Answer to a Question from a reader of the Suggestive Questions on the S. L. House for Feb. 25, 1912, by Rev. Dr. Lincoff.

Question 12, Verse 2. If Christians in these days were to fast what would be the probable spiritual results?

Answer. The lesson story is about the baptism and temptation of Jesus, immediately after Christ's baptism he went out into the wilderness and fasted forty days and forty nights. The devil came and tempted him, primarily at the close of this fast period at fasting. It is suggested by

some that the Devil made his attack upon Jesus when he was the least able to bear it, as after so long a fast he would be physically exhausted. I do not, however, share that opinion, for after this long period of fasting, and presumably of praying, Jesus had taken on unusual spiritual power, and was in a condition to vanquish the tempter, as he would not be but for this period of fasting and prayer. In the early years of Christianity, indeed as far back in history as we have any account, to saintly men fasting was just as much an essential religious duty as praying. The most extraordinary events in connection with spiritual achievements have been associated with fasting. The great religious reformers, such as Luther, Calvin, Knox, Wesley and others, were men who spent much time in fasting and prayer. During the early years of the great protestant reformation, or revival, the converts were taught to fast as well as to pray. Even in the memory of many now living, fasting was associated with the requirements of the Church, and was the habit of truly spiritual people.

I am convinced, from physical, philosophical, and spiritual considerations, that if Christians were to abstain from food for one, or two, or more meals, at regular periods, that they would take on more power and obtain greater experiences than is now possible. If fasting should again become a common practice in the Church, the really more spiritual good would be accomplished than is being done today.

STORE BROKEN INTO.

Three Valuable Guns Stolen Through Hole in Window.

The Proebstel Hardware store was broken into sometime after two o'clock Sunday morning and two valuable guns, one automatic and two single action pistols were taken from the show window.

The guns had been left on display in the window for some time and it had not been the proprietors custom to remove them at night. It appears that the thieves broke the window with a rock, making a hole large enough to get the hand through. Nothing was lost except the guns which were nearly new.

The opening has been made in the window and the stolen goods or the parties who carried them away can be found.

This is the first occurrence of the kind in Burley, for some time, but it serves to remind us that, at least until a night watchman can be provided, it will be well for merchants to leave nothing of value in their windows.

It also shows the future necessity for a night watchman here. Many strangers are coming into the town and it is not safe for property, the lives of visitors here, or those of our own people to be left without protection during the very time of night when crime is generally committed by burglars and looters.

Sparing the Rod.

The bishop of Carlsbad, N. M., is no believer in "sparing the rod" and "spoiling the child." In a recent address he deplored the soft notions now being preached by people calling themselves humanitarians. "It is said to be degrading to flog a boy," said the bishop. "Well, I am truly thankful that I was often degraded in that sense in my boyhood. It had not been so degraded then; it should be more degraded now. We need to eliminate these enervating, foolish, soft and therefore cruel notions from our educational system. This is a matter not only for teachers, but for parents."

The new All Steel Grubber which we are now manufacturing is the product of an experience extending over a period of more than eight years. STOLEN HORSE RECOVERED.

Found in Bliss by Sheriff Zug of Lincoln County.

On Wednesday evening last, Mr. W. M. Massey rode his old trusty horse "Bob" to town and tied him in front of the Times office, while Mr. Massey attended a lodge session. Returning for his animal at the close of the meeting, he found his horse gone, but thinking he had gotten loose and wandered home, no alarm was felt until upon reaching home he found "Bob's" stall in the stable empty. Upon reaching town Thursday morning, and no trace of the animal being found, Mr. Massey at once took steps to notify the officers of surrounding towns. On Saturday the town marshal of Bliss held an auction, a man who was offering for sale a horse, saddle and bridle for \$10.00 and the horse being identified, was returned to Mr. Massey for the current turned over to Sheriff Zug. The practice of "borrowing" horses without asking is becoming altogether too common in this section, and an example should be made of these smart ones. —Lincoln County Times.

LAYING HEAVY STEEL.

Between Rupert and Minidoka On The Branch.

The heavy steel, which was mentioned in this paper last week as having been taken away from Burley, is being put down between this city and the main line at Minidoka, and was probably used because it was nearest to the scene of present action. This move would seem to indicate that as soon as rock ballast could be put in, the complete way could be laid. —Rupert-Hills cut-off as a part of their double track system. —Rupert Pioneer Record.

GOLD BEARING COAL.

\$1.50 Coal. Carries \$2 in Gold.

An interesting feature about the coal mined at Cambrila, Wyo., is that it is claimed to be gold-bearing. Some of the coal has contained as much as \$2 per ton in gold, and the spot was sold for only \$1.50 per ton. When coke made at Cambrila was selling for \$3.50 per ton, samples were taken from it, care being taken to keep it from being assayed. The samples showed an average of \$2.46 per ton in gold and \$9.28 in silver. The explanation offered for the presence of gold in this coal is that the sands which underlie the old peat bog and now form the roof of the coal field were derived in part from gold-bearing alluvium. While the sand was being deposited the gold worked down into the underlying bog and is now in the coal.

