POSTAL ACCOUNT BY MAIL

Depositor Need Not Appear at Post Office in Person.

Every person in the United States ten years old or over may open an account in a postal savings bank after July 1st, according to an instructive booklet issued by Postmaster General Burleson. This important extension of the service will be made possible by the introduction of working out a feasible and safe method for meeting a demand well illustrated in a letter from a Saline county Alabaster who has received many letters from a postal savings bank.

"Having a few hundred dollars in savings, I was tired of hard and arduous labor and the arduous economy on the part of my wife and myself, we concluded to deposit it in the Postal Savings Bank. I wrote to the postmaster at that place and received reply to the effect that none but patrons of that office could deposit money in that office, which is very disappointing news to us. Our little farm is not large enough to support a family of five, and we are in the predicament for us to try more with little we have saved and we are so old that we can't afford much now and we would like to put away at least enough to put us away in decency."

Under the plan adopted by the postmaster general for opening accounts by mail, an intending depositor, where there is no regularly designated postal savings bank, will apply to his local postmaster, who will send that necessary identification data prepared and forwarded to a nearby postmaster authorized to accept deposits. The intending depositor will then be given permission to forward his first and subsequent deposits by money order or registered mail direct to the postmaster at the banking point for which receipts or certificates will be issued. He may withdraw all or part of his postal savings by mail and on demand together with any interest that may be due him.

The new feature points out that any person twenty years old or over may open an account in his or her own name; that an account may be opened by a married woman free from any control or interference by her husband; that post office officials are forbidden to disclose to any person, except the depositor, the amount of any deposits; that withdrawals may be made without previous notice; and that the government guarantees to repay all deposits on demand with accrued interest.

TO ABOLISH BACK HAUL RATES

Pacific Coast Great Terminal Points Mountain State Reduction.

Washington, May 18.—Plans submitted by the transcontinental railroads for constructing rates to points east of Pacific coast terminals and in the inter-mountain country—the so-called back haul rates—were disapproved today by the Interstate Commerce commission.

The commission, however, authorized the railroads to construct rates to the back haul points by adding to the terminal rates not more than 75 per cent of the local rates for the movement of freight to the point or by adding arbitrarily to the terminal rates, varying with the distance from the ports. The arbitrarily are not to be more than 75 per cent of the local rates.

The carriers also were authorized to extend terminal rates to these Pacific coast points: San Diego, San Pedro, East San Pedro, Wilmington, Red Bluff, Wilmington, San Francisco and Oakland, Col., Astoria and Portland, Ore., Vancouver, Bellingham, South Salt Lake, Everett, Tacoma, Seattle, Aberdeen, Hoquiam, and Cosmopolis, Wash.

The commission modified existing orders so as to permit maximum rates that are not to exceed the local rates at intermediate points on back and second-class commodities of 125 per 100 miles, which lower rates are applicable to coast terminals.
