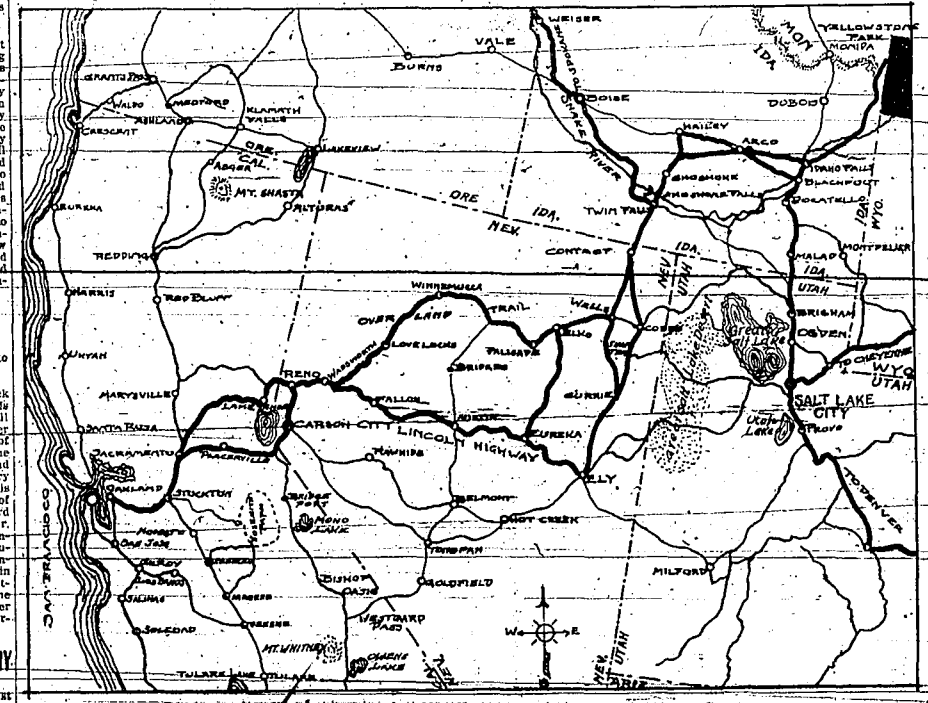

NEED MAJOR REED

UNCLE SAM AS A "PERM"

"Yankee imperialism and German militarism must be crushed," says Senator Santiago Perera Triana, a well-known South American publicist, in a letter to the President of Colombia. Senator Triana argues that Colombia is the lead in the forming of a Latin-American alliance to oppose any tendency toward aggression by European powers by the United States. In commenting upon this proposal, the Maracibo Post shows a distinct fear that the United States may entertain designs upon South America the reverse of approval.

The logical development of the Monroe Doctrine, while it excluded European aggression, did not prevent Colombia being violently despoiled of Panama. However, in the utterance of Senator Wilson we see the dawn of a different policy toward Latin America on the part of the United States, one that may render impossible any future aggression like that of Panama. The Panagrafado endorses the policy

of Senator Triana, which holds that Latin-American safety lies in a Spanish-American, rather than a Pan-American alliance, but refuses to accept assurances from the White House at their face value. Optimism is also seen in the declaration of President Wilson, and the assurance that the White House is maintaining a policy of change in the policy of the White House toward the Republics of South America. We must, however, await the development of events; for we are convinced that in that quarter there is sometimes a vast difference between words and deed.

The interference of the United States in Santo Domingo seems to fill this paper with alarm, for it contains: "Moral influence we consider unobjectionable, but even under Wilson, the United States has gone further and, in spite of the reiterated statements of the First Magistrate of the American people, the United States government has assumed the administration of the customs in Santo Domingo and has endorsed the proposals of a syndicate of American bankers whereby the finances of Nicaragua pass into the hands of Wall Street." In our opinion South-American publicists ought not to advocate Pan-Americanism, but Spanish-Americanism. Our ideal should be to constitute a Spanish-American confederation, whereby the United States of North America could be confronted by a United States of South America, and a satisfactory equilibrium would thus be established. TALKS ON THRIFT

No. 4.—Stopping The Leaks.

