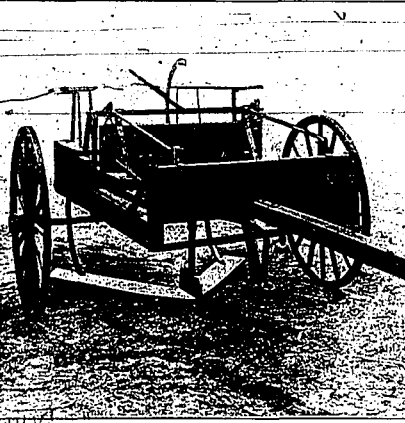

The board of pardons have commuted Harry Howard's sentence to life imprisonment, thus making possible the use of his testimony in case evidence is found in order to secure a conviction of the ex-prizefighter.

The Times received a pamphlet in which was a resume of the Congressional record showing the various legislative accomplishments of Senator Heyburn. Whatever may be Senator Heyburn's faults, his record shows clearly that he has worked faithfully for this state and should receive the commendation of his constituency.

In commenting on the call for bond by the city council, the Times wishes to make but two points which in themselves are of vital interest to every tax payer and voter. First that the present adequate protection cannot be given the city records and that if a fire should occur nothing can be done to replace the records then destroyed, the monetary loss being the result. Second, the objection of the tax payer against further burden of taxation is that the increase will be so slight even this year that the increase in value to every farm on the tract will more than offset it.

Some time ago an ordinance was passed by the city council forbidding bicyclists from using the sidewalks of the city as cycle paths and making infringement of such ordinance punishable by a stiff fine. So far no arrests have been made and as far as the Times can ascertain no attention is paid to the ordinance by the bicyclists who continually use the sidewalks in preference to the road. The Times has several different occasions called attention to the danger to the street and older persons alike from the swiftly and softly flying wheels and now again wishes to call attention to the breaking of the ordinance by the high time that some of the bicyclist

be made to obey the laws of public safety.

HOW TO KEEP GOOD ROADS

The good roads recently constructed in many States are being worn down by automobile. The racing machines flash by one like motor, making thick clouds of dust; often, for some moments, the foot-passenger, the cyclist, or the traveler by carriage is unable to proceed. At present the innocent motorist suffers from the reckless racer. Meanwhile roads everywhere are going out of repair, to the disgust of all who use them and especially the farmers. Long since the farmers discovered that good roads added to their prosperity in many ways. The remedy for the rapid wearing out of some of the New Jersey highways will be watched with interest where improved roads are being laid, a light binder clay and gravel is added to the second coating of stone, and to this asphaltum oil is applied. The oil works in between the gravel and the stone, and the usual top-dressing is then applied and the road rolled. It is then that the oil attaches itself to the top-dressing firmly. Not only in this kind of road harter, but the dust has no such chance to accumulate as in the old-fashioned highway. The construction of roads under this system ought to reduce the cost of maintenance by half, besides adding materially to the comfort of all those who use the road in any way, and that of those who live near by.—The Outlook.

Whether the Short Line ever estimates the number of the people of this city or don't care is a matter of indifference to this much is certain that if the above named railroad cannot be marked-up the time for the passenger train from one to two hours ahead of time that it gets in, an appeal will be made to the headquarters to see if correct information cannot be had about the running time of the branch train. Scarcely a day passes but what business men are compelled to wait for the information necessary to hours for the uncertain coming of the passenger. The Times does not know or presume to say where the blame lies, but it does know that the running time of the branch train after leaving Minidoka does not vary five minutes from two hours and fifteen minutes without information to make the trip to Twin Falls, and if the departure of the train out of Minidoka was correctly reported to the station, people would not have to wait more than five minutes at the outside where they are now compelled to wait one or two hours without information to make the trip to Twin Falls, and if the furnished them outside of a faulty bulletin, which is not changed even after the hour passes beyond the time marked up on it. A report from Minidoka at the departure of the train on the branch would give this city two hours notice and to away with the present complaint. Twin Falls is

putting enough money into the coffers of the company to entitle this city to at least a correct report of its one-train a day.

THE WORLD TO TELL OF

The world is full of men on national holidays that fill the air with shouts and fairly work themselves into a frenzy of supposedly patriotic fervor. EVERY patriotic campaign finds a number of men—patriots before the people as the sailors of the country from rules and discipline. Every Altio town and village has its quota of blind-eyed souls ever ready to tell how the country should be run and with waving tongues arouse their patriotism. On the other hand a large majority of the real patriots are quietly going about their business and by thrift and industry of building up, not only their own business, but making public opinion for the uplift of all mankind. Little passes their lips of insouciance and vain vauntings of deeds for much of work and auto holidays for idle words and dreams. Men of brains and gao common sense throughout the history of this country have been so full of patriotic plans that patriotic phrases come heavily from their tongues. Yet the Citizens—respected the truth that they unhesitatingly left those places of business for the field of battle, and fought as they had worked, silently and unmercifully, while the corner loafer still settled the war from the next beside the stove and the indolent citizen at the front. The war has passed and with it have passed many of its defenders and traders alike. National conditions have changed, but not the people who make up our cosmopolitan citizenship. Still can we see the large majority of the "Citizens" workers and wealth producers. 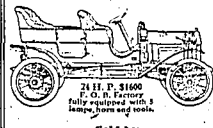
