**SHOSHONE FALLS PARK BILL.**

In the Senate—S. B. No. 80, by Sweeley of Twin Falls.

**AN ACT** Authorizing the state of Idaho to purchase an oblong tract of certain lands in section thirty-six (26), in township nine (9), north, of range seventeen (17) East of the Boise meridian, to dedicated and maintain said lands as a public park; to provide for the improvement thereof; to authorize Twin Falls county to expend money for like improvements; and making an appropriation for the purchase and improvement of said lands.  
 Whereas, Shoshone Falls, in the Snake river, between the counties of Twin Falls and Lincoln, are among the greatest scenic attractions of the world, and  
 Whereas, the surroundings of the falls are but little improved and furnish inadequate accommodations and conveniences for tourists and visitors, and  
 Whereas, Lying immediately west of the falls in section 38, in township 9, of range 17, belonging to the state of Idaho, which provides some of the finest views of the scenery and embraces places that by improvement can be made of great interest and natural attraction, and  
 Whereas, On the portion of said land which lies in Twin Falls county there have been placed at considerable expense by private enterprise, and by the consent of the state board of land commissioners for the accommodation and use of the public buildings, several landing down to the river below the falls, which in time will require attention, and  
 Whereas, Said state land is rough, rocky, and so cut by the river and ravines as to be of practically no financial value, but with proper outlay and attention can be developed into an asset of great importance to the state, and  
 Whereas, To vest the title to said land free from the claims of the school fund, it will be necessary to have the same sold,  
 Now, therefore, Be it enacted by the legislature of the state of Idaho: Section 1. The state board of land commissioners is hereby empowered and directed to proceed to make sale of the following described land, to-wit: Lots six (6), seven (7), eight (8) and nine (9), and the southeast quarter of the southwest quarter and the south half of the southeast quarter of section thirty-six (36), in township nine (9) north of range seventeen (17), east of the Boise Meridian, in the manner required by law for the sale of school lands; and said board is by this act authorized and directed for and on behalf of the state of Idaho, to buy said lands as such sale and to whom further is required to obtain for the state absolute title thereto.  
 Sec. 2. When the title to said land is obtained by the state by sale as provided in section 1 of this act, the same shall become dedicated, improved and maintained as a state park for the use and enjoyment of the public.  
 Sec. 3. For the purpose of purchasing said lands and obtaining title thereto, the sum of twenty-four hundred dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary.  
 Sec. 4. For the purpose of improving and beautifying said park, in the way of planting trees, developing springs, constructing walks, bridges and fountains, and making other improvements and conveniences, there is hereby appropriated the further sum of two thousand dollars.  
 Sec. 5. The money appropriated by section 4 of this act is to be drawn and expended by the board of county commissioners of Twin Falls county for the purposes set forth in said section 4; Provided, However, That before any portion of said appropriation is expended there shall have been appropriated by Twin Falls county an amount at least equal to the portion of the state appropriation above to be expended for the same purpose, and for the improvement of the highways and foot paths leading to said park, and authority hereby given to said board to make such appropriation and such additional appropriations and expenditures from time to time as may be required to keep said improvements in proper condition.  
 Sec. 6. Of said sum of two thousand dollars appropriated by section 4 of this act no more shall be used than shall equal the amount used under the appropriation by said county.  
 Sec. 7. Prior to the first day of January, 1911, the board of county commissioners of said county shall make full and detailed report of the amount expended under the provisions of this act and the character and extent of the improvements made.  
 Sec. 8. All improvements of what ever kind placed on said land shall belong to the state of Idaho, and it shall be the power and duty of the board of county commissioners of said Twin Falls county to make suitable provisions for the care and preservation thereof, without expense to the state.

