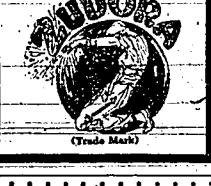

# POULTRY FACTS

## SUITABLE HOUSE FOR DUCKS

(By D. O. BAFFO, University of Illinois.)  
 Much less expensive buildings will answer for ducks than are required for hens. The essentials are a dry floor, which should be kept well bedded with straw or shavings, adding a fresh layer on top as the old litter becomes soiled or damp. It is not necessary to clean the house out, as the droppings do not heat like hen manure. The roof must be tight, and the sides made of wire sheeting material. A window 2x3 feet made to slide, and a drop door 2x3 feet for the ducks, with another door for the attendant to enter, are all the openings necessary. The house should be 12x12 feet for each flock of 20 ducks. A large yard is unnecessary during the laying season, as the birds will not exercise much. The food and water should be given outside the house, and the yards should be kept free from mud by the use of clinders or litter.

Food in the pond for the ducks can not soil and waste the food. About the middle of November, the birds are put on their laying ration, which must not be changed till the season ends. Feed night and morning the following mixture: five parts of corn chop, five parts of bran, two parts of middlings, two parts of meat scraps, four parts of cut green stuff, five per cent of coarse sand. Mix and mix with the mix in scrubby. An addition of three or four parts of boiled vegetables is desirable if it can be provided. The "greenstuff" may be rice, clover, oats, alfalfa, or whatever can be most easily provided. In the winter finely cut hay or alfalfa that has been scalded over night is a good substitute.

One large duck lover states: "In exactly three weeks after beginning this feeding, we will see fine ducks gather eggs." Pekin ducks are splendid layers, and large flocks will average 120 to 140 eggs per duck in the season.

## HENS' DUST BATH IN WINTER

Fine Road Dust Is Essential for Keeping Fowls Free From Vermin During Cold Weather.

A box of fine road dust should be kept within easy reach of the hens every day in the year, when there is no dust in the yard for the hens to wallow in. Of course, hens on free range in summer and fall will usually find an unlimited supply of dust ready at hand, or at least all we need to do is to spread up a place if the soil in the yard is hard. The dust bath is just as essential in winter in keeping the hens free from lice as it is in hot weather. Lice thrive and multiply in winter as well as in summer; not so rapidly, of course, yet fast enough in the average poultry house to make life a torture for the hens if nothing is done to keep the insects in check.

## POULTRY NOTES

As a rule, Monday is the best killing day.

# IDLERS DESTROY ALL CHANCES OF PROFIT

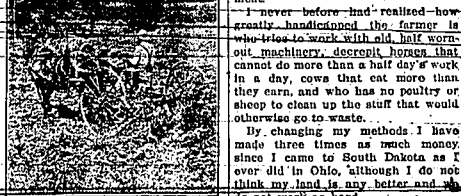


Get Rid of the Old Machinery and Have the Most Up-to-Date, Labor-Saving Kind—This is an Era of Efficiency.

 A good many years ago I suddenly woke up to the fact that the idlers on the farm are the things that keep a man from making money. When I came West fifteen years ago I visited a big manufacturing plant at Chicago and I was struck by the system which kept everybody and everything busy.

In going through the factory I could not see an idle man nor an idle machine. Everything and everybody was on the jump every minute. No lost motion, no loafing on the job. And as I pondered over the matter on my way to my new farm I began to realize how much I had lost in the past through maintaining idle and unproductive things.

As soon as I got settled I sold off three old horses I had brought with me, and bought two good ones. I traded four cows that had never been up to the mark for two that gave more milk than the four ever did, and I invested some of my capital in a flock of the best brood sows I could buy in the county.



Then I traded an old reaper that I had hauled from central Ohio for five tons of bees and a good plow. I made up my mind that I would have the best tools and the best live stock.

## GOOD PROTECTION FOR TREES

Pennsylvania Expert Recommends That All Litter Be Removed and Earth Mound Be Erected.

The damage to trees, particularly in young orchards, from gnawing by rabbits and mice during the winter time is very great. Last winter in particular there was unusual abundance of field mice. When the snow thawed from meadows the burrows of mice could be seen extending in all directions. Many young trees planted in soil or where manure or much came closely around their bases were completely girdled by these animals. As a precautionary measure, Professor Paddock of Ohio college of agriculture recommends that litter of all kinds be removed from around the trunks of young trees and that a six-inch mound of earth, thrown about trunks of such trees is also a good plan. This protection of earth also safeguards to a certain extent against winter injury.

One does not want to go to the other extreme, however, and remove all covering from the tops, tree roots. Experiment has shown that a certain amount of organic matter in or on the soil will often protect the trees from injury during a hard winter.

Rabbits are always present and the possibility of injury should always be guarded against. One of the ways recommended for preventing the rabbits from gnawing the trees is to protect them with some form of tree protector. This may either be a cylinder of fine-meshed woven wire or wood veneer or cloth.

