ROADS MEETING WELL ATTENDED

Much Interest Shown by Farmers and Business Men.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MAKES REPORT OF WORK DONE.

County Commissioners Offer Help—Work to be Started at an Early Date.

The road work movement started by the Twin Falls Commercial club last week is raising a great deal of enthusiasm among the farmers and business men and, in fact, all the citizens of the Twin Falls tract. The meeting last Thursday night at the Commercial club was attended by a large crowd of citizens, a number of them being farmers. The executive committee appointed at the previous meeting rendered the following report:

Gentlemen: Your executive committee appointed to devise ways and means for the building of a road from Hansen to Buhl, has to report as follows:

That we have considered the different routes and recommended beginning at the northwest corner of the townsite of Hansen, running due west and through Kimbrell, thence due west to the southeast corner of the Twin Falls townsite, down Shoshone street to the southeast corner of the townsite of Buhl, thence west three miles, thence north one mile through Curry to and through Filer to the northwest corner of the townsite of Buhl, thence north to the pole line, thence due west to the southeast corner of Buhl townsite.

We further recommend that a vice president be appointed for each mile of the road to be built, who shall act as foreman of construction and have charge of machinery, etc. The vice president assemble his machinery and notify his men that then a day he is to build the road. All of which is respectfully submitted.

F. E. CHAMBERLAIN, C. H. MCQUINN, H. M. VANDERPOOL, W. H. WEAVER, JOHN W. MARDIN.

This report was adopted and the committee instructed to proceed with the preparation to build the road according to the plans outlined. Judge R. E. Chamberlain, chairman of the executive committee, has given him an order for 20 King road drag and Mr. Chamberlain also stated that the committee will give every possible aid they can in the work. Street Commissioner E. J. Spencer stated that there were no road drag in the city which could be used, but there were also about a dozen more scattered over the country so that there will be about thirty-five available.

The executive committee will go over the proposed route at once and appoint a vice president for each mile. These men to have charge of their particular mile under the direction of the executive committee. It will be the duty of each vice president to enlist the aid of all the farmers along his mile of road and also the aid of farmers off the route. A call for volunteers was made at the meeting and fifteen responded with a promise of a team and a man for the day selected by the committee to do the work. A committee consisting of J. L. Doube, Charles H. Mull, Willett Hatten, Charles Barton and J. Benjamin Hall was appointed to solicit funds to carry on this work.

DISEASES OF HONEY BEES

Found on the Twin Falls Tract—Method of Treatment Sent Free.

The United States Department of Agriculture calls attention to the fact that American foul brood has been found to exist in Twin Falls county. The department has no means of knowing how the disease has existed in the region, but desires to suggest bee keepers of the trouble and to suggest that if it is not already informed concerning the disease, they inform themselves at once. Very frequently colonies of bees are destroyed by disease and the loss is attributed to the bee keeper to some other cause. Farmers' Bulletin No. 442, The Treatment of Bee Diseases, contains a full description of the brood diseases and methods of treatment. It will be sent free on request to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. Attention is also called to the fact that the brood diseases do not at all injure honey for human consumption, so that there need be no fear on the part of purchasers of honey.

TWIN FALLS COUNTY ASSN.

Irregularities at University Organize "Boast-Don't Boast" Association.

Moscow, Feb. 7.—At a meeting held in Morris hall last evening an organization of Twin Falls county students was effected. It will be known as the "Twin Falls County Association." This membership includes all students from the irrigated tracts in the south central part of the state, known collectively as the Twin Falls county. This includes all of Twin Falls county and parts of Lincoln, Blaine and Cassia.

The purpose of this club is to advance the interests of the University in the territory represented and to let people at the university know that Twin Falls is on the map. The newly chosen officers of the association are: Roy Cammack, president; W. L. Snyder, vice president; H. S. Youngs, secretary and treasurer. There were two committees appointed: A booster committee, consisting of Joseph Sudweeks and Claude Manning, and a social committee, consisting of R. J. Leth and H. L. Taylor.

