MEN SENTENCED FOR MULROY MURDER

Irely Confesses to Premeditated Killing

COMPANION SAID TO HAVE OCCUPIED PIED MINOR ROLE

Drunken Debauch Brings Two Lives and Safety Out a Third on Blue Lakes Grade.

Louis Irely and Carl Jacobs, who have been held in the county jail since the beginning of the trial for the murder of Michael Mulroy, which occurred on the Blue Lakes Grade, were brought before Judge C. O. Stockslager in the district court in Shoshone, Idaho, yesterday afternoon.

The two men, who are accused of committing the crime, made their way to Eden, where they were arrested while walking along the railroad track. Mulroy was known in this city, having worked here for some time. He had remained here alone a long time in this city before going to Jerome. They were on their way from Jerome to Twin Falls when the crime was committed.

ONE CONVICTED TWO ACQUITTED

Ribby Man Found Guilty of Voluntary Manslaughter

Idaho Falls—George Askew guilty of voluntary manslaughter, Mary A. Parks and Albert W. Ashew not guilty, was the verdict of the jury at 2 o'clock Sunday morning at Ribby in the case of George Askew, his father, Harry Askew, his son, Albert W. Askew, charged with conspiracy to murder George T. Parks, a well-to-do rancher and husband of Mary A. Parks.

Parks and his wife had separated, the latter going to her father's home. She died still suffering, but this was denied.

On March 29 she went to the Parks home to secure her personal belongings, found some people moving in. Mrs. Parks' husband came and told the people to move. A scuffle between husband and wife followed, the woman retiring to her father's home. She went back to the Parks home that afternoon, her father and brother accompanying her. A struggle started and continued through the night and killed the patient.

The contention of the state was that the three entered into conspiracy to kill Parks, the motive being to secure his property. George Askew, in his own defense, testified in his own behalf and in that of his daughter and son, and said that after reaching the Parks home, Mrs. Parks and her husband went into a room while he and his son stayed in the kitchen. Hearing a struggle in the room, he entered and saw his son Askew knocking the gun off his father's hand and ordered Parks to desist, when the latter drew a rifle from the bed and fired at him, the woman knocking the gun to one side, the shot going wild. The woman and her husband then clinched and began to kill the whole party when Askew fired, shooting Parks through the heart.

Albert Askew corroborated his father's story in part, justifying that he did not enter the room until after his son had fired. His son, Parks did not testify.

The trial was held at Ribby and lasted nine days. Interest was intense and the courtroom was crowded at every session. Judge Walker's pronouncement to the disqualification of Judge W. F. Walker.

Askew will be sentenced Monday.

WONDERFUL ESCAPE FROM DISASTER

Young Girl Hit By Passenger Train Saturday

THROWN A HUNDRED THIRTEEN FEET BY COLLISION

Alta King Miraculously Escapes With
Only Slight Injuries Near Kim-
berly.

Alta King, a fourteen year old girl living near Kimberly, was brought to the Twin Falls hospital Saturday afternoon by the Short Line passenger train which had struck the buggy containing her and smashed it to kindling. The injuries received by the patient were some slight bruises and a broken collarbone.

According to the account of the accident, the noon west bound passenger train was running at a high speed to make up the time lost by the young girl, who was crossing the tracks near Kimberly. The youthful victim was picked up unconscious a distance of one hundred thirteen feet from the crossing, so great was the impact of the collision while the buggy was traveling at a high rate of speed. It is generally accepted that cushion was the largest portion of the vehicle found. The horse had crossed and the collision cut away the thills without injury to the animal.

The little girl on being interviewed could not conceive of any accident that had nothing to do with the rig. She did not know what had struck the rig. It seems miraculous in view of the condition of the rig and the distance which the young girl was thrown that she escaped instant death.
