Twin Falls to Receive Visit from Capitalists

Three Special Cars to Leave Chicago May 19 and Remain Here a Short Time

Forty bankers and head officers of big building companies in some of the largest cities in the east, middle west and the south are coming to southern Idaho this month to look over the country, and it is expected the result of the visit will be that more capital will come into Idaho's great irrigated empire for further development.

The party will leave Chicago in three private cars on the evening of May 19 and will remain in southern Idaho one week.

The visitors will not be persons holding minor offices in banking and bonding companies but will be the very heads of these companies and their visit, it is considered, will be for the most important to southern Idaho of any visit of any party in the past.

The visitors will first look over the great Twin Falls tract and the new Salmon River project and their investigations on these tracts, it is firmly believed, may be almost positively stated, will result in the party becoming interested financially in southern Idaho and with their money starting new irrigation and other enterprises.

The party, it is known, having become interested in large irrigation enterprises and it is expected will take it over, although no definite plan along this line is available for publication at this time.

SUDDEN DEATH OF PIONEER

J. N. McMaster of This City Called Away.

One of the First Settlers on Tract Dies After Short Illness of Typhoid Pneumonia.

The community was shocked and saddened on Tuesday by the death of Mr. John N. McMaster from typhoid pneumonia after a very brief sickness. The news was a surprise to many because of the fact that for years of his sickness, Mr. McMaster was not an old man, and was apparently in robust health up to the time of his illness.

The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon from the residence on Sixth avenue at two o'clock.

The deceased came to this section from Idaho, where he had been engaged in stock raising and had been near Kimberly where he had one of the best farms on the tract made up by his great energy and thrift about a year ago Mr. McMaster rented his farm and moved to this city where the family has since resided. Mr. McMaster's demise is doubly sad because he leaves a large family of young children, his wife and mother having died about a year ago. The deceased leaves a brother, C. A. McMaster in this city, besides his children, to whom the sympathy of the whole city goes out in their sadness.

MAMMOTH ORDER FOR THE SALMON

Cement for Dam Purchased in Utah.

Will Bring 16 Trains of 20 Cars Each to Twin Falls. Will be used for Salmon River Dam.

A contract for 60,000 barrels of cement, which will cost approximately \$200,000 and which will be used in the construction of the big dam to be built in the Salmon river about 20 miles south of Twin Falls, was let today by R. Shaw by D. C. MacWaters of Milner the general manager of Twin Falls Salmon River Land & Water company which has charge of the Salmon river project.

The contract, which is the largest cement contract ever let in connection with irrigation enterprises, is also the largest ever placed between a wholesale dealer and a company within the history and growth of irrigation. To fill the contract will require 16 trains of 20 cars each, the total area aggregating 2,700,000 pounds. Shipments of cement according to the contract will commence in a short time from Devils Slide, Utah to Twin Falls, from which place the barrels of cement will be freighted across the 30 miles intervening between that place and the site of the dam on Salmon river.

With the placing of this big contract assurance beyond a doubt is given that the electric line now building from Milner to Gooding will be extended through the Salmon river country to connect with the Southern Pacific at Wells Nevada.

The cement called for by the contract will be a small part of the cost of the dam, but the cement alone will cost about \$200,000. The dam which will be 210 feet high and will form a reservoir for waters of the Salmon river of about 600,000 acre feet it is estimated will cost \$1,000,000, and will be constructed of solid masonry, with the concrete contracted for by the company. In addition to the masonry work on the dam there will be about a quarter of a million spent in the construction of tunnels leading from the dam to the canal from which the water will be obtained to irrigate the lands under the project.

The contract closed this morning gives assurance that the dam will be built as rapidly as possible and that the project will be consummated. Mr. Shaw, who was successful in landing the big contract, stated that he has been over the land along the project and that it is about the finest land in the state, being much the same as

CONCESSIONS FOR AN ELEVATOR

City Council Give Additional Right of Way.

Regular Session Held Monday Night. Sprinkling Contract Let—The Water Question Solved.

Upon application of Millen Brothers of Denver, Colorado, the city council granted a right of way to the O. S. L. to put in a spur through ninth, tenth and eleventh avenues in blocks 147, 153 and 151 for the purpose of getting trackage for a twenty thousand dollar elevator which the above men have contracted to put in Twin Falls. The town ship company having sold them steps for the mill.

