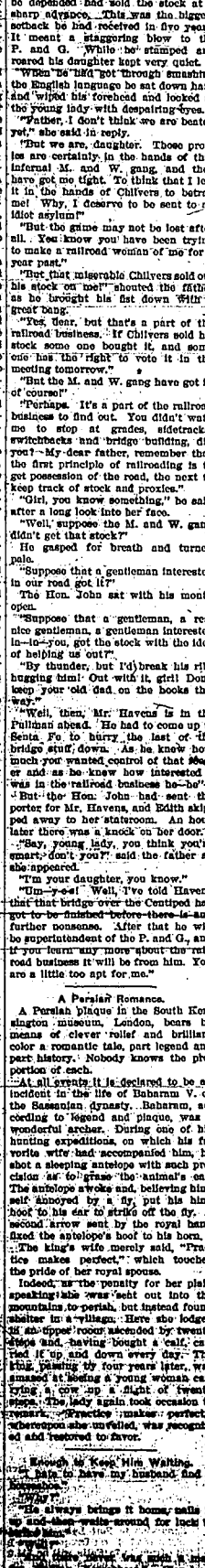

their uplifted poles than any other agency, except Grant's soldiers, it takes gold as well as armies to win battles, and Idaho, early contributed her share to hold our union together.

The 14,000 people remaining in Idaho after the expansion of the placer gold diggings went down in the valleys and built houses and fenced around a tract of land that could be irrigated from the mountain streams.

Many of these minor-farmers went back to the "states" and married the girl they used to write love letters to in the exciting gold days. These letters cost 50 cents apiece to get to the nearest postoffice, Walla Walla, Oregon. But the girl was worth it! She came and the beautiful ranches down Boise valley and the Payette and Weiser valleys testify that a woman was in the helm in the early days for there the big red apple orchards, trees 16 inches through there's the big locusts, lombards and maple shade trees around the house and barn plots that measure three and four feet through. The blue grass plots are there, with cross trees bordering them. Some of these trees are 15 feet high. It took a woman to plan these plots. These minor-farmers would never have thought of it.

Early Irrigation.

The minor-farmer of the north end of the state had the best work to do early results. The north is in the humid section. The farm work was similar to that carried on in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Iowa. They did not have to irrigate the land up there. But in southern Idaho the conditions were altogether dissimilar. Without artificial moisture plant life cannot subsist. Water was abundant in the mountain streams, but it must be conveyed to the lands by ditches and spread over the soil. These pioneer miners knew how to dig ditches to convey water to obtain the placer gold; so it was easy for them to do the ditch work to convey irrigation water to their farm lands, and they did it. This ditch work has been going on all over central and southern Idaho ever since the minor-farmer commenced his ditch work in the '70's. The result of irrigation has been so profitable that Uncle Sam concluded in 1902 to take a hand at this work, and after looking over Idaho and finding the place where his money could be spent to the greatest advantage and benefit the greatest number of his citizens he went to work. He sent \$8,000,000 to build the Minidoka dam and canals in the Snake river valley and bring out of the "desert wastes" 85,000 acres, cut up into 1,200 homesteads, and every home is occupied with a happy, prosperous family. It was only last May three Minidokans received their first water and today their granaries and cellars are groaning with the summer's production.

Uncle Sam's Work.

Uncle Sam is spending over \$8,000,000 on another Idaho project. It covers a plan to build reservoirs and canal lines to furnish water to irrigate 350,000 acres of the choicest lands in the Gem state. Uncle Sam

The government crop report for April shows that there was on hand in the country March 1, 1908, 57.1 per cent of last year's corn crop, or 902,429,000 bushels; 23.5 per cent of the wheat crop, or 148,721,000 bushels, and 33.9 per cent of the 1907 oat crop, or 267,407,000 bushels.

While a large majority of the people of the United States are in a position to congratulate themselves if they so desire, that they are native born, it is an interesting and somewhat surprising fact to know that since 1820 over 24,000,000 people have been added to our population through immigration.

The pile of horse manure in the barnyard is the common and favorite brooding place of the house fly. If you haven't a garden in which the manure can be spread, as fast as it accumulates, plan to scatter enough lime on the pile from time to time so that the flies will shun it as a brooding place.

The extra cultivation of the field of corn, even if the job had to be done with a single horse cultivator, often results in an increased yield of from eight to twelve bushels per acre. Added to this is the further fact that the same stirring of the soil which makes available increased moisture for the rapidly developing corn also exterminates myriads of weeds that would otherwise draw heavily not only upon the moisture, but the fertility of the soil.

Whoever possible it is well to let poultry have the run of the orchard. In proof of this statement one may cite experiments conducted by the horticultural department at Cornell university, in which it was demonstrated conclusively that better results were secured from having poultry run under the orchard trees than from all other protective measures combined for the holding in check or destruction of insect pests. It is on this account that orcharding and poultry raising even on a large scale go so well together.

The enemies of the corn plant, among which are the corn root worm, corn root louse and wireworm, work the most damage in fields which have been devoted to a cultivation of corn year after year without rest or rotation of any kind. The damage which these pests do is simply a protest of nature at a wrong way of tilting the soil and of sowing crops. When a farmer's corn crop begins to suffer from one or all of the above pests it is about time for him to make confession of his agricultural offenses and experience a practical conversion.