**A BEAUTIFUL EXPOSITION.**

So States Chas. Dain Gibson of Alaska Fair.  
 "It will unquestionably be the most beautiful exposition ever held in the world and the comprehensive progress you have made so far ahead of the opening date amazes me," said Charles Dain Gibson, the creator of the "Gibson Fair" after his return to Seattle where the west is building the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, which will be held in Seattle from June 1 to October 16, 1909.  
 Mr. Gibson stood at the head of the Caspian Court, the central decorative feature of the grounds. Straight in front of him but eighty miles away Mount Rainier, the highest mountain peak in the United States, reared its head until its snow covered crest was lost in the white fleecy clouds that hovered around it. To his left the Cascades made a rugged outline against the sky and to his right the Olympics rose to majestic height from the shores of the Pacific ocean. Away off to the northward the Seakirk carried a sea of snow-capped peaks to the distant horizon. In the immediate foreground, through stately pine trees that have so far withstood the march of progress, Lake Washington glittered. It was a December morning, but Mr. Gibson and Norman H. Haugood, editor of Collier's Weekly, who was with him, wore in their button holes roses they had plucked as they strode over the exposition grounds.  
 "I have made no particular hobby of expositions," continued Mr. Gibson, "but I have been to those held in recent years and from what you have already here, combined with the lavish manner in which nature had done her share for you, I think I am safe in saying that this will be the most attractive one ever held. I had no intention when I left New York of coming to this country again for some years, but I will be back here next June to see my fair. If you should complete the picture for anything."  
 Mr. Haugood was equally enthusiastic and he and Mr. Gibson will return next the next summer to see the exposition and will also make the trip to Alaska.  
**Large Increase in Cut of Government Timber.**  
 Uncle Sam's national forest yielded an increase of 102 per cent in timber last year over the record for 1907, giving returns of \$39,927.24 to the government. Twenty-five per cent of this amount was paid to the states in which the forests are located in lieu of taxes, in accordance with the provisions of a new law. This revenue will be added to the state's fund for the support and maintenance of roads and public schools.  
 The amount of timber cut from all the national forests was 392,792,000 feet, board measure, as against 194,000,000 feet in the previous year. This figure for 1908 does not include the 121,482,000 feet given away to settlers, schools and churches under "free use" permits. This increase of 102 per cent shows a far better use and increasing productiveness of the forest under conservative methods cutting.  
 There was a marked increase in small sales last year, resulting in an increase of 236 per cent in the number of sales, notwithstanding the fact that the timber contracted for was far less in the aggregate than in 1907.  
 In making timber sales the forest service has made a preference to large sales, and aims to safeguard a supply for future needs rather than to favor the immediate receiver. Where it desired, the present receipts from timber sales could be quickly doubled. During the year it was found necessary to restrict sales on many forests. Nevertheless, use of the national forests as a whole has been only a few percent more general than over before.  
 The total receipts from timber sales each year have been as follows: 1905, \$20,335.19; 1906, \$22,478.21; 1907, \$68,813.12; 1908, \$349,927.24.  
 Payment for timber is always required in advance. In large sales, however, and in small sales on occasion, payment is made in installments so arranged as to protect the government against loss without imposing unnecessarily severe burdens upon the purchaser. Thus the receipts of each year represent substantially, but not exactly by the value of the timber sold and removed during that year.

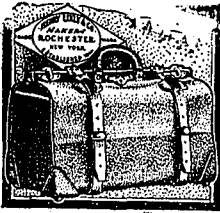

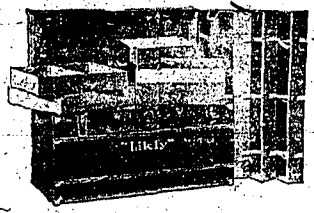

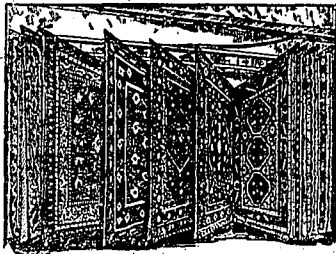

Gov. Brady is not likely to suffer from writer's cramp due to overwork in signing bills passed by the Tenth session.

The killing of the bill creating Power county, is the beginning of a

long procession of ill-fated sectional bills to the legislative quillion.

It is about time for the committee appointed to investigate the independent telephone systems of Butte and Salt Lake City to report to the Commercial club. It was not the intention of the club to drop the matter altogether.

Local option was made the candidate promise whereby the voters were induced to swallow another Republican administration, and now that the election is over, the legislators are acting like a lot of kids and refusing to take the bitter medicine beneath the candy.

The Moscow papers are up in arms over the proposed removal of the agricultural college to southern Idaho. Some of the more radical northern Idaho papers are even advocating the formation of another state from the Panhandle. Another case of the tail attempting to wag the dog.

The deadlock over important legislation in the state legislature is threatening to make this session even more of a by-word than the ninth session, because of unfulfilled promises made by the party. If the Republican party goes back on its platform for the campaign of 1908, there will be things doing next election with a great many Republican newspapers lined up with the democracy. The sectional fight which is being waged over the educational institutions should not be the justification for the party as a whole going back on its promise to the voters.

The Republican party will find that the voters who put the party in power will not be contented with a half-hearted effort of the legislature to enact laws promised by the party during the last campaign. The promise implies something more than the mere introduction of the bills in one of the two houses. It means those promises transformed into law. There is no excuse for the party more than there was last legislature, when the promises were broken. The Republican party has a working majority in the two houses and can have no reasonable excuse to offer except lack of faith with voters or internal party dissensions.