The council discussed the sewer problem and on Wednesday night met again to pass an ordinance creating the new district.

A license was granted to L. S. Pratt to put in a saloon within the corporate limits.

The question of the water pressure for the city was finally solved by the plan to put in a check in the low line canal so as to keep a steady flow from that source which, with the heavy gravity fall, should insure plenty of water for the pressure.

The sprinkling contract for the year was let to S. M. Peterson who agreed to furnish man and team for four dollars per day.

The street commissioner was given permission to purchase a horse and high wagon for his use in superintending the streets.

An additional light was ordered put in at the corner of Ninth avenue and Twelfth street.

In order to abate the dog nuisance the council created an office of dogcatcher and elected W. M. Oik to fill the position.

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Mr. Shaw, to make a vigorous effort to have this line extended to Boise, which will thus be given another transcontinental railroad into the city and thus provide us with competition, would mean greatly reduced freight rates and better service.

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The amount to be paid, which will require about 25 cars, will when it arrives at Twin Falls, require four times as many wagon loads before it will be deposited at its destination. The right of the big dam, labor will be in demand, teams will be in demand and wagons in which to haul the cement will be necessitated. The company will have about 2,000 men at work during the coming summer, some being employed in the construction of the railroad, others employed on the dam and still others employed plating new towns for the Salmon river tract and preparing to take care of the settlers who will make their advent into the country at June 1, when the first big opening of 80,000 acres in this tract will be held by the company at Twin Falls.

ing to that between eight readings of the court and legal proceedings was to be held on the 12th of April.

Whereupon the Board ordered that the County Attorney be authorized to prepare necessary witnesses from outside the state in the case of State vs. George Statham, and authorized the Auditor to draw warrants upon the county fund to defray the expenses of procuring such witnesses, and evidence, without a further order therefor from this Board.

Whereupon the Board considered the resignation of George E. Hinchey as Road Overseer of District No. 7, and accepted the same, and declared such office vacant.

Whereupon on petition of G. E. Hinchey and others, the Board appointed R. M. Overcup as Road Overseer of District No. 7, and the clerk instructed to notify such road overseer of this appointment and request him to qualify.

Whereupon the petition of W. H. Turner and others, the Board considered and declared vacant the office of Road Overseer of District No. 4, and the Clerk ordered to request such appointee to qualify.

Whereupon the resignation of J. W. Williams as Road Overseer of District No. 3, was considered and accepted, and such office was declared vacant.

Whereupon on petition of W. N. Aase and others, F. V. Brownlee was appointed Road Overseer of District No. 3, and the Clerk was instructed to request such appointee to qualify.

Whereupon the petition of Hiram Nickell and others for the appointment of H. E. James as Road Overseer of District No. 2, was considered and accepted, and the Clerk was instructed to request such appointee to qualify.

Whereupon the petition of W. E. Lytle and others for a new road running east and west through the center of section 20, Township 11 South Range 18 East, was laid over until the regular road meeting in May, and the Clerk was instructed to notify the petitioners that such road might be declared a public road at said meeting provided petitioners then at that time in proper showing to the Board that such road had been properly opened, graded and filled, free of expense to the County.

Whereupon on petition of H. J. West for closing a portion of the old Idaho-Railroad road across sections 15-16 and 17, in Township 11 South Range 18 East, was granted on condition that the section line not be used as a road to the extent to accommodate the travel formerly using the old road, and upon the further condition that notice of this order be posted where travelers come such road.

Whereupon the petition of U. R. Rilla for closing a portion of the old Boise-Celina road which crosses the east half of the northeast quarter of section 23, Township 11 South Range 18 East, was granted on condition that he post notices of this order thereon.

Whereupon the Board considered and approved the application for license of liquor dealers held by H. E. and W. E. and approved the same, and ordered the Sheriff to issue a license thereunder for twelve months, from April 12th 1918.

Whereupon the application for a liquor license and liquor dealers held by Patton & Wilson of Butte was considered and action deferred pending a further investigation.

Whereupon the Board took up the matter of the examination of the reports of County officers filed for the first quarter of 1918, and considered and approved reports as follows:

Whereupon the following proceedings were had: Whereupon the Board considered and approved this quarterly report of the following road overseers, R. M. Williams, Overseer District No. 3, F. E. Ramsey, Overseer District No. 4.