"Having is foolish to the fool and a nuisance to the careless, but to the man who thinks of the perils of poverty, economy is the first and greatest virtue. If you are too weak or too indifferent to save, put yourself in a position where you will be FORCED to save," Los Angeles Examiner. It is said that \$30,000,000 worth of waste paper is burned in the United States every year. A great many housewives and business firms pay out money to have it carted away when they might use it into cash if they would take the trouble to investigate the market for this material, which is said to be worth 20 cents a hundred pounds.

A Massachusetts industrial concern has saved an average of 192 pig hours a month to each man through the use of a motorized department. Consider this from the standpoint of the workman. Say he is paid 25 cents an hour. By allowing the company to keep him in a healthy physical condition, and a more contented frame of mind, he is enabled to work nearly an hour more each day, his earnings are increased \$1.92 per month, or \$23.04 per year.

Dr. Brady, who writes medical advice for the readers of newspapers, says: "In no case the cheaper eyes are just as good as and just as palatable in every way as both or paraffin. The installation of a new form of inkwell, which prevented evaporation, resulted in a gain of \$1,200 a year.

with the aid of its Automobile Association, is by presenting the above map, endeavoring to show a feasible route branching off the Lincoln Highway at Ely, that will avoid this desert feature and give the tourist something more than a "dry" and "dusty" road. It will avoid, in fact, for another year, while not noted by the Eastern tourist, the worst of the worst of the Lincoln highway trip and sends him northward by the MOST DIRECT ROUTE to the Yellowstone National Park and the Great Shoshone falls, two of the most interesting sights in the West. Not only does it include these features but gives the motorist the knowledge that at least every ten miles or so of the route is humanly proportioned with the chance to obtain help in case of trouble. Roadheads that are always passable and fit for travel in another direction that will be of great service to the tourist who takes the Shoshone fall-Yellowstone park route, via Ely, Wells, Contact, Twin Falls, Arco, Shoshone, Hatley, to Arco, Idaho Falls and the Park. Every part of the road is good, the scenery is interesting at all times and for all the way diversified enough to make it worth while as a sight seeing trip.

Leaving the Lincoln Highway at Ely, Nevada, toward Wells, a perfect roadbed stretches out for miles of a surface that will hold you for an hour with perfect safety. Reaching Wells the route stretches northward through a winding highway composed of disintegrated granite, which offers one of the best natural roadbeds in the world. Ten miles out of Wells, the motorist, reaching the rim, views the valley below and the hills dotted around with patches of green fields. By easy ascent for twenty miles the motorist takes the natural course of the valley until the top of the watershed is reached, where Springs has been twenty feet apart send their water for great falls. of what has been done and plan for the coming year. At this season when so much clothing is about to be discarded, please don't lay away garments which you will not wear again. Instead, call Mrs. B. A. Banks by telephone and she will send for them. Then when the cold weather returns they will be ready for distribution at once. The chief need of the winter has been the employment for men. In this Twin Falls has not been none. All cities in the country have faced this problem, and found no solution. If, for instance, a straw board factory, or one for making of denatured alcohol could be established under municipal ownership, to be run during the cold months, it would take care of nearly all the poverty in town, and doubtless be self-supporting after the first year. It would also mean that the land owned by the County Farm, east of town, should be used for its original purpose, rather than remain rented. During the dull season, buildings could be erected and other work necessary for its complete equipment begun, men being paid wages for their work rather than given coal and provisions which they have not money to buy for their families. Sometimes it has been found that men are a distress because they refused work in the summer season, and so were penniless to meet their own needs in severe weather. It happens to men who decline work and prefer standing on the streets to laboring on the farms, could be reported to the sheriff as a distress because they would at least help to throw light on the reasons for poverty. These are insistent questions to those who have come closest to the poverty of the winter. They must be answered, if at all, before the acute suffering of another season is upon us. When that time comes and children are cold and hungry it is too late to inquire closely into causes. All energy must be used in meeting the emergency of the hour. Now is the time to weigh these causes and discuss fundamental and constructive plans for the alleviation and final removal of conditions which do not necessarily exist in a country as new as this and where harvests are so abundant and the cit-

GROWING FRUIT ON DRY LAND

Important Point to Remember is to Plant All Trees and Small Plants Farther Apart Than Custom.

