

REAL DEMOCRATIC HARMONY IN STATE

State Convention at Wallace Splits Party

ANTI-DUBOIS CROWD REFUSE TO GO TO WALLACE

Dubois While Not a Candidate Holds Whip Hand of Party and Nominates Full Ticket.

The Anti-Dubois faction after holding the convention controlled by Dubois made a record for itself this afternoon by organizing, adopting a platform and nominating a full ticket with the exception of supreme judges. Judge Stockinger was nominated for United States senator and Moses Alexander of Ada county named for governor.

Within six minutes after the roll call, J. P. Forby was on the rostrum in a speech denouncing the manner in which "care" rules are being handled and attempted and declared that the majority of the votes of qualified delegates had followed the exodus. He called for nominations for temporary chairman and within two minutes Judge Stockinger of Hailey had been elected by acclamation and had taken his seat. F. G. Burroughs of Caldwell was elected temporary secretary also by acclamation.

A motion that Bowick of Boise be made sergeant at arms was voted and received no second. "This is a real Democratic convention," yelled George Tannahill, "and we don't need any sergeant at arms, nor any tickets of admission. Cheers and laughter followed his rally."

The caucus of anti-Dubois delegates Wednesday morning voted unanimously to enter the convention, submitting the contents of five counties to the credentials committee.

vention to order at 11 o'clock. Prayer was offered by Rev. Neland, followed by a speech of welcome by Mayor Toole and vocal solo by local talent. Lockhart directed the secretary to announce the roll-call provided by the state committee. Ada county was omitted from the roll-call and the Dubois delegates in all other counties were prohibited to vote. No protest was entered and Glenn P. McKinley was elected temporary chairman; the anti-Dubois people refusing to vote at all. Prechiner was nominated by Lincoln county but declined. McKinley promised to be fair in his rulings and J. L. Conant of Shoshone was elected temporary secretary.

A motion was made and carried to call the roll of counties for the appointment of a credentials committee. "Parliamentary" to protest against the appointment of members from the contested counties. He was declared out of order and Sergeant-at-Arms Wourms was directed to force him to his seat. He had completed his protest, however, for the first county. A motion was made for each county to enter in a protest for each county. It was finally finally taking the floor to demand that the protest be prevented.

Stockinger aroused great enthusiasm in an impassioned speech against the rule and fair treatment from the Democratic committee. Day of Shoshone and Saritoga of Idaho, heeded the protest to be entered, but both were declared out of order. Frequent interruptions ensued in a effort to shut out protests, but one was entered in each of the counties. Duboisites frequently demanded that the protesters be forced to keep still. The credentials committee organization and resolutions committee were appointed after which the convention adjourned until 3 o'clock.—Pocatello Tribune.

RIVAL COMPANIES MAKE AGREEMENT

North and South Side Irrigation Magnates Get Together.

500,000 ACRES TO BE IRRIGATED UNDER JOINT COMPANY

Water Rights of Both Twin Falls North and South Side Land & Water Companies Ullike to Irrigate Owyhee County.

Whatever differences there were between the Buhl Interests and the Kuhn brothers concerning the proposed construction of a project of immense proportions in Owyhee county to be known as the Twin arc-Duane project, have been amicably settled, and the new enterprise is apparently the brainchild of the original Land & Water company, the original Twin Falls company, with the cooperation of the North Side company, combining all the forces which have been interested in the building up of the Twin Falls country.

At the meeting of the state land board Monday, at which it was expected the rival factions both having applications on file would present the claims for the segregation and the feasibility of the segregation and the project of the original Land & Water company, and J. L. Holtzler of Chicago, and J. L. Perrine of Twin Falls representing Kuhn-brothers and associated capitalists appeared and withdrew the proposal filed by them in favor of the Buhl or Twin Falls Land & Water company. Mr. Purdy stated that all water rights mentioned in their proposal would be transferred to the Twin Falls company, thus insuring it an additional water supply.

The board voted that the Twin Falls Land & Water company be allowed to amend their proposal so as to include all land susceptible of irrigation in addition to the 337,000 acres set forth in their application. Mr. Holtzler, near James Stephenson, Jr., was directed to make another report, covering the same land, fully and upon the plans as amended by the company after they have completed surveys relative to any extensions contemplated.

As a result of the compromise it is probable that the project may be nearer the size proposed by the Kuhn brothers, approximately 500,000 acres, as the Twin Falls Land & Water company, interested will be available.