Whereupon the Board rejected the Road Overseers report of C. M. Waller, Overseer of Road District No. 9, and ordered that he be returned to him for correction and a definite answer.

Whereupon the application and the

Board did as bond as amended, of Patton & Wilson of Butte, was approved and a license ordered issued therefor for one year from April 12th 1918.

Whereupon the Board considered the petition of C. F. Johnston and others for a portion of road District No. 11, and after due consideration the Board granted such petition, and ordered that a new road district be created to be known as Road District No. 11, and bounded and described as follows: Beginning on the corner, the intersection of Section 17 where the same intersects the High Line road, thence in a westerly direction following "old" the High Line road to the intersection of the same with the section line between sections 25 and 28 of Township 10 South Range 18 East, thence north on said section line to the point where the same intersects the line between sections 25 and 28 of Township 10 South Range 18 East, thence south on the section line to the intersection of the same with the High Line road, thence east to the place of beginning.

Whereupon the Board considered the matter of the appointment of a road overseer for the newly created Road District No. 11 and considered the petition of G. W. Parsons and others praying for the appointment of G. W. Parsons as Road Overseer, and appointed G. W. Parsons as Road Overseer of District No. 11.

Whereupon the Board considered the application of D. W. Pettigrew for a refund of his taxes for the year 1917, on account of his soldiers exemption, and it satisfactorily appearing to the Board that the said D. W. Pettigrew was legally entitled to the soldiers exemption provided for in the Soldiers' Exemption Law of 1917, as set forth in his affidavit submitted, the Board ordered that the said D. W. Pettigrew be refunded in the sum of \$20.08 on account of such tax, and authorized the Auditor to draw a warrant on the current expense fund of 1917 in payment of such rebate.

Whereupon the Board considered the application of H. E. Hinchey for a refund of his taxes for the year 1917, on account of his soldiers exemption, and it satisfactorily appearing to the Board that the said H. E. Hinchey was legally entitled to the soldiers exemption provided for in the Soldiers' Exemption Law of 1917, as set forth in his affidavit submitted, the Board ordered that the said H. E. Hinchey be refunded in the sum of \$2.50 on account of such tax, and authorized the Auditor to draw a warrant on the current expense fund of 1917 in payment of such rebate.

Whereupon the Board considered the application of G. D. Ferguson, A. M. Ferguson, Hazel Ferguson and Lucile Ferguson for a rebate of \$13.11 each on account of over assessment on section 23 Township 11 South Range 18 East, for the taxes of the year 1917. And it satisfactorily appearing to the Board that such lands were over assessed for the year 1917 to the amount of \$13.11 for each 160 acres, and that such over assessment was error, the Board ordered that the said amount of \$13.11 be rebated to each of the following taxpayers: G. D. Ferguson, A. M. Ferguson, Hazel Ferguson and Lucile Ferguson. And it is ordered that the Auditor be directed to draw warrants of a current expense fund of the year 1917 in payment therefor.

Whereupon the Board considered the report of the viewers heretofore appointed to view a new road petitioned for by Chamberlain and others, and found such report incomplete and erroneous and ordered the same laid over for correction until the May meeting of this Board.

Whereupon it having been brought to the attention of the Board that M. J. Shilling Overseer of Road District No. 7, had removed from said district, the Board investigated the matter and declared a vacancy to exist in the office of Road Overseer of Road District No. 7, and thereupon the Board considered a petition from the residents of Road District No. 7 for the appointment of C. F. Ghyssels as Road Overseer and granted said petition, and appointed C. F. Ghyssels as Road Overseer of Road District No. 7.

In the matter of the petition for a public road through and every section in the 14th and 15th designed as the Saline over irrigation, the Board appointed Chas. H. Mull, County Surveyor, and J. W. Craven, and St. John Sklar, as viewers to view such proposed roads, and to report their findings to the Board at their statutory road meeting in May.

Whereupon the Board took up the matter of the fixing of the salaries of the county officers for the term of a two years from January 1919, in conformity with the statute relative thereto, and after

The resolutions of a republican convention cover a multitude of sins—in the eyes of the convention. Wait and see what the voter thinks on election day.