This is one of the interesting statements made in a report to be published in a few days by the U. S. Geological Survey. It is by Geo. Fredrickson, who is in charge of the coal field in the Black Hills, Wyoming-South Dakota. By R. W. Stone.

What the coal will do under a boiler is shown by comparative tests made by the Cambrila Fuel Co., at Cambrila, by the Lincoln Traction Co., at Lincoln, Nebraska, and by the Geological Survey field-testing plant at St. Louis. These tests are compared with similar tests made on competing coals. Besides a description of the coal field and coal mining operations at Cambrila, which is 7 miles north of Newcastle, Wyoming, the report contains a description of the coal field of the Snake River east of Elmore, Idaho. Four different coals, bituminous, splint, cannel, and "pine needle," are produced here. The conclusion reached is that none of the coal localities around the edge of the Black Hills, except Cambrila, will ever and to the State's record of coal produced and shipped. The report is fully illustrated.

The information contained in this report was collected by Mr. Stone at various times while he was examining lands for classification. It was not originally compiled for publication, but it proved to be so comprehensive and complete that it has been assembled under one cover. Bulletin 459 was obtained from a request from the Director, U. S. Geological Survey, Washington, D. C.

NEW SODA FACTORY.

New Bottling Works For Flat Water Town.

A new bottling works is soon to be a reality in this favored locality. Mr. C. Tommasi, an old-time resident with a lot of money back of him, is planning the new enterprise, which is located on Mr. Tommasi's ranch one-half mile west of town. The spring from which the water will be bottled is known to most of our people as the "Blanche Springs," named after one of Soda's most highly respected and accomplished young women.

The water in the spring is said to be the best mineral product to be found in this vicinity. It contains a large percentage of soluble iron which makes it a very valuable and healthful water, suitable for hospital and family use. The water will be charged from a natural gas spring about one-quarter mile from the big spring, which is also located on Mr. Tommasi's property.

Ground is now broken for the plant which will be a frame structure 24 feet wide and 12 feet high, with a storage of 25x10, to be used for storing the mineral water, also for sweet soda, ciders, gingerales, etc. The object of the underground storage is for the economy in fuel through the winter months, besides a dark cellar is superior for aging the soda.

The new enterprise will be named "The Gem State Mineral Water Company," named after our home state—Idaho, which is known as the Gem State, honors being divided evenly between the collector of The Chief of State, Mr. J. M. Forsyth for naming the town, for which they each are to receive the first case of Gem water turned out by the company.

Mr. Tommasi, president of the company, informs us that he has secured the service of Mr. V. W. Corwin, of this place, to superintend and manage the affairs of the company, as he, the president will devote most of his time to advertising and distribution of the product throughout the United States. The management wishes to announce to the people of Soda Springs that a special rate will be given them. They want at least one case of Gem Mineral Water in their possession all the time. The company thinks this is the best way to advertise the water to state at home and if it places the home people it is sure to please the outsider.

We are informed by Mr. Corwin that the factory will be in operation and ready for business by the first of the month of May, weather permitting.

HEAVY PENALTY POSSIBLE.

Medical License May Be Taken From Boot-Leggers.

Announcement was made that the state board of pardons had refused to interfere with the case of Dr. J. G. J. Baugh, formerly of Richfield, now serving a term in the county jail for boot-legging. He applied for a pardon, on the ground that the confinement was injuring his health. He had already served the greater part of his sentence. A petition was circulated here some time ago, asking for his release, and several signatures obtained. A remonstrance was put out, a day or two later, which seems to have been effective, as the pardon board refused to interfere. In another dispatch, it is reported that notice has been served on Dr. Carr, of Gooding, who, convicted and serving time for boot-legging, to show cause to the state medical board why his medical license should not be taken from him. It is also stated that because of his conviction, similar procedure may be taken in the Baugh case. —Richfield Record.

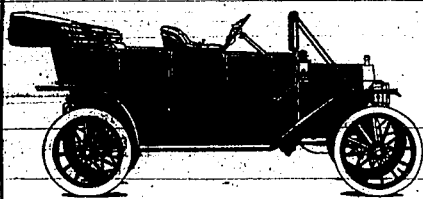

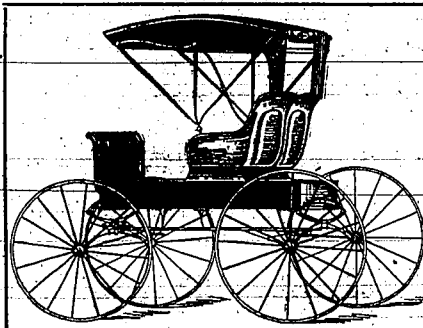

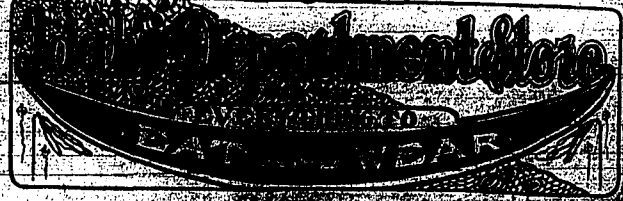