In growing fruit without irrigation, all trees and small fruit plants must be planted farther apart than is the custom. This is a very important point to remember. Where there is little rainfall and a dry subsoil, each tree or plant must have enough individual surface surrounding it to draw moisture from, according to its size and nature of growth. We cannot get something for nothing, nor can we grow plants without moisture; and they must have enough to do their best.

Those who are planting apple trees 16 feet apart each with an dry subsoil and cannot succeed. This is just as certain as that two given numbers make a certain sum in a mathematical problem. Apple trees should not be planted closer than 30 feet apart each way. They will not need all the moisture between them at this distance apart until ten or twelve years old, and small fruits or other crops may be grown between them till about this age, but one must use care and judgment as to how much or how long to crop between the trees. It is better to make the mistake of cropping too little than too much. Trees planted 16 feet apart will grow as well as those 30 feet apart for the first ten years, if there is nothing planted between them, but after about that time there will not be moisture enough to supply the increasing drain made as late as grow larger. Every third or fourth of the trees would die out, nothing would have been gained, for the orchard would only be starting to bear paying crops of fruit; while if the rows are 30 feet apart, and one row of small fruit plants are set between each two rows of trees, by the time the trees need all the moisture, the small fruits will have done their best, and one can dig them up, feeling he has been well repaid. It is important, too, that the outside row of any kind of trees or plants be planted not closer than 15 feet from a prairie grass growing border. There is little moisture under a prairie sod after a long dry spell.

The land should be in thorough cultivation before trees are planted, and the last plowing should be extra deep, because it is not going to be plowed again and should be in condition to take in the best rainfall. No extra tools are required; simply a strong 14-inch plow set to run deep and a good team to pull it.

MUCH IMPROVED DIRT ROADS

Intelligent Use of Drag Will Benefit Roadway, No Matter What the Nature of the Soil is.

The dirt road can be very much improved by the intelligent use of the road drag. This has been proved beyond a doubt in the states that have legislated in favor of road dragging. No matter what the soil, the intelligent use of the drag will improve the roadway. Mind you, I used the word intelligent, says a writer in Successful Farming.

A sandy soil is hard to handle. Where gravel is available—a gravel containing considerable clay—a surfacing of six or eight inches with this material will greatly benefit a sandy road.

The first thing essential in road improvement is good drainage. You first get the water away from the sides of the road so the damp-soaked road bed can dry out and harden. When the side drainage is perfect, then the next essential is to crown the road so that surface drainage of the road is perfect. Even a dirt road cannot get very muddy if the water has no chance to stand in the wheel tracks. With surface water eliminated, and dirt washed away from the road bed, the road cannot soften very much.

Every highway, whatever its construction, should be patrolled by a man who is on the lookout for clogged ditches and the breaking of the road surface. A man with the handle of a road walker will do more to make good roads than the most elaborate outfit used only when roads become impassable.

TIME FOR PLANTING ALFALFA

Best Results Secured by Doing Work in Wettest Season of the Year—Avoid Crust on Soil.

It is very important when planting the seed that no crust should form above it, therefore it is advisable when using a press drill to plant only when the top inch is dry. The drill with chain drags should be used in clay soil or in moist weather. Half an inch to an inch is the best depth to plant it in sandy soil, but in clay loam even less is better. The best time to plant alfalfa is the latter part of the season of the year. The seed is small, it cannot be put in very deep, and if it sprouts and then dries out before the next rain comes it is gone. For this reason we do not recommend fall planting.

Some have been successful with late planting and recommend it to their neighbors, but taking it by and large we find that only about 40 per cent obtain a stand, while spring planting gives over 75 per cent. The plowing and other work has been properly done.

