SALMON SETTLERS SUE FOR DAMAGES

Salmon River Land & Water Co.
Is the Defendant

NON-FULFILLMENT OF CONTRACT IS ALLEGED.

Six Cases Now on Record for Damages
Totaling \$7,910—Charge Failure to
Deliver Water According to Contract

According to the transcript of the record in Twin Falls county, six suits for fulfillment of contract were filed against the Salmon River Land and Water company by M. M. Martin, W. J. Johnson, W. J. Trueblood, G. A. Salles, J. E. Henstock and Arthur Dodd, Monday of this week.

Damages are asked by the plaintiffs to be assessed against the defendant in the following amounts: M. M. Martin, \$1,450; W. J. Johnson, \$510; W. J. Trueblood, \$750; G. A. Salles, \$750; J. E. Henstock, \$2,900; Arthur Dodd, \$1,700.

The damages are sought because of the alleged failure to deliver water in sufficient quantities and according to the contracts, during the seasons of 1910, 1911 and 1912. It is stated that the years specified are not the same in each case.

The attorney for the settlers in this latest set of actions of C. O. Longley of Twin Falls, who delivered to the Salmon River association an opinion as to the rights involved a year ago. No information concerning the suits has as yet been secured locally.—Hollister Herald.

POTATO GROWERS ARE ORGANIZED

Pocatello Named as Sub-Central for Southern Idaho

ELEVEN DISTRICTS FORMED—IN- CLUDING TWIN FALLS COUNTRY.

Meeting of the Twin Falls County
Growers to be Held in This City,
Saturday, Sept. 6th, at 2:00 p. m.

L. A. Snyder and William Check, returned Sunday from Pocatello, where they had been attending a meeting of the potato growers of the following districts: Idaho Falls, Blackfoot, Pocatello, American Falls, Minidoka tract, Burley, Jerome, Gooding, Shoshone, Richfield and the Twin Falls country.

The meeting was attended by representatives of the district mentioned and after a lengthy discussion it was unanimously voted to affiliate themselves with the North Pacific Fruit Distributors for the marketing of their potatoes.

The sub-central for the districts named will be located at Pocatello. The executive board of the sub-central consists of one member from each district, who will have charge of the business of the sub-central.

At the Pocatello meeting the delegates fixed the standard of the grade and pack. The standard of the grade and pack as fixed at the meeting will apply to all of the districts throughout the northwest and inspectors will be employed by the association to see that the grade is always up to the standard set.

There will be a meeting of the members of the Twin Falls association at the Commercial club rooms in Twin Falls, at two o'clock p. m., Saturday, September 6, for the purpose of electing a new board of directors and transacting any other business which may come before the meeting. At this meeting, J. U. McPherson, general superintendent of the potato department of the North Pacific Fruit Distributors, will be present and address the meeting, making all points clear in regard to the workings of the association.

All potato growers of the Twin Falls country, whether members of the association or not, are urged to attend this meeting.

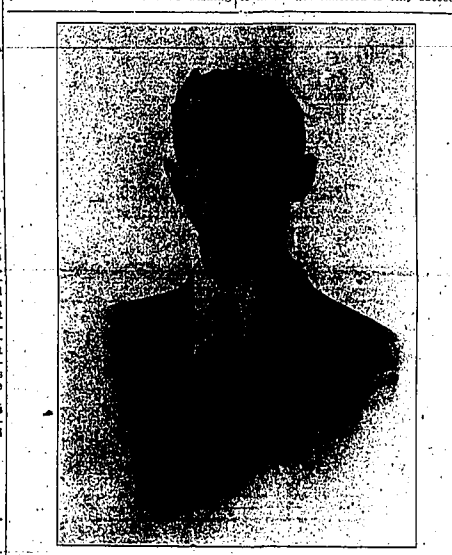
THE C. E. CONVENTION CLOSES

All Officers Re-elected—Resolutions Are Passed—Condemning Dancing, Card Playing and Vicious Shows

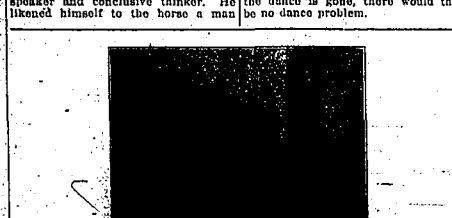

WILL DISCUSS AN IMPORTANT MOVE

Strawberry Growers Will Meet
Saturday at Commercial Club

HAVE BEEN OFFERED A MARKET FOR 350,000 POUNDS.

