### TO ALLAY EYE IRRITATION

Simple Wash Made From Saturated Solution of Boracic Acid is Very Soothing.

When one is forced to work under a light that is placed too high for eye comfort and cannot be readily adjusted it is far better to use an opaque green shade over the eyes than to allow the light to become permanently injurious.

A good quality of these can be purchased at your stationer's for the modest sum of a quarter and the relief you will find by them will be more than worth the small expense. Should the eyes become irritated near the eyelash use a wash of lukewarm sterilized water having diluted therein a much boracic acid as the water will take up.

One can prepare a pint bottle of this and have it ready for use at any time. The only thing necessary would be to place the bottle in a cup of warm water so as to make it lukewarm before using.

Should a white sediment form at the bottom it is by no means spoiled, as this is only a very small extra quantity of the boracic acid which has been absorbed by the water and is in no way harmful.

More than a certain quantity, say a heaped teaspoonful to a pint of water, will not be absorbed, so there is no fear of making the water too soft, as only a certain degree can be achieved in this direction.

Use of this when the lids become irritated, applying with a well-cleaned eye-cup, will save you from many a painful and pathetic trying eye, and a success of the eye that is most disconcerting and which make their appearance at the most inopportune times.

### YOUNG UNTIL THIRTY-FIVE

From That Time On Unmarried Women Are "Old Maids," Says Boston Y. W. C. A.

When does a woman cease to be young? Woman herself, for reasons that require no elaboration here, declines, as a rule, to fix the period. Masculine authorities, for the most part, are of the opinion that it is a dangerous ground. Hence the question has ever been involved in uncertainty and it would perhaps remain so were it not that a responsible authority—none other than the Young Woman's Christian association of the city of which indicates its competency—comes to the front with a decision which may fairly be accepted as conclusive. It is to the Boston branch of the association that the word is looked for in the solution of the problem. The occasion for solving it arose from the completion of a new home for the young women of the association in the Massachusetts city. In framing rules for this establishment, it was found necessary to specify precisely the limit of young womanhood, beyond which the benefits of the home could not be enjoyed. This has been fixed at 35 years. Up to that age a young woman is counted within the meaning of the title as understood by the association and may enjoy the advantages of membership and residence in the home. On reaching her thirty-fifth birthday she must make her quarters. On that fatal day her young womanhood ceases and the "old maid" label is placed upon her indelibly and irrevocably. Thus the matter is settled beyond further cavil or dispute.—Pittsburg Chronicle-Telegraph.

### TO RELIEVE THE HICCOUGHS

Sucking Ice or Taking Salt and Vinegar Often Will Cure Simple Cases.

Simple cases of hiccough are often relieved by such measures as sucking ice or taking salt and vinegar. Pulling the tongue forward and holding it for some time is an effective procedure.

Sometimes obstinate hiccough is relieved when the patient is strong by having him hang with the arms extended and grasp some beam or pole, so that his feet do not touch the floor. With all the abdominal muscles tense, have him hold his breath as long as possible.

The spelling "hiccough" is recent, being a combination of the syllables "hic" and the latter term of "cough," which, without other phonological or etymological basis, the pronunciation, with perhaps the rarest exception, is still that of the older form "hiccup." "Hiccup" is "hiccup," "hiccup," "hiccup," with quasi-diminishing suffixes, etc.; but the "hic" a syllable aptly expressive of the spasmodic sound produced by the conditions giving rise to the particular disturbance. It is found in all references to the origin of the term which the writer has been able to obtain. The term "hiccough" is rarely used.

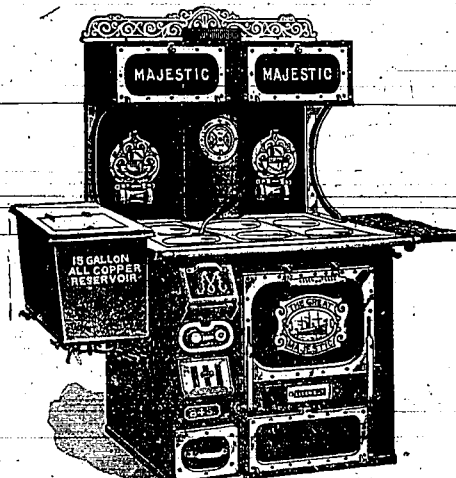

COAL PRODUCTION FOR 1911.

Figures for Central, Southwestern and Rocky Mountain States.

According to Edward W. Parker, coal statistician of the United States Geological Survey, the coal-mining returns for 1911 indicate that the output of the year was probably less than that of 1910, in spite of the fact that most of the mines in the Mississippi valley and the southwestern states were closed down for practically six months during 1910.

The general feeling throughout this region in 1911 was that business was exceptionally low. Some idea of the conditions may be obtained from the statement that Illinois alone is capable of producing with present development and equipment, as much coal as is now produced in the entire interior region, including Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, West Virginia, Kansas, Missouri, Arkansas, Oklahoma, and Texas.

In Iowa, in addition to the general depression in the manufacturing industries, the agricultural industry has been considerably depressed. The demand for coal from that source, the railroad companies also reduced their requirements. The car and labor supply in Iowa as in other sections of the region, was entirely adequate.

In the northwestern coal field of Michigan conditions in 1911 were about the same as in 1910, and the production will not show much change when compared with the output of the preceding year.

Not the least difficulty with which the operators in Arkansas and Oklahoma have to contend is the persistence of the miners in shooting the coal from the solid. This practice, it is claimed, has increased the proportion of low-grade steam coal from 20 per cent to nearly a large percentage to 40 per cent, which is now the minimum.

Decreased Production in Rocky Mountain Region. The production of coal in most of the Rocky Mountain States increased in 1911 about 10 per cent, compared with 1910. The reduction was due primarily, first, to an unusually mild winter in 1910-11; second, drought in the agricultural states west of the Mississippi river, which caused large reduction in the demand for domestic purposes in South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Texas, and Colorado.

Improvised Mining Methods. An striking contrast to the reprehensible practice of shooting coal from the solid, as exemplified particularly in Arkansas and Oklahoma, are the improvements in mining methods which have been put in effect in some of the Rocky Mountain states, especially in New Mexico.

On the Pacific coast conditions were not markedly different in 1911 compared with what they were in 1910. The production of oil in California continued to be the dominating factor and probably will continue to do so for some time to come.