An application for the segregation of 500,000 acres in Owyhee county, lying between the Salmon river and the Bruneau projects, was made last March by W. S. Kuhn, J. S. Kuhn and J. L. Holtzler of Chicago, and J. L. Perrine of Twin Falls North Side company. At that time the Carey act in its original form was in effect, and there was not enough land available to allow the segregation. Congress enacted a measure granting the right of additional acreage of 2,000,000 acres but before any action had been taken by the state board another application involving 337,000 acres was filed by the promoters of the original Twin Falls company which constructed and interests contemplating the project, among those interested being Frank H. Buhl of Shoshone, Pa., George A. Baird of Chicago and A. C. Milnor of Salt Lake.

The applications were taken up and considered by the state board and when it was found that one project to eliminate the other, the state engineer was instructed to submit reports on the feasibility of both and the reports were submitted to the meeting at which the consideration of the applications is to be a special order of business.

The Buhl interests for twenty millions of dollars are to be eliminated.

Kuhn brothers associates estimate the cost of the enterprise as proposed by them at \$20,000,000, which includes interests to every 160-acre tract. They also proposed to pay water rights at \$45 per acre, \$3 down at time of filing and the balance to be paid in 10 annual deferred payments of \$300,000 per year. The project would be commenced within six months and have the project completed within five years.

The Twin Falls South Side company proposes to utilize the Kuhn dam and to enlarge and extend its main canal which is now 84 miles in length to a distance of 100 miles, to establish a large reservoir on the tract in Owyhee county with a capacity of 425,000 acre feet and to add to this supply by constructing another reservoir along the Snake river between the dam and the headwaters. One feature of this project would be the impounding of the water necessary to carry the water across the Salmon river canyon—Statesman.

From the action of both factions at the state Democratic convention in Boise, the editors of the Times have been a "hot rampant" instead of the gentle dunkey.

Next Sunday and Monday the members of the Eastern Idaho Press club will be the guests of Charles Wright and L. G. Hendley and the citizens of the Montpelier. One feature of the program which will appeal to the press will be the dining and balling at the famous four tables. Several members of the club state that nearly all the members have identified their intention of attending. These meetings besides giving the editors a chance for recreation, have been the means of building up a strong friendship irrespective of parties and other disagreements that have already been a source of good to the editors and to the many readers of the various newspapers.

The result of the split up of the Democracy of the state in the Wallace convention may be laid directly at the door of a very small coterie of democrats. Perky, Nugent and others of the Pro-Mormon contingent have been just as active in their determination to ruin Dubois even if it wrecks the party, as has Dubois been equally determined to run the party whether it brought west or east to the prospect of victory. As the situation now rests there is no possible chance of the Democrats winning in this state. Neither side will have a place on the official ballot until the court has decided which convention was the legal one. By the time the convention has decided little time for aggressive campaigning will be left. While a great many of republicans tired of Mormonism and others who would have favored the Dubois side of the controversy, yet the raw way in which the right of speech was denied to men sitting regularly in the convention has disgusted not only such Republi-

cans but also a large following of Anti-Mormon Democrats. Even principles of vital importance should not be gained by fraud and underhanded methods.

It is not the purpose of any of the citizens to unjustly criticize the city council on the condition of the water system. Everyone feels that the members of the council have a problem on their hands and for this reason great deal of patience is being shown with the necessary delays toward improving the waterworks system. All that the people ask is that instead of a temporary, makeshift improvement that when the improvements go in as they surely must, that they be such a nature as to provide for the future of the city no matter what its growth may be. But the first thing that enters the mind of the taxpayers is what kind of water is to be delivered and whether it will be of a continued purity. There has been some talk of the company being allowed to run pipes to the high line canal and take the supply from there instead of the present source—the low line canal. Such a step would not do away with the complaint to more than a slight degree. When the Salmon River irrigated land is under cultivation in the high line canal will prove the same menace as the low line today, the drainage of waste water containing the city's supply. Soon or later the city must provide a supply of water, pure beyond a suspicion of a doubt and the time to do it is now. If it means the construction of the present system, let it now before some of our homes are visited with sickness due to our neglect. The people are in a mood to vote any amount of bonds that the council may call for in order that the rightful condition of the present be cared for promptly.

A Campaign of Economy.

