The amount of fuss being made over Barney O'Neil and his application for pardon seems to be increasing as the time draws near for the final decision of the board of pardons. Barney O'Neil, sentenced for merely two years for hank clobbering, is taking on either a halo or cloven hoofs according to the view of the person talking. It is and travels on justice and right that men of Barney O'Neil's type are continually all over this nation getting pardoned because of their prominence or their money, while the poor thief driven by necessity to steal, is held for his full sentence with never a thought for his future or for his family left in abject poverty. The Times has no particular objection to O'Neil's pardon, but believes that the pardon board gets too busy every year releasing men whose crimes are black enough to warrant longer sentences rather than short ones. The shortening of the terms indiscriminately is doing a great amount of harm in abetting more crimes and for that reason should be done only in a few circumstances.

In all of the discussions pro and con over the postoffice department management between Postmaster General Burleson and the members of Congress with regard to the deficit and the proposed enlargement of the parcel post, so far as a word has been said about the real cause of postal deficits, the franking system. The pay for Congressmen is not any too high and very likely a judicious use of the system for the furtherance of political success seems permissible to the men who are benefiting from the present plan. But taken from the standpoint of expense to the whole people, there is a little excuse for the system existing. The day of the Congressman could be doubled or tripled to give them a living salary and still save millions which are being annually wasted in the franking system. Maps are compiled at a great cost and sent out promiscuously as a salvo for vote getting for the Congressmen. Not one in ten thousand such recipients appreciate the map or the country. The same is true of the free seeds sent alike to people living in the city where gardens are impossible. Millions in good money go for this purpose. Each Congressman uses the franking system to send out personal letters which have no value to the government or the people, but do help to build up the political fences for the men in congress. All of the above items help to swell the volume of mail transported and help to boost the big sums paid to the railroads. Yet not a word is ever said about one of the biggest grafts in the whole department. Some of the so-called pro-

gressive leaders can make a bit with the tax-burdened people if they will remedy just this one evil.

## HOME INDUSTRY WEEK

As an annual home products-booster proposition Home Industry Week should be more generally observed in this city than heretofore. As a means of propagating better support of home produced goods it should be loyally supported by all classes of citizens. The people of Twin Falls with a few exceptions have been very slow in their own advance progress. Citizens of this state in making anything of the concerns which are bringing payrolls to the city and also fame on the outside by the excellence of their products. The merchants should all get behind the movement and show the rest of the people that their opposition to mail-order business rests on a more general basis than mere selfishness. It should be the aim of the merchants to boost their industries with the increase of every industry payroll every merchant reaps the benefit in increased business. The ranchers also by the increase of home products and the increased number of workers reap a direct profit which should make them strong boosters for every home industry. As a matter of fact, however, only the newspapers are expected to boost home industry week, while the others sit back and applaud their efforts. The Times would like to suggest to the merchants and business men that the newspapers are furnishing a very good example of home industries which distribute a payroll in this city. Printers are always loyal patrons of home concerns. Therefore the newspapers are entitled to a fair amount of boosting along with the rest. Last week's home industry week a week of good fellowship and community profit abiding by constant and well directed efforts.

## PROGRESS OF THE "CITY MANAGER" PLAN.

The "city manager" plan of municipal government, described by Mr. H. S. Gilbertson in this Review for May 1913, has been making rapid strides. Although known originally as the Lockport (New York) plan, the first city actually to adopt it was Sumter, South Carolina, which voted for it on June 12, 1912. The scheme in brief, as many of our readers know, calls for a single executive head of the city's affairs, employed by and subject to a popularly elected commission. The first city manager, chosen by Sumter, was a Virginia city engineer, Mr. M. M. Worthington, who demonstrated his special training and fitness for the work by saving half his salary in one or two items of city expenditure alone. Last November Mr. William F. Robertson succeeded Mr. Worthington as city manager of Sumter. The smaller communities of Hickory and Morganton in North Carolina followed the example of Sumter, becoming "city manager" cities in the spring of last year. The greatest publicity for the new plan of municipal government, however, has come from its adoption last August by the important city of Dayton, Ohio, with a population of upwards of 115,000. Dayton had been suffering from political mismanagement, with its usual evils of inefficiency and extravagance, and its citizens had become aroused of the necessity of lifting the city out of its wretched condition. A vigorous campaign of education, handicapped by the dreadful flood conditions of last year, resulted in a home rule charter, embodying the city manager plan, and drafted by a board of fifteen elected freeholders, which was adopted on August 12, 1913. After a wide and thorough search for an expert executive, Mr. Henry M. Walte, city engineer of Cincinnati, was selected as manager. In the same month Springfield, Ohio, with nearly fifty thousand inhabitants, followed Dayton in adopting the new plan, since then a number of smaller cities

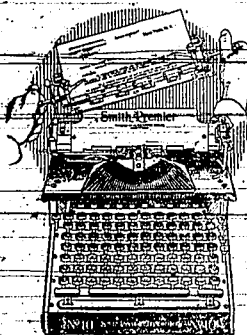

### NEWS ITEMS

From S. B. Arthur, Forest Supervisor,  
Humboldt National Forest.

Machinery and horses have been  
purchased, and as soon as weather  
conditions will permit, work will be  
begun by the forest service in co-op-  
eration with settlers on the repair of  
fifty miles of road in the Humboldt  
national forest.

The proposed approved for the com-  
ing spring the two toppling of the  
road from the Penrod bridge, north  
across Sunflower Flat, through the  
country at the head of Telephone  
creek, known locally as the "Habs  
any's," and down McDonald creek to  
Hicks creek, thence north to Idaho  
line. This opens up a good route for  
settlers in northern Elko county,  
through to Mountain Home and Boise;  
also gives an outlet for ranchers and  
settlers living in the vicinity of Mc-  
Donald creek to Elko, the county seat.  
The county has done several hundred  
dollars' worth of work on this road  
last season.

Another project is the repair of the  
road from Mountain City to Aura. This  
is the regular stage and mail road  
from Elko to Twin Falls to Mountain  
City, and is also extensively used for  
freighting by wagon.

A third project is the repair of the  
Jack creek road, which is a short cut  
through the Independence division of  
the Humboldt from the Tuscarora  
country to the Gold creek and upper  
North Fork country. By this route  
the distance from Gold creek to Tus-  
carora will be reduced thirty or forty  
miles.

It is also planned to build a road  
from Gold creek to Jarbridge, up Mar-  
tin canyon across the Brunson river,  
and following the divide between Coon  
creek and the Jarbridge river to join  
the Jarbridge Charleston and Death  
road near the head of Bear creek,  
thence to Jarbridge.

These improvements will open up  
direct routes between Elko and north-  
ern Elko county and Idaho, Twin Falls,  
Rogerson and Buhl. The Gold creek  
Jarbridge road is much needed and is  
of special interest since it passes  
through some of the most scenic parts  
of Nevada. These roads will be con-  
structed so that they can be traveled  
by automobile and will add much to  
the pleasure and convenience of the  
public.