This is the only club in the university that represents any particular section of the state. Many Idaho young people go to other states to attend school with their own state and variety is just as good or perhaps better. The members of this club will use their influence to keep Idaho students in Idaho. There are seventeen students at the university from the Twin Falls section, and the club intends to work toward increasing the number next year.

A motto was selected which is intended to be the moving spirit of the organization. It is, "Boast-Don't Boast."

"With respect to the recent circular sent out by the mail order firm of Montgomery, Ward & Co., a copy of which I have before me, I desire to state as emphatically as possible that I have made frequent inspections of the various stores and business houses of Twin Falls handling groceries and other food products up to within as recently as the past 30 days, and have at all times found them thoroughly clean, up-to-date, and engaged in handling as fine a quality of goods to be found in any similar establishments in the state of Idaho."

"The statement contained in the circular referred to, to the effect that the goods are thrown in almost any shape, is unwarranted and false in every particular. Within my experience I may say that I have never seen better kept stores anywhere, and the statements of the firm in question may be classed as unqualifiedly untrue, misleading and libelous. In every line of the business in Twin Falls sanitation appears to be the keynote of the efforts of the proprietors, down to the smallest detail. The fact that I have never, within my three years of office, had occasion to even criticize any storekeeper in the town may be accepted as the best evidence possible as to actual conditions. My inspections have been made by myself or my deputies in a spirit of justice and without fear or favor. Had I found anything requiring action on my part, I would undoubtedly have taken it. I desire to make this statement as emphatic and forceful as I possibly can, as I feel that a grave injustice has been worked upon the local merchants as a result of the distribution of the circular referred to, and I am only too glad to lend my aid to any effort to disprove the charges made."

DEATH OF CARL BARTON.

Victim of Accident While Working on Power Lines.

Carl Barton, fourth son of Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester Barton, died at ten o'clock yesterday afternoon at his home near the Maud river in the Hagerman valley. Death was the result of an accident which occurred shortly after 2:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

At the time the deceased was at work when the accident occurred. He was working on the temporary line which the Great Shoshone & Twin Falls Water Power Company, for which he was working, had put up to replace the line which the Hagerman river company had destroyed ten days before. He, with Earl Wells, was taking cable insulators off the last pole when it fell without warning, throwing the two young men to the ground.

The men were strapped to the pole by their safety belts and so were unable to jump away from the pole when it fell. Carl Barton received a number of injuries, the exact nature of which could not be determined as he never regained consciousness from the time of the accident until his death. It is thought that he was killed by the charge of the case that death occurred from concussion of the brain.

Everything possible was done to save the young man's life, but to no avail. The members of the crew on which the deceased worked cared for him until a professional nurse arrived from Twin Falls. Dr. Fankler of the Hagerman, had charge of the case and called in Dr. Stewart for consultation. Carl Barton had, however, succumbed to the construction crew of the Great Shoshone & Twin Falls Water Power Company.

Carl Barton was born at Pocatello, Idaho, July 1, 1894, and during that time made a first of every man connected with the company with whom he came to work. He was a very successful character stamped him as one man in many, and foretold a successful future. His death is truly mourned by his fellow workers and by his superiors.

The accident which caused his death occurred at a time when he was working on the real work of the men who took part in it, and throughout the time Carl Barton was counted one of the best men of the job. Though a boy in years, he played a man's part well.

The stallions were not put on sale, but were on exhibition. It is said that there was \$2,000 in cash brought here from the North Side and left in this city. Munyon & Luc, the auctioneers, were more than satisfied with the result of the sale as were the owners, Smith & McManis. Another sale will be held Saturday, February 24.

