OLIVER P. DUVALL

Will make Twin Falls County an Efficient Probate Judge

WHAT the public demands in the administration of the probate court is efficiency and ability to dispose of the legal questions presented and a sound judgment and sympathetic heart to deal with juvenile delinquents. The important duties devolving upon this court by reason of its jurisdiction in civil cases involving amounts under five hundred dollars, making it the "people's court," its jurisdiction in a large proportion of the criminal cases arising in the county, and its administration of the juvenile law, make it imperative, in the language of the Utah supreme court, that "it shall be administered by those who have learned in the law and versed in the rules of procedure to the end that the beneficent purposes of the law may be made effective and individual rights respected."

Understands the Law.

Oliver P. Duvall is particularly well fitted to administer the duties of the probate court. He is a native of Kansas, where he gained experience in the duties of the office for which he is a candidate. He was for four years Clerk of the district court of Smith county, and during the last two years Vice of a Smith county, then made effective imposing new duties on that office, he served as Judge pro tem of the probate court. He was also for one year county clerk. His familiarity with legal procedure was augmented by studies prosecuted for three years with one of the leading lawyers of Northwest Kansas, during which time he practiced in Justice, Probate and District courts.

A Pioneer Settler.

Mr. Duvall is one of the pioneer settlers of the Salween tract, making his home in Hollister since 1910. Besides being prominently identified with every movement tending to the betterment of the community, he has acted as trustee of the peace, and chairman of the school board. He is familiar with school conditions in this county, and is able to consider juvenile questions coming before him from the viewpoint of the child as well as from the legal point of view. To Quote Judge Ben B. Lindsey, "A young man who remembers well his own boyhood has a special asset for that position."

Progressive Policies.

His policy with regard to the administration of the juvenile law is progressive. In the case of girl delinquents, for instance, he proposes appointing women referees. Invariably heretofore, men have been appointed referees in such cases. Mr. Duvall believes that in such cases a woman is much better qualified to gain the confidence of the girl, resulting in the moral gain of the delinquent, and the increased efficiency of the court dealing with the juvenile problem.

Mr. Duvall is by temperament, association and education especially adapted to the work of the juvenile court. No delinquent placed on his honor by Mr. Duvall will violate his parole. Because of these qualifications which he possesses to a marked degree, Mr. Duvall is receiving magnificent support from men and women who are back of the educational, civic and moral forces of the county and are particularly interested in the juvenile court.—Adv.

In reply to the article of Mr. Herriman, criticizing Mr. Gallinger and myself for quoting figures showing the cost and present expenditures in the conduct of the business of the sheriff's office, I desire to comment briefly on three or four points.

It will be observed that Mr. Herriman says that if he is elected to the office of sheriff, he will act as jailor himself, and thereby do away with the office. If it is not proposed to reduce the expense of the conduct of the office, why should the estimate of expenses for 1915 be placed at \$13,875.00 an increase of \$2,824.00 over the year 1914.

Mr. Herriman also makes the statement that during the four years (1909-1912) the number of criminal cases in the Probate court was 114, whereas in the past twenty-one months the number has been 250, over twice the number in less than half the time. This is cited to show a purported increase in the county's criminal business. An investigation will disclose that there has been no increase; that this purported increase has been due solely to the policy of the present prosecuting attorney to bring all possible prosecutions in the Probate court during the past twenty-one months to the practical exclusion of the justice courts, where they were formerly brought, and which matters would consequently not appear of record in the Probate court for the years preceding 1913, but only in the justice courts for the various preceding years.

Mr. Herriman further says: "The expense of the juvenile work of the county has been charged to the sheriff's office—whereas in fact it is properly chargeable to the state accounts."

The records in the county auditor's office show that V. H. Ormsby, Probate officer has drawn a salary of \$1250 per month as Probate officer and a salary of \$1125.00 per month as deputy sheriff. This is properly chargeable to the sheriff's office; it will not be questioned that Mr. Ormsby has taken an active part in the work of the sheriff's office, and an investigation of his duties as Probate officer will disclose that he is not occupied more than three or four days per month.

It is a further fact that the salary of C. C. Higgins has been charged to the county, but disallowed by the board of county commissioners. If this is allowed, the office will be chargeable with an additional expense of \$533.33 per month, or \$1000.00 for the year 1914.

It is a further fact that considerable work of the sheriff's office has been performed by pre-arrest constables during the years 1911, 1912, 1913, 1914. It is a further fact that the records show that in at least 45 criminal cases brought during the past 18 months an entry appears on the docket of the prosecuting attorney's office to the effect that the defendant has not been found by the sheriff's office. In a vast majority of these cases the charges have been of a serious nature.

No party format should object to a careful scrutiny of the affairs of the office from a public standpoint. I am willing to state that I have not been a deputy in the sheriff's office, but I do believe that I have the right to express an honest criticism. Otherwise no person would have a right to stand in judgment on the conduct of any public office which he never had.

There must be of necessity a first time for a new man to enter any office. As to my qualifications for the office, I refer you to former Governor Hawley, Governor Haines, my successor in office, Mr. O. H. Barber, or Mr. R. D. Smith. I have been a deputy who are familiar with the state game warden's office, in which I had the honor to serve for a short time.

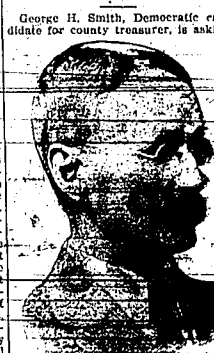