Good Type of Brood Sow  
 In selecting a brood sow, form is first to be considered. The body should be finely built, vigorous, long with heavy quarters, fat back, short snout, ears and limbs. The neck should not be too short. She should be a vigorous feeder, with great capacity, because an indolent feeder will starve her pigs. A sow whose litter ranges less than eight to twelve pigs each is a failure.

Less Seed Required.  
 Less seed to the acre is required where oats are sown with the drill than when seeded broadcast.

It is very often as much the fault of the milker, if the cow goes dry, as it is the fault of the cow herself. The way she is handled and the feed she is given are important factors.

# ORCHARD CLEANINGS

## GOOD TILLING BY EXPLOSION

Experiments Have Proved That Young Trees Grow More Rapidly and Vigorously by This Method.

It begins to look as if cultivation of the soil by explosion is to be one of the recognized methods of farming in the future, just as locomotion by explosion is already one of the principal means of getting carried about. In other words, the "explosive plow" will become as familiar as the explosive engine.

English authority on high explosives, W. Mearns, points out that this new method of cultivation is especially beneficial to orchards. Instead of digging a hole with the spade in which to plant a young tree, an explosive is already one of the principal means of getting carried about.

This extends far beyond the edges of the excavation, and below its bottom, as the fresh supplies of chemical food are brought within reach of the roots of the tree.

Experiments have proved that young trees planted in ground prepared by explosion grow much more rapidly and vigorously than those planted in the usual way, and begin to bear fruit sooner.

Old exhausted orchards may be reinvigorated by the use of explosives. In some cases small cartridges are exploded under the roots of the trees and in other cases larger cartridges, buried three or more feet deep, are exploded midway between trees standing 15 feet apart. The result is to loosen the soil without injuring the trees.

## HARM BY APPLE TREE BORER

Thick Whitewashes on Trunk and Limbs Act as Repellent Against Female.

The flat-head borer is a very destructive insect. It is characterized by its habit of boring into the trunk and properly planted trees which die soon after setting out, are killed by the larvae of these small, active, copper-colored beetles. Young trees of almost every variety are attacked, especially if set out near woodlands containing oak, which seems to be the favorite host; and from which the borers breed out in large numbers.

It is not difficult to find the entrance to the tree, so external sprays or applications are satisfactory, and the only course of treatment is personal attention to each infested tree.

Preventive methods are more successful. A thick coating of some harmless substance is applied to the trunk and limbs.

Trunks and larger limbs of young trees should be sprayed against the female desiring to deposit her eggs. Thick whitewash painted or sprayed on the tree acts as good repellent. If the appearance of whitewashed trees is objectionable, the addition of a little lampblack will tone down the brilliant white to a gray, still leaving the caustic lime unaltered. Thick soap washes are also recommended for this treatment.

Gooseberry Pruning.  
 Every spring strong roots are thrown out from the gooseberry bush and these bear fruit the following season. The old wood must be removed to make room for the new, or else you will soon have a mass of shoots so crowded that they bear no fruit. It is not meant that the old wood should be cut every year. Rather select two or three good shoots and let them branch out to be the fruit bearers for some years. Meanwhile remove the most of the new growth.

Cost of Production.

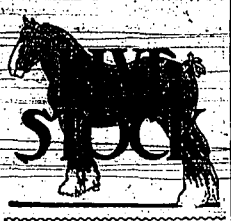

**AGED-BROOD SOWS ARE BEST**

Regular Breeders With Large Litters and Who Take Good Care of Pigs Are Proper Ones to Keep

Sows that are regular breeders, care of the little pigs, should be kept until they fail to be good producers. The principal test of whether or a sow is a good milker or not is the thrift of her pigs, and her condition while suckling them. If they thrive, and she eats liberally and keeps in good health and digestion; and at the same time becomes a little thin while nursing her pigs, it is pretty good evidence that she is a good mother and should be kept as long as her usefulness lasts.

A regular breeder and a good mother is worth fully \$50, and is a valuable animal.

The young brood sow usually improves as she matures, so that better results may be expected the second year.

Very little progress can be made in building up a good herd of hogs if the policy is to dispose of the young sows after they have farrowed one or two litters. Young sows are

as a rule, not as dependable producers as mature sows. They will, however, develop at their maturity, and can often be trained a number of years to advantage.

Young sows do not farrow as strong litters and they are usually smaller than those from the mature sows.

Young sows that are growing should be fed more liberally than older ones. The latter, if they have a warm, dry pen to sleep in, with plenty of dry leaves or straw for bedding, will require very little food.

We feed our brood sows principally on bran soaked in water and whole oats. We always raise a few stock beets and cabbage to feed when grass cannot be had. Keep an abundant supply of wood ash, or coal made from burnt corn cobs in the feeding room. One of our most successful breeders keeps his brood sows in ten-acre woods and grass pasture the year round.

**TEACHING THE COLT TO LEAD**

Take the Little Fellows When They are Young and Easily Taught—Don't Get in a Hurry.

(By M. COVERDELL.)  
You often see a man kick and cuff the colt around, every time it happens to get in his way.

After a while you will notice this same fellow out with the family helping him to hem up a two-year-old colt, while he can put a halter on him.