Mr. Wilberg, the senior member of the firm, will have charge of the stock until sold, after which time he expects to embark in some other line of business in Twin Falls. Both gentlemen have been live in the Twin Falls lumber business for a number of years. The sale is with regret that Mr. French's departure is viewed by the business men of this city in the meantime. 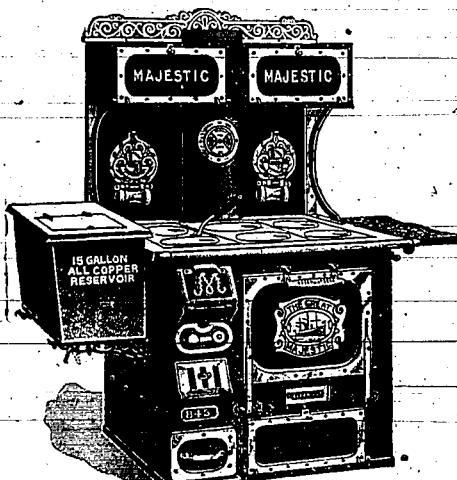

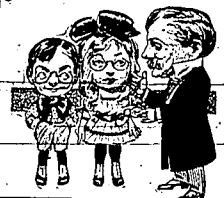

Expert Shooters in Tournament

(Continued from Page 1.)

Propaganda Association, and in order to complete the entire number of shoots scheduled, the event originally scheduled for today, but cancelled owing to the fact that the Boise club had been compelled to store their traps because of the loss of their shooting grounds, this event will be shot off at Salt Lake City next Saturday, thus giving the Utah metropolis two events instead of the one scheduled there for Sunday.

One of the features of the shooting of the tournament is the great work being done by Fred Willet, of the San Francisco team, who has steadily maintained a percentage of better than 94 ever since the tour commenced. Under all kinds of weather conditions and at all manner of thrown targets, the expert from San Francisco has shot better than 94 of every 100 targets, which is considered a remarkable record to be made anywhere.

Hugh Poston, one of the Spokane representatives, is another tourist who has been shooting in great form since the tourney started. In the earlier shoots in Oregon he fell way below his normal average by reason of his experimenting with a new gun, but since he has returned to his old love, he has been shooting practically as well as Willet. In the snow at Shoshone the other day Poston broke 75 consecutive targets, and when his teammates were expecting him to accomplish 100 straight, his hands became numbed by the cold and he missed several targets, thus spoiling his chance for a record.

Besides Poston and Willet, the other members of the touring party are Guy and Pete Holohan, both well known in Twin Falls, having been former residents of this city, and who are now representing Portland in the tournament, and C. B. Randall, E. C. Morgan and Bert Ackers. Randall is Willet's partner representing San Francisco, while Ackers and Poston represent Spokane, and Morgan pairs off with other of the Idahoans as the Portland team at each contest.

On their arrival at Twin Falls Monday, Peter J. Holohan received a telegram from the Dupont Powder company announcing that that company had decided to add a handsome pair of cuff links to the prizes being competed for by the traveling teams. At present it looks favorable for the San Francisco pair, Willet and Randall, to become owners of the cufflinks, for this team has won ten events so far, and only five shots remain, including today's contest. Spokane still has a chance, for the runners representing that city have so far won seven contests, while the Portland team has captured but three shoots. An instance of the luck the Portland team has played in on this trip is shown by the number of times this team has been beaten out by one bird. This occurred three times, while a margin of two birds beat the Idahoans on two occasions, so, while last in the race, they have been forcing their opponents all the time.

Out of 2,000 targets shot at thus far, Fred Willet has broken 1,822 quite birds for a percentage of 94 to 96, quite a handsome average. In the same number of targets Poston has broken 1,207 targets, for an average of 90 to 92 per cent.

The teams shoot at Idaho Falls Thursday, Ogden Friday, and Saturday and Sunday at Salt Lake City, which will conclude the tournament.

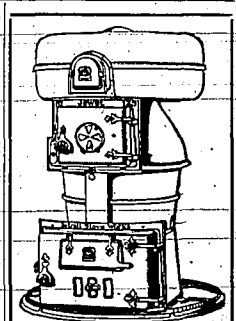