Tomorrow the nation celebrates the centennial of Abraham Lincoln, and on that day will be more elaborate ceremonies than have heretofore been given to the greatest man of American history. Not a year passes but what the majority of the American people revere his name and have honored his memory ever since the assassin's bullet brought him low, but with the increasing admiration upon his character and his efforts for the preservation of the Union the people have learned something of the lovable disposition of the great and good man; have learned of the intolerable burden of national war borne with steadfast, silent patience; have learned to value at its full worth the clear and almost prescient knowledge with which Lincoln met the almost insurmountable difficulties of the harassed Union. The North and South have begun to appreciate the wonderful breadth of love which caused him to give back to sur-

rowing mothers, the sons condemned to death from the ranks of the Blue and the Gray, often standing between the military leaders and the ranks with an added burden of hopeless abuse for his interference in the cause of humanity. The South has learned that the fall of this great man ushered in upon them the awful reconstruction period on the part of the same militarism which feared Lincoln and his determined effort to unite rather than to punish the South.

But Abraham Lincoln's humanity did not cause him to falter in his stern persistence of putting down the rebellion and preserving the integrity of the Union, nor once did he swerve in his instinctive demand for soldiers while his sympathy went to the homes left vacant by absence of son or husband. His intense and unselfish loyalty to the nation fairly electrified the men of the ranks and his frequent visits to the battle scarred veterans was worth a legion for increasing the enthusiasm of the soldiers.

One phase of the Emancipator's greatness which has been left to this generation to discover and appreciate was his intellectual strength. Stanton, Seward, Wells, and the peerless Douglas saw the election of the rough and uncouth lawyer with misgivings and secret chagrin, only to bow their heads in admiration and respect before his wonderful keenness of perception and straightforward honesty, as his administration drew to a close. Not to one particular virtue does his claim to greatness rest, but solely upon the fact that at every opportunity of his career his ability rose superior to each

obstacle. No other man could have held together the ambitious statesmen of his cabinet with as little friction; no other man could have quieted the people of the north as defeat after defeat was recorded against the Union forces; no other man could have held together the northern states with as matchless diplomacy. Twenty years ago and the birthday of Lincoln was little celebrated. Ten years ago and the public schools alone were according to him a just meed of praise. Today the nation as a whole is beginning to give to his memory something of the reverence and honor due.

### PROPER TAXATION OF FORESTS.

The American Forestry Association lately held its annual meeting at Washington and elected a new president, Governor Guild, of Massachusetts, an executive of marked ability and energy. One of the resolutions adopted rightly calls for the repeal of the famous—or rather infamous—Timber and Stone Act. In its stead the association would substitute a law providing that timber and stone shall be sold at actual value and the proceeds devoted to purchasing forest lands to safeguard navigable streams. In the forestry interest of the several states; the association also passed resolutions recommending instruction in forestry in state agricultural schools, asking state legislatures to purchase non-agricultural lands to be converted into forest reserves, and urging the enactment of state laws to remove the tax on standing timber and to substitute therefor an income tax upon the timber is cut. As every observer must

see, the relation of taxation to the forest's permanent usefulness is increasingly vital. Our present laws taxing standing timber prevent reforestation on cut-over lands. Thus the laws prevent the perpetuation of existing forests by use. In the opinion of forest experts, the taxation of forest lands should be based on yield. This would mean a comparatively small tax on the land alone, plus a tax on the timber only when harvested. Such a method is based on a sound principle, and is well adapted to actual conditions of forest investment. It would insure a permanent revenue from the forests, in the aggregate far greater than is now collected. It would be less burdensome both upon the state and upon the owner. Use, not abuse, and not mere preservation without use, is demanded. And only by use—namely, by legitimate cutting and reforestation—may our forests be permanently perpetuated. They can be if the state will act as suggested.—Outlook.

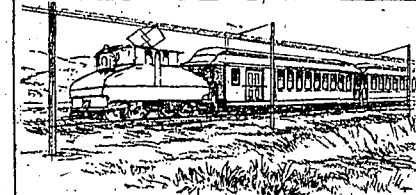

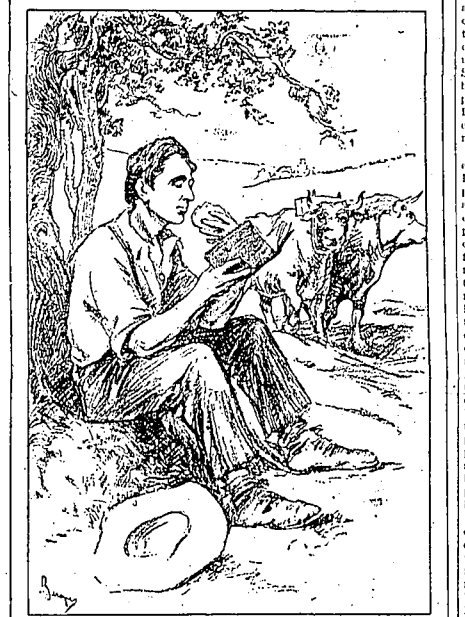
