The plan of the insurgent branch of the Republican party to go its own way, spells disaster for the whole party in the coming campaign with the assurance that the Democracy will put up a united front against a divided house. While the insurgents can accomplish the wrecking of the hopes of the regulars, yet the reform which they desire is pushed just that much farther into the future by a bonaparte victory. The Times is in sympathy with the insurgent movement in setting the Republican party on the track of the very best in the way of reform, but the breaking away from the party will not accomplish the desired results. By attacking with the party in a few more years the agitation will be rewarded by getting the reforms in the regular platform, be-

cause the things demanded are wholesome and for the best good of the greatest number. But the breaking away simply adds theatrical effect to the stand taken by the men, when the Times wishes to consider sincerely in their efforts to reform. Furthermore, it is weakening for the reason that it has to build out of a small nucleus what will be a new party, instead of making over by inside influence what should be the dominant party.

WHAT ABOUT THE TRUSTS?

On another page we give an account of some of the proceedings last week in the course of enforcing the Sherman Anti-Trust Law. It is not at all contradictory to approve the spirit of a law enforcement that is behind such proceedings and at the same time to hold that the Anti-Trust Law itself, even when enforced, does not, and will not, solve the trust problem. There are signs that public sentiment throughout the country is coming to this world and perfectly consistent conclusion.

There are three policies with regard to the great corporations. One may be termed the policy of Non-Action. Leave business alone, say those who advocate this policy, and let business adjust itself, limited only by economic laws of supply and demand and by the common law. This was originally the policy for which Mr. Parker, as Democratic candidate, stood seven years ago. It is a policy that is virtually abandoned, except by a very small and unimportant minority.

The second policy may be termed that of Expropriation. Crush all big combinations that threaten to be monopolistic, say those who advocate this policy, and solve the trust question by expropriating those concerns that are dangerous by virtue of mere bigness. This is the virtually Mr. Bryan's policy. It was rejected at the last presidential election. Nevertheless, there are indications that a great body of voters, not only Democrats of the Bryan wing of the party, but also Republicans who are themselves and are in general Progressive, are strongly inclined to this policy. The organ of the Progressive Republicans of California has virtually committed itself to the Bryan doctrine of getting back to what it calls "competition and a free market."

The third policy may be termed that of Regulation. The rampant evils and abuses of great combinations, say those who advocate this policy, should be defined by law and punished, but mere bigness that threatens to become monopolistic cannot be treated as a crime; it must be treated as we treat natural monopolies, by giving to the government power to rule and control. Such power must be exercised through a well-organized administrative body.

It will not be merely negative, remedial latent until abuses arise and then being employed to cure them; but rather with its positive and constructive, being employed to make plain in advance what business practices are legitimate, so that no "outlets" will arise. This is the policy which The Outlook believes must ultimately prevail.

The real issue at present is between the policy of Expropriation and the policy of Regulation. We believe that Governor Wilson has voted a growing feeling in expressing dissent from the president's view that the present Anti-Trust Law makes perfectly clear what is legal and what is illegal in business combinations. We still more strongly believe that the Republican Progressives at Chicago, were right in urging the enactment of "affirmative legislation."

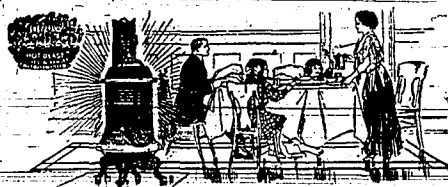

SHELTER THE FARM MACHINERY

Care of Working Tools and Machinery Important.

"Now that harvest is over with the rush of work incident to caring for and storing the crop, don't forget to also store the machinery that made it possible to sow, cultivate and harvest that crop. The season of frequent and prolonged rains is approaching and the slight sight of excessive implements out of doors, often in the field where they were last used, should be an incentive to every farmer to erect a shelter and protect them from the elements.

It is safe to say that machinery left out in the weather the year around will deteriorate fully as much, if not more, during the long period it stands idle than it will from wear during the time it is in actual operation. In other words, the life of an implement will be doubled if it is properly housed when not in use. This is especially true of harvesting machinery but applies with almost equal force to any that is used on the farm. The shelter need not be an expensive one. A good roof is essential but the walls need not be of matted lumber, even. Stock lumber run up and down will serve the purpose and approachily lower the cost of construction. Neither is skilled labor necessary. The average farmer should be able to erect a building that will serve all practicable purposes without the aid of a carpenter. The cost, whatever it may be, will be insignificant as compared with the increased life and efficiency of the farm implements.—P. L. KENNARD, Assistant Agronomist, University Experiment Station.