More Strawberries Than Were Raised
on the Entire Tract This Year—
Liquid Carbonic Co. Makes Offer.

Within the present month, the Liquid Carbonic Company of Chicago, will come to a definite decision as to where they will locate a branch house and buy their supplies of strawberries for the next five years. This is a company which manufactures soda fountain syrups on a large scale, and they stand ready to contract with the growers of berries on the Twin Falls tract for 350,000 pounds of the fruit for five years, providing that the local people can guarantee the supply, and that they can agree on a price.

A meeting of all the small fruit growers on the tract has been called for three o'clock, Saturday afternoon, September 6, at the Commercial club rooms, at which time Secretary McMillan will explain in detail the company's offer which was made through him. Should the offer be taken up, it will prove of immediate advantage to all acreage owners around Twin Falls, for an established market for small fruit is the principal thing necessary to establish a standard value for the small tract. It will also necessitate a greatly increased acreage, as the total production of the tract does not equal the amount needed by the Chicago firm. One great advantage of such a plan for marketing strawberries is the total absence of the uncertainty connected with shipping, and the saving in the cost of packing, boxing and crating. The berries will be picked in measuring devices and brought to Twin Falls and delivered over to the company here. The company will return the measures immediately as they expect to condemn the fruit before shipping it east.

Runners of the possibility of a contract with the company were in circulation some time ago, but nothing definite could be found out until Secretary McMillan could get a definite offer from them.

From financial papers in the east it is ascertained that there is at present every indication that the First-Second National bank of Pittsburgh, of which the Kahns were the principal stockholders and leading spirits and which was responsible for their financial difficulties, will soon reopen.

According to reports an arrangement is being made with the depositors whereby they will consent to re-payment of their deposits at certain intervals, thus giving the bank an opportunity to realize upon its securities before being pressed to the wall again after opening. "It is said that practically 90 per cent of the depositors have agreed to the arrangements proposed and that the matter of opening the bank again to business has been taken up with the government, whose consent will be necessary before this can be done.

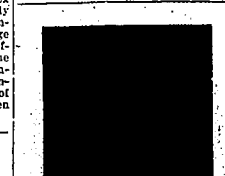
The plan suggested seems to be very similar to that proposed in the case of the Capital State bank in this city soon after the failure of that institution and which came near proving successful, the effort being defeated through the efforts of certain agencies here, which took advantage of the opportunity afforded by court records to make public the list of securities of the institution, thus destroying the confidential relation necessary to make any banking institution successful.

The rehabilitation of this banking institution would be the final act in placing the Kuhn interests back to their former condition before the failure was announced. Announcement has already been made of the fact that the Kuhn private interests and investments in other banks have been recovered from the failure.—Capital News.

THE DEEP CREEK PROJECT

State Land Board Grants Owners
Right to Sell Water.

There was a short meeting of the state land board Wednesday afternoon. At this meeting J. W. Craven of Twin Falls, appeared in behalf of the Deep Creek Land & Water company. This is a small project four miles from Hollister, within the confines of the Twin Falls-Salmon river project. It consists of 5000 acres, of which 2700 acres are in fruit, and the whole tract is under water. It was examined by Engineer J. M. Burkett for the state and his report was approved by the state engineer. The land board authorized the issuance of a certificate for the sale of water rights.—Statesman.

due the success of the convention. He has served as president of the Idaho Union for seven years and at the business meeting Saturday was re-elected. Closely associated with him and also re-elected, were these other officers of the state C. E. Union: Vice President, J. V. DeLong, Twin Falls; second vice president, Miss Elsie Schmid, Fruitland; secretary, Miss Grace Paul, Caldwell; treasurer, Ole Hansen, Caldwell; auditor, superintendent, Mrs. J. D. Hook, Boise; quiet hour superintendent, Miss Lois Pottolito, Meridian; superintendent, extension, Mrs. E. Van der Maaten, Pocatello.

On Saturday morning at the business session a resolution was read and discussed. It was passed by a large margin, revised to the following form for the purpose of publication.

