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I began to think that I was up against me on the first of September, when I built the silo. I knew what I wanted as I had been looking at different makes of silos over for three years, but I had not time to get a good cutter. On the 20th of September I cut my corn and put it in the silo and put some sweet corn, from which the water before I had 20 head with 12 acres of corn and 42 loads of hay.

On December 1 I opened the silo to common cutting. It had settled about 14 inches, and to my surprise a crust of about four inches only was spoiled on the top. I fed it to the milking cows at the rate of a bushel basket full to three cows, and later increased to a basket to two cows twice a day. I fed hay three times morning and evening. I had a silo, 12 feet outside and 17 feet of bran for October and December, and as near as I can judge, above, on I had a quarter acre of silage to all of the 34 head. During this time I received \$104.51 for butter and milk and had remaining 600 pounds of skim milk to feed the pigs, calves and chickens. As near as I can get at it, my corn is paying me \$80 an acre. I have fed no hay as yet and have plenty to run me until June and perhaps longer.

I could talk for a week on this subject, for I have never done a thing in all my life that has given me so much satisfaction as the building of my new silo and barn; to see the cows coming in at night with their milk running freely in the milking and the chickens and good condition looks

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PARADE HANDLED BY PHONE

Knight Templar Conclave Now Being Held in Denver.

Denver, Colo., August 11.—With over 40,000 men in line General John Chase and his committee of assistants will form and direct the Knight Templar parade here almost entirely by telephone. A special central switchboard has been installed at concave headquarters and by means of branch telephones in almost intervals along the line of march the committee will be kept in direct touch with the movement and progress of the vast array of marching knights.

Besides the host of Sir Knights who are in attendance at the convocation there are over 100,000 visitors in the city, and unusual and careful plans have been prepared for their care and comfort. Special plans have been arranged by the telephone company in anticipation of the great increase in the number of telephone calls during the convocation. For months past that company has been busy installing emergency telephones, additional switchboard facilities and training the 150 extra operators who will be required to assist the regular forces in handling the calls. Over 200 emergency telephones have been connected

with the main switchboard. This is true not only of Denver, and other large convocations, but of each one of our exchanges throughout the territory.