Robert LaFollett of the Badger state has been gaining in his following in this county, and is the only candidate of the republican party that seems to have made a hit with the working men.

During the past week Judge Smith had the pleasure of fining a couple of parties for reckless driving upon the crowded main streets and with it gave some good advice to the reckless motorists. In one instance a man was struck by the team and thrown into the gutter, in the second case the teamster contained his fierce pace despite the fact that a number of little children were directly in his path and had to hustle to reach a safe place. The action of the court is to be commended and it is to be hoped that the lesson will have its effect on all drivers. The habit of rapid driving around corners and over crossings is getting too common and should be treated as any other offense against public safety.

District Attorney Jerome of New York city recently criticized the press because of its unrelenting to commercial interests and made the claim that four large department stores of that city controlled the utterance of the dailies entirely. Mr. Jerome is often radical in his assertions, but he certainly hit the nail on the head for once. But his assertion is not only true of the city papers but of a large number of country publications which during the political campaigns seem to look for the fastest pocketbook before making their choice of candidates and party. It is becoming so true every year that a man who would hesitate to attempt to bribe the average citizen, will openly offer a newspaper money for his editorial support. Such offers make the editor with a conscience feel like committing murder, but he is only reaping the harvest which the general subservience of the press has sown in past campaigns.

With the opening of spring increased progress has been made on the Government's vast Reclamation Service plans in the West. Few realize how extensive are these undertakings or how important they are to the home-seeker. The work as a whole rivals the Panama Canal in the labor and expense involved. The employment of 10,000 men and the expenditure of \$1,250,000 every month are but incidents in the service. Already the canals completed reach a total of 1,615 miles—as far as from New York to Denver. Homes have been made for ten thousand families where before was desert. In the past five years \$33,000,000 has been spent, and the enterprises already planned will add more than a hundred millions to this sum. Nor is this money spent in one locality. In New Mexico one of the largest dams in the world

is being constructed. In California and Nevada great reservoirs and irrigation plants are being built. In western Kansas the best sugar raisers are to have a \$250,000 plant for pumping the "underflow," or the sheet water found a few feet beneath the top soil, of the Arkansas River Valley to the surface, that ditches may be filled and crops made certain. On seven great projects, involving the expenditure of \$51,000,000 and the reclamation of over a million acres, the benefit is directly to the Northwest. These projects lie in North and South Dakota, Montana and Washington. In these states lands that have been considered as worthless except for the coarsest kind of grazing are being transformed into productive farms. In South Dakota the largest earth dam in the world is being constructed, that ninety thousand acres of land may be made fertile, while just east of the Yellowstone Park is being built a solid wall of masonry 310 feet high to hold back the waters of the Shoshone river until a reservoir ten square miles, capable of irrigating a hundred thousand acres, is formed. The production of these irrigated lands is marvelous. In the Grand River Valley of Colorado a tract of 100 acres supports fifteen families, with a tonnage of 30 persons. In a single season this land produced 418,000 worth of peaches from trees three to seven years old. Another quarter-section, half of which is in grain and the remainder in fruit, has for several years produced \$30,000 a year. This dense population brings with it definite social advantages. In this valley, of the fourteen school districts all but one have two or more teachers each; a perfect telephone system, rural mail service and good roads make it more like suburban territory than a country section. Nor is the service

of reclamation confined to putting water on the land; it is also devoted to taking surplus water off the soil. Recent surveys have shown that in a northern Minnesota district 400,000 acres of swamp land can be reclaimed through drainage at a cost of less than \$5 an acre. When this is done, it will be worth \$50 to \$100 an acre. This is a part of the work to be done during the coming season.—Outlook.

STREETS RENUMBERED.**Council Makes Radical Change in Present Inadequate Plan.**

At the meeting of the council last night it was voted to name the streets and avenues in such a manner as to make possible ease in distinguishing the various sections of the city. The present way of naming the streets has always proved a puzzle to anyone but a real estate man, and has resulted in many ridiculous mistakes due to the confusion of the names of the streets and the names of the buildings. The two main thoroughfares Main street and Shoshone avenue. After considerable discussion, in which several business men participated it was decided to make Shoshone avenue the starting point of the avenue and Main street for the avenues.

