speck hung between the blue sky and the blue bay, wavered and instant and then turned toward along the shore line. The yellow speck grew into the three funnels and below they appeared the white hull of the Connecticut—she in the distance, and dim through the low hanging smoke haze. Another yellow speck followed the first and then another, and another, and in the picture grew until the whole fleet appeared in view, a grand array of sixteen mighty battleships in one unbroken line. Over the waters, fat and far away, the villages of Long Beach gave a rapturous welcome and San Pedro was not far behind in joining in the clamor. There was no sound from the Great White Squadron until the impressive onward sweep of the mighty engines. At a post two miles from the shore, a string of black funnels from the Connecticut, Hagstaff, and the flagship paddled across the broad waters. At twenty minutes past three another signal was sent up from the Connecticut and those who had guesses saw the great anchor—pulled downward, and the long line came to a stop, according to a straight as an arrow across the hazy moon bay.

This is but an inadequate description of the spectacle which only the eyes and the soul can fully interpret, and if this were to be the end of the fleets cruise it would still be a recollection to treasure in memory; but the demonstration in American waters is not yet begun, as the fleet is steaming northward to the New River, by the San Francisco Bay, and there will take place the great maneuvers that are far from any past possible analogies in the days of lower California. And it will not be the fleet that impresses the throngs of San Diego and San Pedro that, to be sure, will be present, but an vastly augmented fleet that will include 48 vessels of all classes—truly an impressive assemblage. The festivities in and around San Francisco will extend through a period of ten days from May 14th to 15th the grand review taking place on May 8th. What was expected in impressiveness with the arrival of the fleet at San Diego and San Pedro, will be repeated at San Francisco, but it will be increased one hundred fold. California Dives at San Diego and San Pedro, but she whole nation will be at San Francisco for the honor of country is never better expressed than in the pride of Army and Navy, land in this case the pride does not express the exultation of destruction and war, but the pride of power, that makes for peace. The nation prides; the nation is proud of the "honor navy" and the nation, or as much of its citizenship as can steal away, will be present at San Francisco to bid welcome to the Great White Squadron. It will truly be a grand demonstration and such a one as may never be witnessed again.
