Four Irrigation Companies to Be Turned Over to Bondholders

SALE OF AMERICAN WATERWORKS

Gigantic Company Will Have Properties In Idaho, California and Other

Pittsburg—An order was issued by Judge Charles P. Orr in the federal court Monday authorizing the sale of the American Waterworks & Guarantee company. Attorney Hillary B. Brunot was appointed master for the purpose of conducting the sale and an

The sale of the company will be held on April 15, and it is thought the reorganization committee will buy the properties. As officially announced for the reorganization plan provides for the formation of a new company, to acquire all the assets of the present companies except cash and the shares of stock, notes and the floating indebtedness of the following companies:

ies: Twin Falls-North Side Land & Water company, Twin Falls-Salmon River Land & Water company, Twin Falls-Onkley Land & Water company, Sacramento Valley Irrigation company, and shares of the California & Idaho company, and except such other properties as the company may

The four irrigation companies are to be turned over to the bondholders protective committee, representing the bonds of those companies, and \$1,000,000 is to be paid to them for the re-

The money to be received by the Irrigation Bondholders company will be used for the development of their properties, and the equir in the properties will ultimately be divided so

The first mortgage bonds of the California-Idaho company, which are also guaranteed by the American company, are to be exchanged for an equal amount of the collateral trust bonds of the new company.

In the matter of the reconsideration of a levy for road poll tax.

In this matter, on motion of O. G. Zuck, duly carried, the action formerly taken by the Board on January 27th, 1914, fixing a levy for road poll tax was reconsidered by the Board and a motion was made by O. G. Zuck, duly seconded and unanimously approved, that a levy be made on each able-bodied adult male, residing between the ages of 21 and 60 years in the amount of \$2.00 for road purposes, providing the tax is paid prior to October 1st, 1914.

If said tax be not paid prior to said date it shall be declared delinquent and on and after said date of October 1st, 1914, there shall be added to each poll tax a penalty of \$1.00.

In the matter of a resolution to be forwarded to the State Public Utilities Commission regarding the proposed Great Shoshone & Twin Falls Water Power Co. to enjoin the Idaho Power & Light Company from doing business in the City of Twin Falls.

In this matter by unanimous action of the Board the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas we are informed that a protest has been filed with your honorable committee by the Great Shoshone & Twin Falls Water Power Company, or its agent, praying that the Idaho Power & Light Company be enjoined from doing business in the City of Twin Falls;

Whereas our cities have granted the said Idaho Power & Light Company franchises and this Commission granted the above Company a franchise in the County of Twin Falls;

Whereas these actions in our judgment were for the relief of the citizens and surrounding territory and to obtain sufficient electricity to supply all of our people and give them a better and cheaper supply of electricity, therefore

Be it resolved that it is the sense of the Board that the Idaho Power & Light Company be permitted immediately to enter and transact business in accordance with the rights granted them in the franchises and permits.

Be it further resolved that this resolution be spread on the minutes of this Board and a copy be mailed by special delivery to the Public Utilities Commission.

In the matter of contracting for the care of the county poor.

In this matter it appearing to the satisfaction of the Board that the present contract with Dr. T. O. Boyd, expired on February 5th, 1914, and bids for the care of the county poor having been filed by Dr. Whitte, Conditum and Pike, said bids were opened and considered by the Board and the Board being fully advised in the premises accepted the bid of Dr. W. F. Pike, it being the lowest and best bid. Said bid being as follows:

Said bid being conditioned on the purchase by the county of the present stock of furniture of the Cottage Inn and also for a full year's medical service requiring medical care at the rate of \$1.00 per day and all infants and children under the age of ten years were receiving medical attention at the rate of 75c per day and in conjunction with the two accounts as county physician to receive a salary of Seventy dollars per month said salary to include all costs of transportation, necessary drugs and dressings.

The Board thereupon approved a contract with Dr. W. F. Pike to conform with said bid.

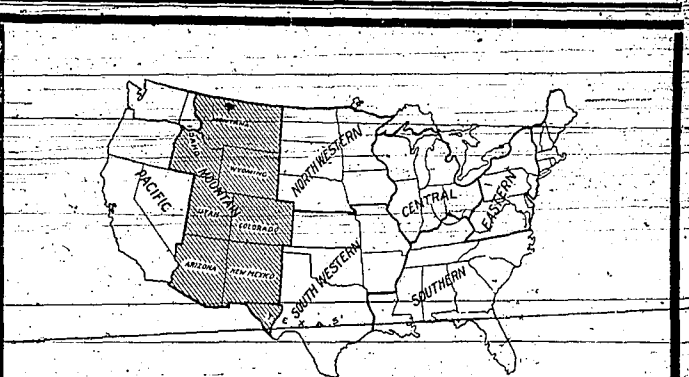

ROBBERY MOTIVE FOR MURDER

Butte, Montana, Man Found Dead—Short Distance from Minidoka.

Deep mystery surrounds the tragic death of William C. Bauer of Butte, Mont., who was found dead by a sheep herder two or three hours' ride southeast of Minidoka in a long abandoned waste last Thursday. Bauer had left Butte on Jan. 13 for Portland, where he had purchased a farm. A coronor's inquest was held Monday and the verdict of the jury was that Bauer had met his death by a blow on the head at the hands of an unknown person and that robbery was the motive about \$75 to \$100 and his watch having been taken from him. He was traveling on a through ticket and this also is missing. One specimen of cigarette in connection with the case was the finding of his hat fully three miles north and east of where the body was found and the north side of the O. & N. tracks, while the body was found on the south side of the tracks. Apparently the body had lain a long time, as it was badly decomposed. Undertaker B. G. Jones was called from Burley and prepared the body for shipment to Butte. Bauer was 40 years old, leaves a wife and 11 children—Capital News.

Butter, Eggs, Poultry and Vegetables Can be Shipped in First Two Zones.

Washington—Postmaster General Ephraim Sunday approved an amendment to the parcel post regulations under which butter, eggs, fruits, vegetables, poultry and other perishable articles weighing from 2 to 10 pounds, may be shipped by the first and second zones, in boxes and crates similar to those handled by express companies. The amendment provides that parcels weighing 20 pounds or less will be handled as before and must be securely packed. Statesman.

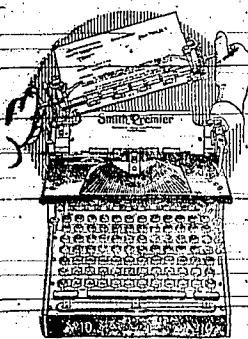
