CLAIMS BEAVER RIVER CO. HAS NO RIGHT TO LAND ON MALA.

Question Will Be Heard Before Judge Davis In Boise, on Tuesday, January 20.

PROGRESSIVE FIRST IN POLITICAL FIELD

State Third Party Convenes at Boise

E. J. HORNIBROOK REPRESENTS TWIN FALLS COUNTY.

Bull. Moosers Will Fly to Full State and County Fickett in the Field for Campaign.

Sgt. E. J. Hornibrook, who has just returned from Boise, where he went to a conference of the Progressive party, brings home word tonight to the heart of every progressive in the state that the third district court has passed a bill against the state land board granting certain land along the Malad river, granted to the Beaver River Power company, S. H. Hayes, general counsel for the claim interests, is the author of the bill.

The complainant alleges that on October 19, 1911, the Beaver River Power company made application to the state land board to purchase a tract of land for a dam site along the Malad river, and the notwithstanding the Malad river, the state land board ordered eight way, day, to be done after the application by officers of the board.

On the same day, J. A. Nutt and George A. Day, upholder and land commissioner respectively, reported they had no objection to the land being taken at a value of \$10 per acre, and thereafter on the same day the Beaver River Power company paid \$10,40 to the state board for the land applied for.

The complainant alleges that not until after Nutt and Morris, Nach and Daz moved or went near the land but made the application without seeing it, and it was well known by James H. Hawley, W. L. Gifford, D. C. McDougal and S. D. Taylor, members of the state land board, that the land was not worth its appraised value, and far in excess of \$3000. The land board had prior to August 1911, known that another power company was engaged in erecting a power plant on the said Malad River, and the said Beaver River Power company, Nach and Daz, would work to the disadvantage of the other company.

That the Beaver River company erected a dam at the point in question, and that the dam was built across the said land, and only so as to prevent the other company from operating upon the land. On December 31, 1912, a few days before the land board went out of office, they issued an order that the Beaver River company must extend to county and school affairs, consistent with official action.

We declared for a just and equitable laboring men's compensation act. Against increasing the supreme court for three members to five for a log-off-and-land bill, which will permit the carrying of bonds to cities and towns, and further bonds annual their lands, without expense to the state; we also declared for the initiative, referendum and recall, including the recall of judges and what will be of interest to the section, particularly the election of the state auditor.

We also declared that the state, fulfill its pledges to the Carey act settlers and make every project in the state while without additional cost or burden to the settler; this can be done by the same methods concerning the tax, and making communities fulfill their contracts with the state.

What we did at the meeting was not to adopt a party platform, we formally declared a declaration-of-principle, which will be adopted by every voter in the state, within the next few days.

Progressive clubs will be formed in every county of the state within the next few months. State Chairman Gilson is to devote his entire time to this work, and will be at Twin Falls during the winter.

As spokesman this year we will have a plenty. Last year the burden fell entirely on our leader, Governor Martin. This year he will have many more men of ability to help him.

He is the only man in the mind of our national committee, was the 25,000 men and women who braved the slush and rain, at last year's election, to write in the names of the Progressive electors;

and now we will show Roosevelt, Beyers, Governor Johnson and others will be with us in this campaign. Oh! you may depend upon it, that this will be an earnest and thorough campaign.

Our first regular meeting will be at this time, but within the next few weeks will come delegations of prominent Republicans who have elected to affiliate with us which will be startling. Senator Luck will already come in and there will be others more startling.

Locally, we will have a full ticket and we are going to get it.

HEARING FOR BRIDGE AT FALLS Petition Circulated Asking County Commissioners to Consider Bridge Appropriation



INCOMES MUST BE DECLARED

All Salaries and Investments Over \$1000 Included.

Washington.—The form to be used and regulations to be followed by individuals in making returns of income subject to the new income tax were sent out Monday by the Bureau of Internal Revenue, the division of the United States weather residing in the United States and every nonresident alien who has income from United States in the amount of \$3000 or over must make such returns.

Interest must be in the hands of the collector of internal revenue in the districts where the payee lives or where he has his principal place of business, not later than March 1, failure to observe this limit to be punished with fine ranging from \$20 to \$1000.

For 1913, the specific exemptions will be \$4600 or \$333.33 in the case of a married person, and in future years \$3000 and \$4000. When the income is less than \$3000 it may be taken as dividends on stock of a corporation which is taxable under the corporation tax section of the law, the regulation set forth that such income shall be deducted from the individual's total income when computing the amount on which he is taxed.

The law imposed a tax of 1 per cent on incomes over \$20,000 and not more than \$10,000 can be put up additional tax of \$1000 and not over \$7000,

2 per cent; on all over \$70,000 and not over \$100,000, 3 per cent; all over \$100,000 and not over \$250,000, 4 per cent;

all over \$250,000 and not over \$300,000, 5 per cent, and all over \$300,000, 6 per cent.

Expenses for medical attendance, store accounts, family supplies, wages of domestic servants, cost of board, room or house rent, which not be deducted, but the gross income of individuals who own their own residence cannot deduct the estimated value of the rent.

The farmer is required to include in his net income all money from produce and animals sold for personal and business purposes, unless specifically provided otherwise.

Persons receiving fees or compensation for professional or other services must include all actual receipts for services or contracts, except those which are not collectable.

Debts contracted within a current year may be deducted from gross income when found worthless, but not before legal proceedings have proved unsatisfactory. Debts contracted in previous years may be deducted substantially under the head of losses, when they are charged off.

Amounts due or accrued to individual members of a partnership from net earnings of the partnership, whether or not United States investments must be included in his income. Estimated advance of real estate value is not required to be reported unless placed in an account with the partnership.

Businesses owned and others leased or operated by an ordinary business or trade would strike a balance with the rest of the household expenses, but not from gross income of a business. In computing net income compensation of all officers, employees, etc., and political subdivision thereof shall be excluded, but not where paid by the United States—Statesman.