RESOLUTION

Whereas, It is being recognized by juvenile courts, Christian educators, social workers and numerous other periodicals, that dancing in all its popular forms, card-playing, and vicious and suggestive shows have a definite and tendency toward the degradation and blighting the moral fiber of the growing generation; and

Whereas, Immorality and frivolity are dependably on the increase through the dance which has grown more alarmingly evil in form; be it

Resolved, First: That the Christian Endeavorers of Idaho in their twenty-first annual convention wish to go on record as being unalterably opposed to these things, that we request the schools of the state to discontinue dancing in all its popular forms, academies, and other institutions of learning and further request the faculties of these institutions to discontinue dancing among students under their care.

Be it Resolved, Second: That we instruct the superintendent of extension and the field secretary to conduct a vigorous campaign against these evils by means of public sentiment and by securing the co-operation of all pastors and Christian workers of Idaho.

Be it Resolved, Third: That we commend the school board of Twin Falls for giving the high school students an opportunity of taking Bible instruction once a week in a elective study and granting credits for such work.

Your committee of ways and means beg leave to submit the following recommendations:

First—It is realized that the Junior Christian Endeavor society is the most trusted friend of the Christian Endeavor society; therefore, it is urged that more stress be laid upon this work, and that Junior Christian Endeavor societies be organized wherever practicable.

Second—"Increase and Efficiency" is the watchword for the Christian Endeavor societies for the next two years. It is recommended that we keep this motto steadily in view in our work during the coming year, and that we hereafter make the week which occurs the second of February, our Christian Endeavor anniversary, an "Increase and Efficiency" week, when we shall take stock of our activities, see whether we are in any good measures living up to our ideals, and so forward in the Master's name to new and larger endeavors.

Third—Idaho stood in the front rank of the states having the largest increase in membership during the increase campaign. The efficiency campaign was not as actively pushed during the past two years. In order to fully carry out the motto for the coming year—"Increase and Efficiency"—it is recommended that a special effort be made to carry the efficiency campaign in every society in the state, and that the fact of the start of the campaign and the progress from progress from time to time be reported to the superintendent of the introduction and extension department; that the superintendent of this department be authorized to appoint one assistant to assist in this work. The reasons why this campaign should be made are: (1) For the betterment of our societies; (2) For the development of the members; (3) For the credit of our state union; (4) Because God expects of us more efficient service.

Fourth—There is nothing more important connected with the Christian Endeavor movement than the training and equipped workers and officers. It is therefore urged that every

society organize a C. E. study class, to study the book "Endeavor," that examines the lives of a number of receiving the title "Christian Endeavor Expert," and that every state officer become a C. E. Expert.

Fifth—In view of the fact that a large number of the young people of the state are not in any Christian Endeavor society, and that a number of our churches are yet without such an organization; it is recommended that as existing societies we do all we can to bring young people in touch with our work and organize societies wherever possible, and report same. That we give our undivided support to our field secretary, Rev. H. F. Bottum, at the times he is with us, that we arrange for the meetings suggested and recommended, and contribute liberally toward his support and expenses, and that \$1,000 be raised for this work.

Sixth—In view of the fact that it is impossible for the state officers to reach every department of the work required, it is recommended that two new departments be organized, the same being citizenship department and the department of tenth legion work.

Seventh—It is a sad fact that the young people of our churches are not as versed in the Bible and mission work as they should be; therefore, it is recommended that Bible class or mission study class, if possible, not be organized in every society.

Eighth—We recommend the continuation of the campaign for the Endeavor World, and that we make strenuous efforts to reach the 90 subscribers to insure the payment of the expenses of a delegate to the national Christian Endeavor convention.

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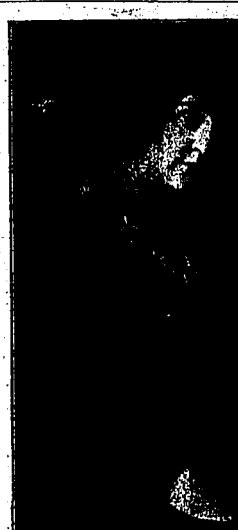
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FINE COMPANY COMING

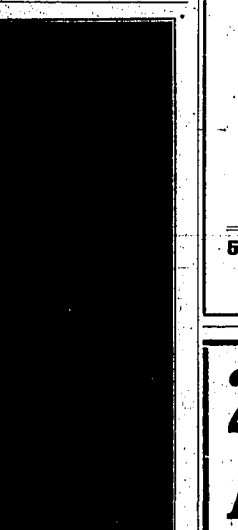
Grand Army Encampment