Cut Down Horse's Feed. As the hard work passes up on the horses cut down their feed accordingly.

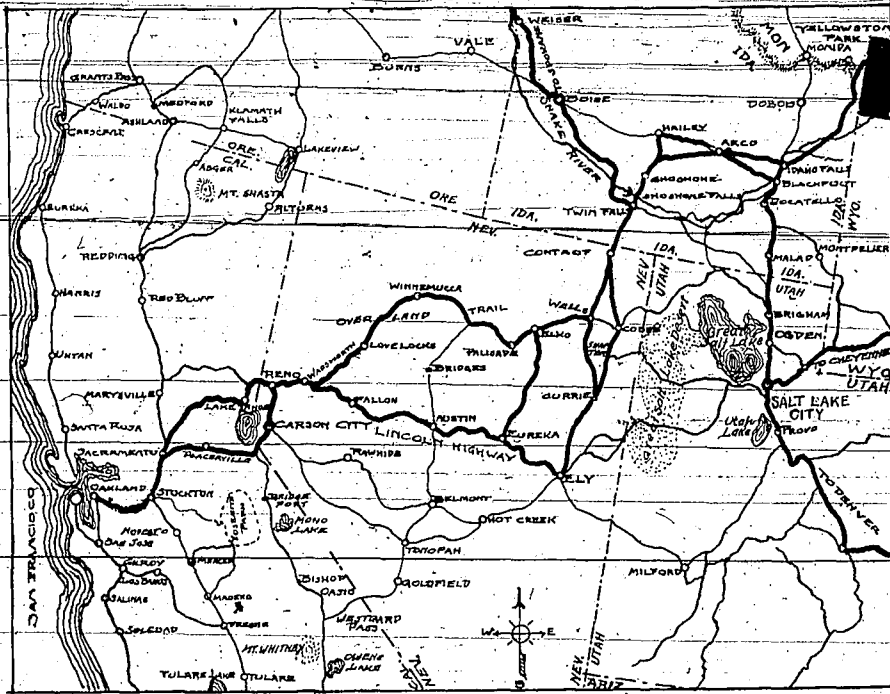

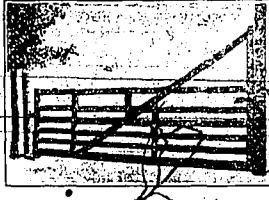

Goulds Retire From Railway

The organization meeting of the new board, which was called immediately after the annual meeting in St. Louis today, March 9, indicate that Mr. Bush's trip across country to Boston was not solely for pleasure. Eight new members were taken into the new board of which Mr. Bush is the head. These members represent various parts of the Gould system and the financial interests affiliated therewith.

By the consolidation of the offices of chairman and president, Mr. Bush becomes the active head of the entire system. The new president is expected to inaugurate a new policy regarding feeders which he occupied personally and will not be dependent upon knowledge presented through intermediaries.

The Wall Street Journal announced on March 6 that there was no hitch in the plans outlined for the reorganization of the Denver & Rio Grande and Western Pacific lines. With respect to the latter, the Journal states: "\$2,500,000 new first mortgage bonds would be issued for the building of branch lines and feeders, of which sum \$10,000,000 would be made available in the near future."

The first tentative bond issue of Utah's southern Idaho, and the fact that Mr. Bush drove over the reconnaissance survey line through this field, at a time when the trip was anything but a pleasure, indicates that he wished to satisfy himself regarding the merits of the territory before plans were formulated for extension. Competitive territory, such as California and Oregon offer, are not usually sought by practical railway builders like Mr. Bush in times of financial stringency, consequently it is reasonable to suppose that the bond issue for feeders to the West was the one of the results of Mr. Bush's tour through northern Nevada and southern Idaho.

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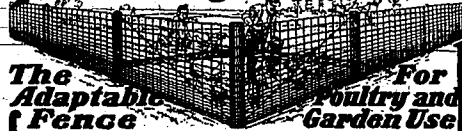