For the first two or three times they get the halter on, they have a regular circus in teaching the animal to lead and do halterwork. It is mighty hard and dangerous work, too, this breaking in big, strong two-year-old colts.

Why not take the little fellows in hand when they are small, easily handled and quick to learn? Slip the halter on the colt occasionally and by slow degrees get it accustomed to leading up, when the lead strap is tightened and you move.

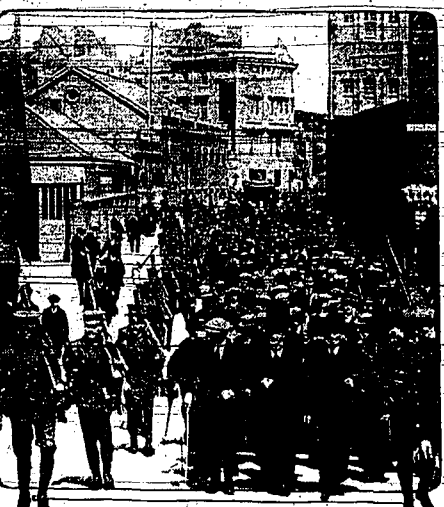
But don't get in a hurry. The colt has been used to going ahead of you, so don't expect it to follow too soon.

A lump of sugar, or a few oats held in the hand just in front of the little fellow are much better assistants in teaching it to lead than dragging it by the lead strap and having someone behind it with a club or a fishing-pole to "shoo" it along.

Value of Roughage.  
The nutritive value of winter roughage for stock depends in a large measure upon the palatability. This is a point that should be given much consideration in making up the grain ration for the stock.

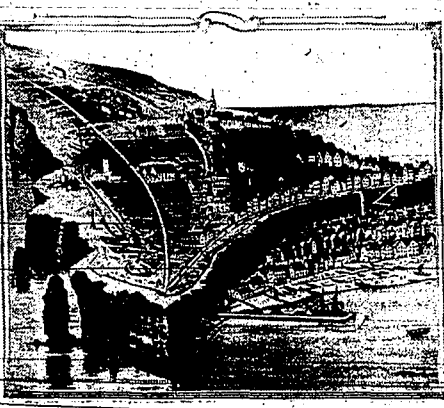
Good Investment.

**DAIRY**

**BEST TIME FOR FRESHENING**

Several Good Reasons for Having Cows Drop Calves During Month of September and October.

It is generally held by breeders that the best time to have cows freshen is the months of September and October. There are several reasons for having cows calve at this time. First, the cow will produce more milk when she freshens in the fall instead of in the spring, according to the best authorities. The price for the best milk products are higher during the winter months than in summer; third, calves born in the fall may be turned out the

pasture to better advantage than those born in the spring; they are also more capable of protecting themselves from flies. When cows freshen at this season of the year, and it is desirable, have them freshen the following year at the same time, it is necessary to carry them for three months before breeding. This is the usual practice among the best dairymen.

We would say that it would be better to begin breeding the animals in the first of January if it is desired to have them freshen in the fall, for it is a possibility that it will require more than one breeding—Hoar's Dairyman.

**CLEAN WATER IS NECESSARY**

Artificial Pond Erected by Farmer Proves Quite Adequate for All Needs of Farm.

Good clean water is an essential necessity for the comfort and well-being of the dairy herd. Getting the well water, if good, is possibly the best, but when there is not a sufficient supply a good deep pond does not come amiss.

We have an artificial pond which supplies our needs in this direction, which is ordinarily from twelve to fourteen feet deep, and well.

This pond was made by building a dam across a hollow in the pasture, 45 feet wide at the bottom and wide enough at the top so a team could be driven across, says an illustration in Farmers' Review. A wall on the side of the dam was constructed of twelve-inch white oak timbers to prevent wash from breaking the dam. The outlet is not over the dam, but on the side.

To accomplish this task three teams of four or five men were kept busy for three weeks. After the dam had settled it was built up to the necessary height twice at different intervals.

Here you have with a small outlay, and have a good old-fashioned well when you so desire, in the neighborhood you have a place to stake, and a most excellent place for an abundance of feed for the icehouse. Not only this, but the neighborhood at this time has the privilege of securing all the water they wish to use. The wells go dry there is plenty there to meet the demand. It took a lot of hard labor and buckache, but it has given us 12 years or more of service.

**JUDGMENT IN BUYING COWS**

If Marking Has Characteristic Color Markings for Her Breed She Is Always Easily Saleable.

When buying cows, don't buy anything that won't sell well again. In case you should want to do so. The demand is for good cowboys, leading breeds, and if a cow has characteristic color markings she is bred, she is easily saleable. Of course, to sell a cow on the strength of her color alone is hardly fair to the buyer. Get them with color combined with production. The chances are, however, that once you have a nice looking cow that is a persistent milk producer will not be tempted to part with her, no matter how short of money you may be.

Water Supply for Cows.  
In winter, the water supply for dairy cows should have close attention. The water from the outdoor tank should be heated before use, or the water should be allowed to warm up in the barn.