Shoshone avenue will be changed to Shoshone street and will conform to the rest of the streets running parallel to it, and the street west of it will be known and named as second street west, the street beyond that as third street west and so on to the last street lying in the west end of the city, all of which streets will be distinguished by the description west after their number.

The streets running east will be called second street east, third street east and so on to the end of the city limits.

Main street will be renamed Main avenue and will thus parallel the avenues numbered consecutively each direction from Main avenue distinguished only by its direction north or south of the initial avenue.

A. D. Johnson appeared before the council with a proposition to sink a well down to attempt to get artesian water, without expense to the city only with the agreement that in case such water is found the city would let it over for use. The matter was left for the consideration of the commercial club.

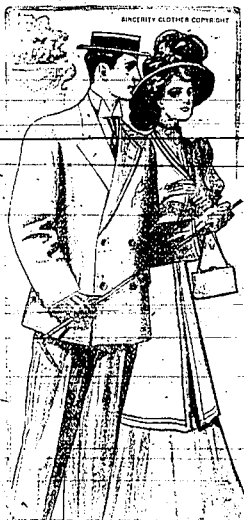

CONFERENCE OF EXECUTIVES.

Gov. Gooding and Advisers Will Attend Session Called By President.

Governor P. R. Gooding will leave for Washington, D. C., on Friday to attend the conference, when the governors of every state in the Union will confer with President Roosevelt upon "The Conservation of the Natural Resources of the Country." Each governor attending the conference will be accompanied by three representatives for his state, to be known as "advisers." P. J. Johnson of Wallace, E. H. Hoover of Boise and F. H. Milner will in this capacity represent the Gem state.

The conference will be held in the "Blue room of the White House, May 13, when President Roosevelt will call the opening session to order. The governors of all the states have signified their intention of being present.

Besides the governors and their advisers, representatives of all the important national organizations, the welfare of which depends in greater or less degree upon the conservation of the natural resources, will be in attendance, and, further, the president has invited five special guests to act as "advisers at large" to the conference.

Grover Cleveland, the only living ex-president of the United States, will, health permitting, be one of these advisers. The others will be William J. Bryan, Andrew Carnegie, James J. Hill and John Mitchell.

Never in the history of the country have the governors of all the states assembled in convention for any purpose whatsoever. Considered simply as an epoch making event, the conference will easily take rank with any assembly of public men ever held in the civilized world, for at this meeting the entire government of the United States in the persons of that government's heads will be assembled together at one time. If for no other reason, the public will be interested in the conference because of this fact.

The range of subjects will cover the entire program of national conservation—preservation of existing forests and reforestation of lands at present producing nothing; storage of surplus waters; inland waterways, irrigation, conservation of minerals—coal, iron, silver and the preservation of places of historic interest; relations of waterways to transportation; and the relation of railways to water lines of carriage; prevention of floods and their consequent destruction of life and property; care of the range lands of the west—their grazing and proper utilization. These are a few of the grand divisions of the question to be discussed at the conference.

FOR FOREST PROTECTION.

Idaho, Oregon and Washington Have Organizations.

One of the most important economic movements of the day about which the general public has yet learned little is the concerted action of owners of timber in different parts of the country in organizing associations to protect their holdings from fire. In the Pacific Northwest, the Washington Forest Fire Association has just elected officers at Seattle and begun work for the year with 3,000,000 acres under its care. The plans include a system of patrol by rangers resembling the work done by the United States Forest Service in guarding against and extinguishing fires.

Organizations of similar kind and for a like purpose are at work in Oregon and Idaho. In the latter State, a portion of the expense is borne by taxation and paid from the State treasury. A western railroad company which holds large tracts of timber has taken steps to guard its property from fire, and during the short time that its plans have been in operation, it has met with most encouraging success.

Similar work is being done on the outside of the continent. Forest owners in Maine have gone as far as the same systematic way to control the forest's great enemy, fire. Like organizations are found in other parts of the country, showing how fully it is now realized that protection against fire is of the greatest importance.

It is safe to say that fires in this country have destroyed more timber than lumbermen have cut. When timber was abundant, the waste passed almost unnoticed, but now that a scarcity is at hand and an actual wood famine threatens in the near future, the owners of forest lands are waking up and taking action to save what is left.