The attention of the voters of this country irrespective of party is called for by the present condition of affairs in this country. In the case of the assessor a salary of \$2500 is being paid where \$1800 would be nearer the just rate. In the judge of the probate office the salary was fixed at \$1000 when it should be about \$600 to pay for four days a week or less than that for the present condition of affairs. The taxpayer receive any benefit from the office. In the sheriff's office a salary of \$1500 is paid to the sheriff and the salary of the deputy and jailer amounts to \$1200 with a large expense for term hire and extra deputy salaries during court sessions. The Times fully believe and the same opinion is held by a large number of taxpayers, that as conditions are at present the sheriff is a figure head, while the deputy does the work and it is a matter of common sense that for at least four years one man can swing nearly all the work of that office at all times of the year. The above are only a few of the places where the present expenses are kept unnecessarily high. Now the question for the voters during the approaching campaign is whether they will support every candidate that the affairs of

each office be conducted upon a business basis just as the candidate would carefully curtail all unnecessary expense in his own private business. No office holder has any more right to wilfully waste funds of the county than an employee of a private corporation to make extravagant expenditures of his employer's money. The question of politics should not enter into the county affairs and the whole county should be considered as a co-operative concern with the officeholder as a manager and trustee. It is a matter of little moment to anybody but the politicians whether a Republican or a Democrat fills the office so long as it is filled competently.

ORDINANCE NO. 24.

GRANTING A RIGHT OF WAY ACROSS SECOND STREET WEST AND ON SEVENTH AVENUE WEST OF TWIN FALLS FOR A STANDARD GAUGE RAILROAD SIDE TRACK TO GEORGE D. ALKIN, HIS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS.

Section 1. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO, That George D. Alkin, his successors and assigns, have the authority and consent of the City Council, and the permission hereby granted, to construct and operate a single track, standard gauge railroad side track, together with all the necessary switches for several streets of said city, to wit: To propel three cars by steam or electric power on the following streets of Twin Falls:

Commencing at the southeast corner of Block One Hundred Sixty (160) at a point where the north side of Seventh Avenue West intersects the north side of the Middala and Southwestern Railroad Right-of-way; thence northwesterly across Second Street West and along the Southeast side of Block One Hundred Sixty (160) to the West corner of said block; thence southwest into Second Street ten (10) feet; thence south along the West side of Block One Hundred Sixty (160) to a point intersecting the north line of the Middala and Southwestern Railroad right-of-way and thence in an easterly direction along the north line of said right-of-way to the place of beginning.

First.—That all of said railroad tracks shall be laid upon and conform to the established grade of the several streets upon which it runs, and if said grade is afterwards changed by order of the City Council, shall be graded in accordance therewith, and the track and grade to conform to the same, and shall keep the road or side track ballasted in good shape with gravel or crushed rock provided, that whenever any of the streets or avenues laid or over which said railway or side track is built shall be paved then said gravel or ballast shall be replaced by the successor and assigns, shall pave between the rails and for a space of two feet outside of each rail with the same material as that used in the street or avenue pavement and in such manner as may be approved by the City Council, provided, that the Grantee, his successors and assigns, will at any time the City Council may desire or require, construct a side walk along the southeast side of said track in accordance with

the ordinances of the City governing the construction of sidewalks, and subject to the approval of the superior of streets, provided, further, that the Grantee herein will within ten days after the passing of this Ordinance convey to the City of Twin Falls, for street purposes ten feet of the north side of the South half of Block One Hundred Sixty. Said Six feet including the Alley running through Block One Hundred Sixty from Northwest to Southeast shall be named and called Wall Street.

Second.—Said Grantee, his successors and assigns, shall put in and maintain such crossings where the right of said railroad or side track intersects or crosses streets and avenues of Twin Falls, as shall be from time to time required by the City Council and shall without any impediment to the coupon and ordinary use of said streets or avenues upon and over which it laid. And the said Grantee, his successors and assigns, shall comply with the directions of said city in the construction of the said railroad or side-track in the manner of the same within the City limits.

Fourth.—That this franchise is granted for the full term of fifty years from and after its passage.

Fifth.—This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

TWIN FALLS TO THE FUTURE.

As the County Central Committee at its meeting the tenth day of August 1908, adopted the "Direct Primary" system for the nominating of officers on the Republican ticket in Twin Falls County, it would not be amiss to explain to the voters how this is to be operated.

one or two names for each position; and the voters will take these tickets and make a cross in the circle opposite the name of the person they want as county officer for each office, leaving the names they do not want as officers, unmarked.

If a caucus is taken of all these votes in every Precinct, and the person receiving the highest number of votes in the precincts of the County, will be recommended to the Republican County Convention on the 22nd day of September, 1908, for the nomination to the position; he being the choice of a majority of the Republican voters.

As this is the first Direct Primary Election ever held in the State of Idaho, and as Twin Falls as usual, is taking the lead, we desire a full Republican vote at the Primary on the 14th day of September, so that the officer receiving the majority of votes will be the choice of the Republican vote beyond the question of a doubt.
